Also all depts were over crowded last term especially the primary where about two dozen composed one grade. In fact an extra dept. is and has been needed for years. This place always had four schools. The sworn reports to education office of the three departments for a number of years will prove that in matter of percentages and averages Douglastown was usually from 10 to 15 above the most overcrowded dept. in Newcastle and Chatham and even more than any in St. John and Fredericton.

But still with the vain hope of saving 1 cent per capita, per year four schools was crowded into three, and even the sad lesson of overwork, worry and death of one of our most faithful teachers the past year was not enough to teach ratepayers the folly of placing three grades in the hands of one
