Three Years of War

Today witnesses the partial verification of the famous forecast of Earl Kitchener that the war into which Great Britain entered on August 4th, 1914, would last at least three years.

The result of three years of fighting against Prussian militarism makes it abundantly clear that this contest must be fought to a finish, no matter how grave the sacrifices that may be involved.

On an occasion such as this there is a natural tendency to be retrospective, to pass in review events of the period of conflict and from them make deductions and point lessons.

The Allied arms have done well in the past three years, but, frankly, they have not made the progress expected of them at the outset of the war.

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The fact that Kitchener was not altogether an accurate prophet is not brought forward to discredit Britain's greatest warrior but to forcibly draw attention to the task yet before the empire.

the British Empire has not yet succeeded in completing the task on which she entered three years ago. And there is nothing to indicate that task will be ended before many more months of fighting, without sacrifices in comparison with which we have already gone through will appear insignificant.

In such a case it is not of vital necessity that in Canada as elsewhere throughout the Empire, everything should be subordinated to the winning of the war?

Let all Canadians solemnly and thoughtfully ask themselves who stands if Britain falls; who lives if Britain dies? That question alone should determine our future conduct should search the depths of our loyalty and patriotism.
