Sheng Escapes Assassination.

Special Evening Telegram.
PEKIN, To-Day.
Sheng Hsuan, who was removed from office as Minister of Posts and Communications, as a concession to the National Assembly, had a narrow escape from assassination here. He fled to the American legation, from whence he was later escorted by a squad of soldiers to Tien Tsin. It was learned yesterday that a petition had been circulated among the members of the National Assembly for signature, which demanded the decapitation of Sheng. Later the French, German and British ministers, accompanied by the American Charge d'Affairs, drove to the residence of Prince Ching, the Premier, and lodged an objection to the possible decree. In line with the wishes of the Assembly, it is authoritatively announced here and at the instigation of Yuan Shi Kai, negotiations between the Imperialist forces and the revolutionaries are about to open. It is also officially stated that Yuan Shi Kai will recommend Sun Yang Chow to take up the supreme command of the Imperial army and navy at the front. He has also recommended twenty of his former proteges for important positions in the Government.

The Ecumenical Conference of Methodism.

JOTTINGS BY THE WAY.
It was an unspeakably happy privilege that the writer enjoyed in attending the World Wide Conference of Methodism at Toronto, Canada, held October 3-17. Such a gathering of Bishops, Presidents, Editors, Scholars, Pastors, Preachers, Evangelists and Missionaries from all over the world can only occur once or twice in a generation. The object of the Congress was not legislative but purely for purposes of Conference and prayer and counsel. Great men were there and great deliverances on great Methodist problems.
To summarize the results of this great Conference we note the following:—
1. It brought together representative men of Methodism from the ends of the earth to rub up against each other.
2. It afforded an opportunity of reviewing the whole area of Methodism—its doctrines, its missions, its activities, its growth. We have now some 32 million Methodists in the world, a gain of four millions in 10 years.
3. It placed emphasis upon the cardinal teachings of Methodism, showing no disposition to dispense with any of its old-time God-honoured truths and doctrines.
4. It had a federating effect upon all Methodism. It ties thirty millions of people in all parts of the globe to united endeavour for pure government, cleaner and more godly life and activity and consecration. Hereafter there shall be known throughout the world a Methodist Federator which under God shall be a power in breaking the shackles of iniquity, enforcing law and righteousness and spreading Scriptural Holiness throughout these lands. Among the many lives touched in the great discussions at this International Conference of Methodism were the Sabbath and Temperance Reforms. Toronto itself is almost a model in these matters. It is a city of 400,000 with only some 150 saloons. Its Sabbaths are as nearly as ideal as possible. No steamers run, no newspapers are hawked and up to some twenty years ago no street cars were allowed to run. Upon the Sabbath question a strong Resolution was passed urging upon all our people so to order the course of their lives and so use all their influence that God's Holy Day may be preserved for his proper worship and service, and we appeal to the Governments of the Christian States to maintain the sanctity and authority of the Lord's Day which is so essential to the peace and prosperity of the nation." Ex-Governor Hanly in a strong speech on Temperance Reform made a call for consecration. "I want," said he, "world-wide Methodism to become a world-wide militant power for the suppression of this traffic. If I could stir the heart of Methodism on this great question so that every layman would go back a flaming torch for the piercing of the evil."
Bishop Hoss said a good thing when he said "He believed no man should engage in the liquor business unless he could make an honest living by stealing."
On missionary problems some big notes were struck, particularly by John R. Mott who said: "We need discernment among the leaders up and down the world before the day of opportunity slips by," he said. "We needed a larger comprehension of the Imperial character of the great undertaking, which involved nothing less than a reconstruction of the non-

Christian world and the establishment of the Messiah's reign.
"For the first time," Dr. Mott continued, "the Church is ready to take the whole world literally into its plan." The Church was facing the world as a unit. "Under the leadership of this committee we are able to view the world as a whole, and the task as a whole, and the contribution of all parts of the universal Church as a whole." (Hear, hear.)
Passing on, Dr. Mott spoke of the summons to larger efficiency. He likes to think of the committee as the Board of Strategy. He deprecates the 788 divisions in the missionary work of the universal Church. There was something absurd and sinful if he waste involved.
The speaker referred to words spoken at the Conference that they might be some present who would not taste death until the plans of the Continuation Committee were carried out, until "we see the Kingdom of God come in power."
"The Duty of the Hour," was the subject of an address by a British preacher. "It was not," said he, "the glorification of Methodism but that we should be seized of our responsibility. The needs of the hour were: Unbroken fellowship with Christ, prayer and personal consecrated service and devotion to Jesus."
"Woman's Work" was most prominent in the discussion. One lady delegate from England, Miss Wallis, stirred things considerably when she said:—
"We women who have gone into politics have gone into it at the call of God, just as surely as any of you men here in this room have surely gone into your ministry at the call of God. We, too, have answered, often with faltering lip and shrinking heart: 'Here am I, send me.' I have fought these days what a tremendous power is here in this Conference; but surely there is some supreme need. Do we care about that need which we have ever lost our way's sleep because of the sins and sufferings and woes of the world?"
Sunday at the Conference was one of the most notable days Toronto ever saw—beautiful by nature and grace a great Love Feast at 9.30 at which Bishops, Editors, Missionaries, Professors, Judges, Ministers and Lay men told of experimental religion.
At 10.30 Bishop Candler of the M. E. Church, South, preached a great sermon in which he showed no sympathy with modernizing the Gospel. The important thing for Methodists was to get people truly regenerated by the power of God and filled with God's love and save souls. There was no situation and crisis or problem for and for the old people. We had no

problem in our age greater than Paul faced and John Wesley, they met it with the Gospel, we may do the same. At night the preached was Sir Robert W. Perks, Bart., of London, England. He made a plea for world wide Methodist Brotherhood. This was followed by a great open air mass meeting at which the great London Methodist Editor, Scott Lidgett gave a stirring appeal, followed by Ensor Walters, of Sheffield, in another great gospel appeal.
The writer records having spent one of the most momentous Sabbaths of his life. It was grand, sublime, stirring, glorious.


