Junior L.S.P.U.

To-night the President and Executive of the L.S.P.U. will meet at their hall to form a boys' branch of the Union and they hope that all the boys in the city who are at work on wharves or at any kind of manual labor will be present. In a conversation with President J. McGrath, which the Telegram had yesterday afternoon that gentleman said that the object of the formation of such a union was to improve the boys physically, morally and intellectually. In the first place it is hoped to impress the authorities with the necessity of making laws to prohibit boys of immature years from engaging in any kind of hard labor and the age to which such prohibition would apply would be 15 years and under. The idea is also to ensure that boys over that age and at work on wharves and other places a decent living wage, and to obviate labor of a character beyond their physical powers. Mr. McGrath says that the L.S.P.U. has a large hall, portions of which are unused and it is the intention if possible to start a night school for boys during the long fall and winter months so that they can at least receive a rudimentary education. Many working boys have already expressed their willingness to join and it is expected a large number will be present to-night.

Methodist S.S. Institute

The Meth. S. S. workers of this city purpose having a S. S. Institute in the basement of Gower St. Church on Wednesday next, June 4th. The event is unique in Meth. S. S. history here, nothing of the kind so far as we know ever having been attempted in the city before. The Institute is a miniature one-day convention, with less speaking and more discussion than is usual at a regular convention. Workers from the four Meth. Sunday Schools are the accredited delegates but the Institute will be open to any friends interested in Sunday School work in the city. The plan is to hold three sessions: from 10 to 12.30; from 2.30 to 5.30, and from 8 to 9.30. Papers from active S. S. workers in the city will be read, and discussions covering all the various phases and S. S. work will take place. Rev. T. B. Darby, S. S. Secretary of the Carbonear District, has kindly consented to be present, and give us the benefit of his experience. An interesting feature will be a Round Table conference to take place at 4 p.m. while the platform meeting at night will be one of more than ordinary interest. It is hoped that a great rally of S. S. workers and others interested, will serve to make this a day long to be remembered. The Sunday School is the institution of the modern church, and nothing that concerns its efficiency can lightly be dismissed.—Com.

Trouble at Trepassey.

We learn from people who arrived from Trepassey within the past couple of days, that the people there have kicked and kicked hard against the track running over the beach without compensation being given them by arbitration or otherwise. The people on the beach as their property and turned out en masse one day last week refusing to allow the rails to be laid over it until some settlement had been made with them. We also hear that shortly the Premier and Mr. Devereaux will proceed to Trepassey to try and adjust matters.

N.E. Gale at Trinity.

Within the past four or five days a violent north east gale was experienced. The storm began on Friday last and abated yesterday. In consequence no fishing was done as boats were unable to get on the grounds owing to the heavy sea raging. While the gale lasted the weather was intensely cold. The fishery is poor at present. The scarcity of bait is the cause.

Bank Fishery Poor.

A report from Burin to the Board of Trade, says that only one banker the Ada D. Bishop has arrived. The prospects for the codfishery along the shore are very poor, there being no bait supply. The total catch to date is 2,850 quintals, 2,100 of which were caught in the early spring on the Western Shore by four bankers. No dories or skiffs are now fishing.

End of Strike.

The Presidents of the different Unions met last night and discussed the outstanding dispute between the girls of Parker & Monroe's Factory who came out on strike and those who didn't. After a lengthy debate the dispute was amicably settled and when the factory, which was damaged by fire, resumes operations, each employee will go back to the work in which they were formerly engaged.

Trying For Griquet.

Last night the accompanying message was received from the s.s. Prospero at Conche:—

"Large body of ice from Horse Island all along the coast, but loose close by the shore; called at all ports. Prospero hit by flags flying and guns firing at every port; tedious getting along, but so far everything O.K. Will try and reach Griquet."

City of Sydney From Montreal.

The s.s. City of Sydney, Captain McDonald, seven days from Montreal, via Gulf ports, reached port at nine o'clock this morning. The ship called at Charlottetown, Summerside and Sydney. From the latter port the run was made in thirty-four hours. She brought a full freight and the following passengers in saloon: Mr. and Mrs. Knight, Messrs. McDougall, McDonald, E. Klesley, Wheeler, Holt and Gladford and three in steerage.

Home's Report.

The S. S. Home, Capt. Harbin, arrived at Lewisporte at 4.50 p.m. yesterday. Her report is as follows:—
"Made every port south to Lewisporte and got beyond St. John's; bay still blocked with ice; impossible to get north."

Here and There

SAILS SATURDAY.—The s.s. Fogota, which goes on the dry dock tomorrow, will get her propeller blades fixed and will sail south Saturday.

Mr. McDougall, Asst. Manager of the Dominion Iron and Steel Company, at Wabana, is a passenger from Montreal by the s.s. City of Sydney, to-day.

FINISHES LANDING.—The s.s. Glenby finishes unloading her salt cargo this afternoon. She sails to-night for Cape Torres to load deal for Bristol.

NEW FOX FARM.—A new fox farm is being started by two Nova Scotians who have purchased a site on the South Side of Carbonear. They have already commenced the building.

SCRRS. ICEBOUND.—A number of vessels have been detained at Shoe Cove. They are unable to get north owing to the ice blockade at Cape John.

BANKER OFF.—The schrs. Gertrude, with 500 quintals of fish on board, taken on her last trip, sailed yesterday for the Grand Banks. She baited at Salmonier.

VISITING BRANCH.—Mr. H. D. Reid, in the private car Terra Nova, arrived here at 7 p.m. yesterday. Mr. Reid was out along the Heart's Content Branch inspecting the line.

FIRST FRESH WATER SALMON.—The first salmon to be taken from inland waters was captured yesterday at South Branch. There were two fish, which weighed 8 and 10 lbs.

BUYING MORE COD.—Another large American schooner arrived at Rose Blanche, Monday past, and is purchasing a cargo of salt bulk fish. She is owned by the Gorton Fish Co. and the fishermen are getting \$6 per cwt. for their catch.

SALMON PLENTIFUL.—To-day as well as yesterday the city market was well stocked with salmon from Outer Cove, Torbay, Portugal Cove, Broad Cove and Blackhead. The price was 10 cents in some parts of the city, but at other places it sold for as low as 9 cents per lb.

WHALES PLENTIFUL.—The reports from LaSalle received yesterday stated that whales were plentiful there as well as herring and whitefish. The belief is that the big fish are after the bait and that if whalers were about good fares would be secured. The Cachalot is now almost ready and will be dispatched to that section.

FISHERMEN LEAVE.—By the express yesterday evening about 170 men, the fishing crews of Mr. Whiteley left here to proceed to the Straits where they will fish the coming summer. The men left for Humbermouth and will take the Meigle going to Bonne Esperance. The fishery will likely commence earlier this year than last.

LOAFERS AT LARGE.—Nightly a gang of fellows who are "lovers" of work, congregate in a forge on Bartera Hill to the annoyance of residents who fear that a fire will be the outcome. Last year the police visited this spot, found a goodly supply of liquor and arrested a quartette who got six months each.
