Poor Sealing News

The messages received last night from the sealing fleet were anything but cheering, and it looks as if they have not struck the patch of Northern seals which it was hoped yesterday they would. Thick fog prevailed all yesterday, and some of the steamers reported passing through scattered seals. The young have taken to the water and it now looks much as if the voyage will be the worst ever recorded in the history of the sealing fleet. The following messages were received last night:

TERRA NOVA—Dense fog all day. Have steamed twenty miles East of yesterday's patch. Saw only scattered seal.—Kean.
RANGER—Position 47 miles E. by N. Funks. Large sheets difficult to get through. Have heard from all ships; in heavy ice, making slow progress towards main patch. All well.—Winsor.
EAGLE—Total stowed, 3000. Weather thick to-day. Unable to do anything; position about same.—Bishop.
VIKING—50 miles E. by W. Funks. Open, making good headway since noon towards patch; all well.—Bishop.

THETIS—Got 1,000 today; weather foggy; conditions very bad.
NETTUNE—Did nothing today; conditions poor.

Fine Ship Arrives

A new steamer, which will ply between here and Halifax, the s.s. Edmund Donald, arrived from the latter port yesterday morning, after a good run despite heavy gales and high seas. The ship is owned by Marshall & Co., and was built by Burns & Kelleher, at Shad Bay, N.S. She is 531 tons nett and 847 gross and carries 10,000 barrels of cargo below and 200 on deck. She is commanded by Capt. Ernest Wells, a native of Harbor Grace, who has had 17 years' experience as master. He was last in command of the s.s. Stella Maria. Mr. James P. Cook, son of Hon. Tasker Cook, is chief engineer. Matthew Ivany, a native of Trinity, is chief mate. The Edmund Donald, according to The Halifax Chronicle, was formerly the David C. She is a wooden vessel and was launched last year.

From The Seal

Messrs. Baine Johnston & Co. had the following wireless late last night from Capt. Randall of the s.s. Seal: "Position 12 miles E. S. E. Funks, making slow progress; ice tightly packed. We were jammed in Thetis' wake Friday evening; she was just in sight Saturday afternoon. On Monday morning she was 52 miles to the N. N. E. of us. With our limited coal supply, I considered it very risky to continue North, unless ice conditions favored us. We should not have reached their position yet."

POLICE COURT

"Kyle" Meets Seals

While on her way from St. John's to Port aux Basques last trip, the s.s. Kyle, when running between St. Pierre Bank and the western terminus steamed through about 100 miles of ice. It was very foggy, but in the immediate neighborhood of the ship many old harps could be seen, as high as 5 and 10 seals being on some of the pans. The belief is that the ship that she was then steaming through a patch of these seals.

Coming here this trip, she ran through 25 miles of ice E. S. E. of Low Point, and Captain Stevenson thinks any difficulty with Gulf ice need not be expected henceforth.
