Why the Beer-Drinkers of Bembridge

Became Testotallers.

The recent strike of London musichall artists reminds one that there is scarcely a class of workers from actors to executioners from barristers to beer-drinkers, and from parsons to choir-boys, which has not at one time or another asserted its rights and avenged its wrongs in a similar way.

It is not long since Spain was the scene of a combined strike of actors throughout its length and breadth, which arose as a sequel to the popular indignation at the election of an undesirable Archbishop of Valencia. The police of Madrid took the extreme step of closing the Zaruuela Theatre and arresting several of the actors from singing political songs directed against the Government and the unpopular prelate. In consequence of this indignity the whole theatrical world rose in arms; and a meeting of the Spanish Actors' Association was held, at which a universal strike and the closing of all the theatres in the country were proclaimed.

Price of Beer Raised.

When the publicans at Bembridge, near Preston, England, decided to raise the price of ale retailed on their premises the customers rose in arms and refused to quench their thirst with beer until the normal price had been restored, and proved that they really "meant business" by issuing a notice calling on beer-drinkers generally to avoid Bembridge as long as the dispute lasted.

Equally resolute was the attitude of the female-prisoners in Wormwood Scrubbs Prison, England, whose duty it was to do the washing.

It is officially announced that Lieut.
General Sir Charles Knox has been appointed colonel of the Shropshire Light Infantry, in succession to the late Sir Henry de Bathe. This honor has been thoroughly well earned, for there is not a more capable soldier on the active list than popular "Charlie" Knox, as he is known throughout the service. He gained great kudos in South Africa for the manner in which he rounded up the Boers time and again, and on his return home Sir Evelyn Wood—one of the shrewdest judges of a soldier's abilities that ever lived—specially applied for him to be put in command of a division of the Second Army Corps, then stationed on Salisbury Plain. In this capacity he took a leading part in the great manoeuvres that were held in Berkshire and Wiltshire in the autumn of 1903, and would probably have done better still had he not been unwittingly betrayed at the eleventh hour by one of the assistant umpires, himself a soldier of great experience. The umpire had been detailed to accompany Sir Charles Knox's division, which had made a night march and encamped in the neighborhood of Hungerford, intending to deliver a smashing blow at Gen. French's invading army early on the following morning He was up betimes, and riding forward across the country, got into touch with his division much earlier than he had supposed to be the case. "You have made a fine march, sir, to get here from Hungerford so quickly," he remarked to an officer in charge of an advance party. The officer, looked surprised, but said nothing. About a quarter of an hour passed and then the general began to fear he had made a mistake, so he turned to the officer again and said: "You are part of Gen. Knox's division, are you not?" "Oh, no!" laughed the officer. "This is Bruce Hamilton's advance guard that is seeking Knox. We had no idea where his camp was until you kindly told us just now!" What Gen. The officers of the overworked English roads say the locomotive plants cannot provide the additional engines that are needed.
