Against All Asiatics.

London, Sept. 12.—Despatches from Lucknow state that the incidents at Bellingham and Vaucouver have greatly excited Hindoos, who are highly indignant and are calling on the British Government to take effective measures to pratect their countrymen in the United States and Canada.

Ottawa, Sept. 12.—The Mayor of Vancouver has telegraphed Sir Wilfrid Laurier that twenty arrests of riotses have been made.

He also states that the attacks were directed against Asiatics in general, and not against the Japanese in particular.

Must Uphold Rights of All.

London, Sept. 12—The Times in an editorial article yesterday morning says it is convinced that there is now full and ample confirmation for the belief that the anti-Oriental riots at Vancouver were actually organized by American labor agitators.
