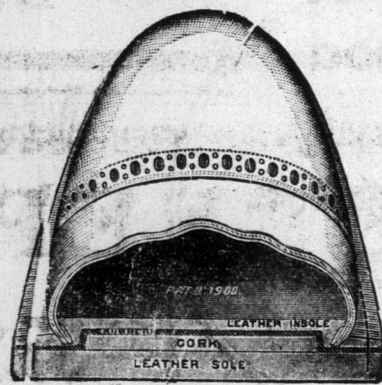

Mongolian Arrives in Port
A ROUGH TRIP.
The R. M. S. Mongolian, Capt. Reith, arrived in port at 9.30 a.m. today from Philadelphia via Halifax. The trip occupied 12 days and was a stormy and eventful one. She left the former port on the 12th instant and at the onset strong head winds were met and slow progress was made. On Saturday last she reached Halifax where the steamer loaded apples, which are now on board for Glasgow. Leaving the Nova Scotian port at 5.30 on Sunday morning last the weather was unusually stormy. After sixty hours the Mongolian got down off Cape Race, which was ten o'clock yesterday morning. Even then the ship was expected to arrive yesterday evening, but a thick fog set in and the ship had to stop steaming. So dense was it that the forecastle head was not discernible from the bridge. Last night the fog lifted a little and the steamer came along slowly. She was off the north coast early this morning, but awaited for daylight to break before entering. She brought 170 tons of cargo and one passenger for here, Miss Buckley. Two intermediate and fourteen steerage passengers, mostly foreigners, are en route to Glasgow. They joined the ship at Halifax being unable to get employment there. The Mongolian sails for Glasgow to-morrow morning.

Congestion of Freight.

There is a big demand for freight accommodation. The S. S. Prospero was fully loaded when she left last week. The S. S. Fogota was chartered. The Reids have all they can do to handle the freight for northern ports. The Newfoundland Produce Co. refused to-day to accept freight for Fogo District presumably because of the balance of the season so plying between this port and Quirpon or Tilt Cove. She is at present laying up; in fact something must be done at once for the ship will be making its appearance within a month along the northern bays. The Government has a duty to perform to the Stella Maris and no doubt see its way to put on the Stella Maris and accommodate the requirements of the people north.

A Schooner Wrecked.

Messrs. Bishop and Sons had a telegram last evening from Gander Bay stating that the schooner Gertie Moores, of 70 tons, Moores master and owner, which left here last week with a cargo of supplies for the mills at Gander Bay and Birch Bay, struck a rock yesterday off Fredericton and may become a total wreck. The cargo—a valuable one—will, it is thought, be a total loss, as most of it was jettisoned to try and get the vessel off. The cargo, which was worth \$5,000, is insured in the Newfoundland Mutual Marine and the vessel is also insured. She was laden by Bishop & Sons.

SHE BROKE DOWN.

A motor boat with five hands on board and which collected a full load of fish at Petty Harbour, Monday, shortly after leaving that place for St. John's broke down. It was stormy at the time and she was in danger of going ashore, when skiffs put off from the Harbour and towed her back. Had the accident occurred later in the day all on board would have been in danger of their lives.

The S. S. Harmony.

Capt. Jackson, arrived here at noon to-day and hove up in the stream. The ship was down on the Labrador coast and had a very rough time if it coming and going with a N. E. gale mostly prevailing, especially on the run south with high seas and snow most of the time. The ship brought along 4,000 qts. cod-fish, 400 lbs. trout, oil and skins, and will leave here next week for London. Her passengers were Revs. Harvey and Bothman, missionaries, who are returning home. She reports that winter has set in on the Northern Labrador and most of the harbours are frozen over while the country is covered with snow.

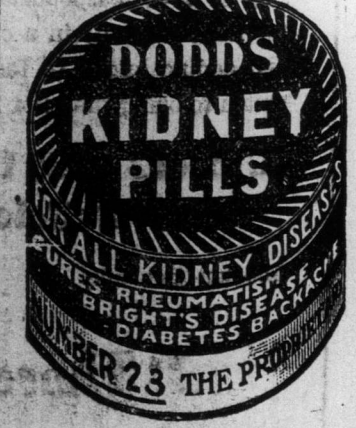
