## CATTLE MARKETS.

**British Cattle Markets.**  
London, April 11.—Liverpool and London cattle are firmer at 11 1/2c to 12 1/2c per lb. dressed weight; refrigerator beef is quoted at 8 1/2c to 9 1/2c per lb.

## Toronto Live Stock.

Toronto, April 11.—Receipts of live stock were large, over 100 car loads since Tuesday. The quality of fat cattle was fairly good much better than for some time.

**Butchers.**  
There was a good demand for well-finished cattle and hogs, and it is expected that at higher prices than at any time this season, but of course there were few of them. Choice to prime picked lots of butchers' hogs, good enough for export and of export weights, sold at \$5.25 to \$5.50 per cwt; loads of good, at \$4.50 to \$5.10; medium to fair, \$4.25 to \$4.80; good cows, \$3.75 to \$4.50; fair cows, \$3.40 to \$4; canners, \$3.25 to \$3.50 per cwt.

## Feeders and Stockers.

Harry Murty reports the stocker and feeder trade as being good for the best grades. There is, said Mr. Murty, more call for steers, 800 to 1100 lbs. each, for lighter grades. Mr. Murty bought and handled 300 cattle this week, as follows: Short horns, 1000 to 1200 lbs. each, at \$4.00 to \$4.50 per cwt; steers, 900 to 1000 lbs., \$4 to \$4.50; steers, 800 to 900 lbs., \$3.50 to \$4.15; steers, 700 to 800 lbs., \$3.25 to \$4; good yearlings, \$3.50 to \$3.75; medium light, \$3 to \$3.25.

## Milch Cows.

About 50 cows were on sale during Wednesday and Thursday at prices ranging from \$30 to \$35 each, with an odd one or two at \$40. The demand was somewhat better than on Tuesday.

## Veal Calves.

Prices for the bulk of those offered were easy at \$3 to \$8 per cwt. Prime new milk fed calves are worth \$7 per cwt, but few are being offered.

## Sheep and Lambs.

Trade for good quality sheep and lambs was strong; export areas, \$5.50 to \$6 per cwt; bucks, \$4.50 to \$5 per cwt; yearling lambs, \$4.50 to \$5 per cwt; inferior and common lambs, \$3.50 to \$4.50; spring lambs, \$4 to \$5 each.

## Hogs.

Mr. Harris reports prices unchanged at \$6.00 for select and \$5.40 to \$6 for fat, with prospects for lower prices in the near future.

## East Buffalo Cattle Market.

East Buffalo, April 11.—Cattle, steady, unchanged. Veals, receipts, 500 head; active and steady, \$4.25 to \$5.

Hogs—Receipts, 2000 head; active and steady, \$5.50 to \$6; mixed, \$5.25 to \$5.75; yearlings and pigs, \$7.25; roughs, \$6 to \$6.25.

Sheep and Lambs—Receipts, 6000 head; sheep, active and steady; lambs, slow and lower; lambs, \$5 to \$9.10.

## Two Peace Banquets.

New York, April 12.—Two large public banquets, instead of the dinner originally planned, it was announced yesterday, will conclude the national arbitration and peace congress, which is to meet in Carnegie Hall next Sunday.

Besides the president, Earl Grey, Governor-General of Canada; Ambassador Bryce, President Elliott of Harvard, Samuel Connors, Edward Everett Hale, Lyman Abbott and others will address the auditors.

## Gives \$150,000 to McGill.

Montreal, April 12.—Through the will of the late Mrs. Peter Redpath, which was probated Wednesday at Somerset House, England, McGill University benefits to the extent of \$150,000, which is to be applied to the maintenance of the library and the Peter Redpath Museum.

Another important bequest is that of \$40,000 to the Montreal General Hospital.


## Banker Editor Murdered.

## \$650,000 Fire.

Oklahoma City, Okla., April 12.—A cotton compress owned by the Traders' Compress and Warehouse Co., was burned here yesterday with an estimated loss of about \$650,000, covered by insurance.



## BOUNDARIES IN LAKES.

Buoys Placed by Revenue Cutter to Keep Fishermen in Place.

Washington, April 12.—Reports from the revenue cutter officer, who last summer made a test of the system of marking the international boundary lines in the Great Lakes by buoys, indicate that the experiment has resulted successfully.

It will be continued during the coming season, and if it works as well in confining the fishermen of America and Canada to their own waters as it did last year much friction will be avoided.

Owing to the heavy ice formation during the winter, it was found impossible to maintain an ordinary buoy in position in the deep waters of the lakes. Methods are now being considered to relieve the authorities of the expense and trouble of taking up and replacing these buoys every season.

## Spool Thread Numbers.

Spools of thread of different qualities are all numbered alike, irrespective of factory or maker. The reason for this is that the system of measurement of sewing cotton is practically universal, and when 840 yards of yarn weigh 7,000 grains (a pound of cotton) the makers mark it No. 1. If 1,680 yards of yarn weigh a pound it is marked No. 2, and so on, each progressive number signifying that 840 yards more are required to weigh a pound.
