Is Short But Pointed Order Issueed by Major Wood.

In consideration of the rapid spreading of the rabies which has become more prevalent since the weather began Germany Is Having Troubles to get warmer and realizing the danger which threatens the citizens of Dawson from this source an order was issued today by Major Wood requiring all dogs to be closely tied as well as muzzled. Yesterday three mad dogs were killed by members of the police force, two of them in the center of the town and the

third on the bridge crossing the slough on First avenue next to the fire house. The one killed on the bridge was a dark shepherd dog with brown forefeet. As he had on a tag it is evident that the disease developed in him very rapidly, for tags were only started issuing on the first of the month.
