CHILD LABOR IN FRANCE.

A foreign contemporary speaks of the sad condition of child laborers in France. For instance, boys at work in cake shops and confection factories in Paris keep at it from 12 to 17 hours a day, and in some cases they are expected to be up all Saturday night preparing for Sunday's work, for the Paris confectioner does most of his business on that day. The children here employed are in almost every case apprentices; not only do they earn nothing, but often a premium of from 100 to 20 francs has been paid in order that they may learn the business. Yet another trade in which boys play a great part is that of printing, and many girl children are employed, at a wage of 16 france (84) a month in all those businesses which concern what may be called the luxury of others.
