Local and Provincial.

Very cold this week.

The Berwick Baptist church is arranging for a Roll Call on the 11th of February.

Rev. Wm. Brown, of Lower Horton, will preach on Foreign Missions in the Methodist church, Wolfville, Sunday evening, and at Greenwich in the afternoon at three o'clock.

The large pane of plate glass in the Wolfville Clothing Company's store, owing probably to the settling of the building, cracked badly on Sunday last. It is the largest single pane of glass in the county.

Over 15,000 barrels of apples were shipped on the 15th, 16th and 18th insts. from the Valley for the English market, of which L. O. Nalley & Co's warehouse, Aylesford, contributed over 1600 barrels.

The annual meeting of the shareholders of the Acadia Dairy Co. will be held on Monday afternoon next in Temperance Hall, this town. The election of directors and other important business will be transacted. Mr J. E. Hopkins, Dairy Inspector, is expected to be present.

The annual report of the Kentville Board of Trade for the year 1896 has reached our table. The energetic president, Mr M. G. DeWolfe, appears to be the right man in the right place, and his report indicates that he and the other members of the Board are putting forth commendable efforts to place their town in the front row.

The firm who turned out on Wednesday morning last, were shipped quite severely by Jack Frost. Mr J. M. Shaw had one of his hands badly frozen, and his ears frozen, while Mr H. B. Gillmore and a number of others had their ears frozen. These facts will help those of our citizens who were mourning peacefully in their cosy cots, to appreciate the efforts of the firm in their behalf.

The annual convention of the Nova Scotia Farmers' Association is to be held at Middleton on the 26th, 27th and 28th inst. Every agricultural society in the Province is invited to send representatives. Addresses are to be given by Prof. Fletcher, Ottawa, and other prominent agriculturists. The first session begins at 8 p. m. on the 26th. One-fare tickets will be issued on all railroads.

The sermon delivered by Rev. Dr. Sexton, in the Methodist church, last Sunday evening, was a very able one. The Doctor is original, and expresses himself with great force. The views of such men as Herbert Spencer and Ingensoll was treated with sparkling contempt, and at times the great divine carried his harrow away by his eloquent periods. The large audience present filled both the body of the church and the galleries. The address was listened to most attentively.

Dr. Sexton's lecture in the Methodist church last Monday evening was not largely attended, the streets being wet and sloppy. His subject: "If a man die shall he live again?" opened up a broad field of thought, and was treated with great ability. Science and Philosophy he claimed, answered in the affirmative, and the conclusions he drew seemed most natural and logical. He lectured again on Tuesday evening, taking for his subject "The Difficulties of Infidelity." Those who heard this lecture speak very highly of it, but the audience was not large.

ROYAL HOTEL BURNED TO THE GROUND.

The Royal Hotel, of this town, which only a little over two months ago was badly burned, was again a victim of the destroying element on Wednesday morning last. The fire was first observed by Dr Austin Payzant, who was at his mother's, and he gave the alarm. This was about half-past three a. m. The fire bell was rang, and in a very short time the firemen were on the scene. As far as the hotel was concerned, however, their efforts were unavailing, the flames had got under too great headway, so they devoted their energies to the saving of the barn on the premises, and Mr G. H. Wallace's grocery store to the west. The Morse store on the corner to the east, also had a narrow escape, as a strong wind was blowing in that direction, carrying burning cinders and sparks. After between two and three hours of hard work these buildings were out of danger, but the hotel and a small shed near the barn, had been completely destroyed. A ragged remnant of a wall is all that is left of what ere long would have been a handsome and commodious structure. The repairs which were made necessary by the previous fire, Messrs Curry Bros. & Bent, of Bridgetown, had the contract for, and were pushing along the work rapidly. Mr Beckwith expected to get moved in and be ready for business some time in March. The blow is a very hard one, and Mr and Mrs Beckwith and their family, have the sympathy of the whole community. They have much pluck and enterprise, and are very popular with the travelling public, the Royal previous to its misfortune being the favorite resort for commercial men, when they visited on town. The origin of the fire is unknown. The carpenters who had been employed in the work lost all their tools, the kits ranging in value from \$75 to \$200.

Baptist Church Notes.

Special revival meetings have been held this week, which have been well attended and very interesting. The pastor has been assisted by Rev. Isaiah Wallace. The meetings will be continued next week.

At the annual business meeting of the church, held lately, the finances were shown to be in a very gratifying state. Upwards of \$2,000 were raised for current expenses, leaving a balance in hand, after paying all liabilities, of about \$500, which has been voted towards the Parsonsage Building Fund, to which fund a large sum has been contributed, in addition to amount raised for current expenses. The amount raised for mission, and other benevolent purposes was nearly \$1,500. Of this sum the Sunday school collected almost \$200.

The Sunday congregations are so large that it is sometimes difficult to find seats for all who attend the services.
