press of Ireland' on the 8th inst. The largest artificial lake in the world will soon be created by the United States Government in the valley of the Rio Grande River. The waters of that stream will be held up by a dam of concrete between two bluffs of solid rock, its base resting on solid rock 65 feet below the bed of the river, and its summit rising to a height of 190 feet above low water. The dam will be 250 feet long at its base, 400 feet at the bed of the river, and 1,150 at the summit. It will be 180 feet thick at the bottom and 20 feet at the top. The resulting lake will be 45 miles long, and its waters will irrigate 180,000 acres of arid land in Texas and New Mexico. The dam will cost over seven in million dollars.
