To Repair Stained Wall Paper.

Of the many things the household is heir to, few are more annoying than the discoloration of wall papers resulting from damp, burst pipes or over-bleached colors.

It is sometimes possible to cover the spot with a piece of paper to match, but very often this is not a valuable and in such a case it is an excellent idea to apply to an artist's colors and from amongst his French pastels match the tint of the paper exactly. Occasionally it may be necessary to rub two pastels together.

When the damp has dried out the marks left can be colored and with a little skill and care the pattern can even be redrawn so as to fit it to the unimpaired portions. An ordinary eye will not notice the repair. The pastels should be of the "soft" variety, rubbed on direct and then spread with the finger and a soft cloth. The pastels cost very little.

Farm Jobs and the Unemployed.

One of the chief defects of the Back to the land' cry is that it does not take enough account of practical conditions. There is no good reason why a factory mechanic or artisan bred or accustomed to city life should not go in for farming as he would take up and learn another urban business. It is he who is the danger to the rural life, with its panorama of crowded amusements, varied amusements, and his desire for the quiet life on the farm. If he were not true, it might be an everyday occurrence for him to be sent to return to the land when out of employment in the city. In the days to come there may be many men quite accustomed to the labor who are idle and looking for work. It is not strange that the Dominion Immigration Agent, Mr. Robert Birmingham, has to declare that he has thousands of applicants from farmers asking help for over winter? What of these "farm-broke" unemployed? Are they unwilling to go back to the land? The immigration agent says that the vacancies will probably have to be filled by the new coming immigrants from Britain. Do some people esteem the role of farmer as beneath their dignity, even if they are reduced to hardship through non-employment at other work? In the mind of some native Canadians there seems to be a notion that a stigma attaches to working for wages on a farm. Yet many men who have started life in Canada just this way have made a name and a fortune for themselves.
