Obituaries.

There passed away at Sheffield Mills, on Feb. 10th, Roland A. Chase, in the 72nd year of his age. The funeral service was conducted by the Rev. Mr. McCurdy, Rev. M. G. Henry and the deceased's former pastor, Rev. William Dawson, who gave an address from Gen. 35:29. Mr. Chase was an exceedingly clever citizen and lover of all that was honest and upright. He was a member of the Presbyterian church and a strong conservative in politics. One of the finest of men has passed with Roland A. Chase.

Rev. Sydney Welton died at his home, Port Richmond, Staten Island, N. Y., on Feb. 22nd, after a lingering illness. His body was brought to his former home at Kingstons, in this county, and buried beside his parents. He leaves a widow, nee Miss Curry, of Windsor, and three children. Mr. Welton was born in 1848 and graduated from Acadia in 1881. He preached at Billtown for several years. He was pastor at Canning for two years and filled various pastorates in the maritime provinces and the United States and was later engaged in the insurance business.

On Tuesday, Feb. 22nd, at the home of her daughter-in-law, Mrs. Owen K. Roscoe, Raat Hall's Harbor, the death of Elizabeth North, widow of the late, John W. Roscoe, took place. The deceased, who was 96 years of age, was the mother of Colin W. Roscoe, Inspector of Schools, this town. She was a most estimable lady, and was much beloved by all who knew her.

The death is reported at Belmont, California, Feb. 19th, of Mrs. Annie E. deMille, widow of the late Prof. James deMille. Mrs. deMille, who was a daughter of the late Rev. John Prior, was a native of Wolfville, having been born here in 1834. After the death of her husband in Halifax she resided in that city until a few years ago she went to Vancouver to make her home. She is survived by two sons, Prof. A. B. deMille, of Belmont, California, and F. W. deMille, manager of the Canadian Bank of Commerce at Grandview, Manitoba.

The death of Mrs. Aaron Young occurred at her home in Truro on Monday. Mrs. Young was formerly a resident of Wolfville and carried on a dress-making business here. A good many years ago the family removed to Truro where Mrs. Young has since resided. She was 83 years of age and retained to a wonderful degree her health and vitality. The remains were brought to Wolfville on Wednesday, accompanied by members of the family, and interred in Willow Bank, where her husband and other members of the family repose.

The death of his brother-in-law, Mr. J. H. Bishop, this town, there passed away on Wednesday afternoon a respected resident. Mr. John W. Borden, formerly of Windsor, Mr. Borden was 74 years of age and was a native of Canada, in this county. For many years he resided in Windsor where he was much respected. Of late he had made his home in Wolfville, where he had many friends. The funeral takes place on Saturday afternoon, the interment being in Windsor.
