12-POUND SALMON CAUGHT ON HOLIDAY AT SPRINGHILL

Many Enjoyed Fly Fishing For Salmon at Hartt's Island Pool on Labor Day

His fish weighed about 12 pounds and played gamely in the battle which followed when he hooked it.

The Brannen medal which was won by the late Mr. Brannen in 1826 with an old flint lock, was won by F. A. Good with a score of 32 at 200 yards. Mr. Good owns the old flint lock with which the medal was originally won.

There was an interesting competition for the Hanson cup which was competed for at 200 and 500 yards. J. W. McFarlane and H. H. Hagerman tied with scores of 63 each and then they had to shoot off for the cup, Mr. McFarlane winning, while under the Bisley rules Mr. Hagerman won the biggest money prize in the competition.

The Loggie match was won by J. E. Page with a score of 57. This match was shot at 600 and 800 yards and F. A. Good was second with 74. Mr. Page also won the Coleman cup for the grand aggregate.

The extra series match was at five hundred yards, and Joe Oldham, one of the most promising young shots in the city, won at 600 yards, defeating a number of the old shots, and H. H. Hagerman won the extra series match at 800 yards.

THE HOSPITAL TRUSTEES MEETING ON LABOR DAY

Holiday Proved Bad Time to Secure Good Attendance of Members of Board

DONATIONS FROM PLEASSED PATIENTS

The Record of the Month of August at the Institution as Told in the Report

The monthly meeting of the Hospital trustees was held yesterday, but as it was a holiday, the attendance of members was limited. Warden Rogers occupied the chair and other gentlemen present were Mr. Sterling, Mr. Moore and Secretary Sampson.

The financial statement submitted by the Treasurer showed a large expenditure in August and this officer submitted a complete statement of the expenditure connected with the enlargement of the (Dow) wing and the (Moore) morgue.

From the report of the Matron it was shown that thirty-two patients were treated during the month. Twenty were discharged cured and two died. Many donations were received by the Matron and these included generous supplies of ice cream from Warden Rogers and L. VanWart, and bread, cake and pies from the Women's Aid of St. Paul's Church.

A letter was read from ex-President Willard Kitchen enclosing his cheque for one hundred dollars, with the wish expressed that it be applied to cost of printing the annual report. The trustees highly appreciate this additional proof of Mr. Kitchen's continued interest in the hospital.

Warden Rogers, who was recently a patient in the hospital, emphasized his appreciation of the comforts of the institution by presenting an elegant bedside table for use in one of the rooms.

Mr. R. W. McLellan, who was recently under surgical treatment in the hospital under the hands of Dr. Phinney, was so well pleased at the treatment of the hospital that he gave the hospital a cheque for twenty dollars.

A letter was read from O. H. Sharpe enclosing \$57.12, being proceeds of collection of special service in the Cathedral, and a letter from Aid. Wilkinson, enclosing \$21.05, being collection in Christ Church on Hospital Sunday.

The secretary-treasurer reported result of the recent examination of probationary students for training, and the report of Dr. Armstrong upon one of the young ladies who has just completed her probation.

Mr. Sterling reported respecting the readjustment of the insurance policies which are held by half a dozen companies, and are now made to read uniformly.

The secretary reported that Miss Annie L. Gorham passed all the required examinations and on 19th of August was granted a diploma. This young lady will well maintain the reputation of Victoria Public Hospital.

The latest probationers are Misses Bessie Drillean, Elsie A. Illingworth and Leah M. Nichol. Action upon some matters was deferred until next meeting.

NORMAL SCHOOL OPENS TODAY WITH BIG ENROLLMENT

Largest Attendance in the History of the Institution is Reported Today

MANUAL TRAINING DIRECTOR COMING

Prof. Peacock Will Arrive Here Tomorrow From Western States to Take up Work

The Provincial Normal School opened this morning for the term's work with the largest classes in the history of the institution. This morning three hundred and eight students were enrolled and with the twenty-one students already enrolled in the French Department that made a total enrollment of three hundred and twenty-nine.

Dr. H. V. B. Bridges, the principal, in charge of the enrollment and all members of the teaching staff reported for duty with the exception of Prof. Peacock, who succeeds Mr. T. B. Kidner as director of Manual Training, and he is expected to arrive here tomorrow from the Western States, where he has been taking a special course in the Manual Training advanced work.

In a day or two the classes in Physical Drill will be commenced under instructions to be furnished from No. 3 Military Depot. There will be three or four instructors available and each will handle classes of from twenty to twenty-five.

The accommodations at the Normal School were taxed to the limit last year, when there was a total enrollment of three hundred and nineteen students, and this year the conditions are even worse on account of the larger attendance. In the assembly hall there are desks for only two hundred and seventy-six students and the others have to occupy settees.

Something will probably be done in the near future towards increasing the accommodations at the Normal School.

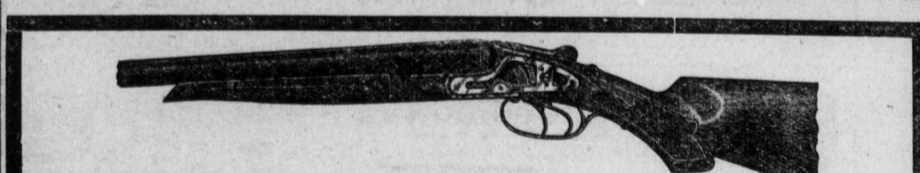
