Sprinkling the Streets.

Reids' Boats.

The Argyle sails from Placentia this afternoon on the Mercedes route. The Bruce arrived at Port aux Basques at 6.15 a.m. to-day. The Clyde left Botwood at 4 p.m. yesterday, outward. The Dundee left Port Blandford at 6.45 a.m. to-day. The Ethie left Clarendville at 7.35 a.m. to-day. The Glencoe left Belleoram at 6.20 p.m. yesterday, going west. The Home left Lewisporte early this morning. The Invermore is still north of Twillingate. The Kyle arrived in port from the Labrador route at 1 p.m. to-day. The Lintrose leaves North Sydney to-night. The Meigle left Daniel's Harbor at 4.35 p.m. yesterday, going north.

Sagona Sails.

The S.S. Sagona Capt. Kennedy, sails at 3 p.m. from this port for Twillingate when she will take up her new route, proceeding as far north as Cook's Harbor and returning via the same ports to Twillingate, and thence to St. John's. The service is not a regular one, and no definite schedule has been arranged, but it is expected that, with favorable weather, the trip will occupy about 12 days. Fishery Reports.

The latest fishery reports at the places mentioned hereunder are:—
(Belleoram to Rencontre East).
The total catch is 8,750 quintals with 150 for last week. Two traps are in the water. There is a decided improvement with traps and codnets, and plenty of caplin for bait. The lobster fishery shows no improvement. The traps took from 2 to 15 quintals daily during last week but there is not much doing with hook and line.

(Cape Race to St. Shott's.)

One banker has arrived and fifteen schooners from the grounds. Prospects are very good; the best for some years. There is plenty of caplin but lobsters are scarce and only one factory is working. The men report very good prospects with cod, and think the coming week with favorable weather good hauls will be taken. Two boats, 69 dories and skiffs and 30 traps are fishing. The total catch is 350 quintals.

(Rose Blanche to Petites.)

Prospects are fairly good and caplin plentiful. Six schooners have returned. The lobster fishery is very poor. Several boats, skiffs with one dory each, returned from Cape Breton ports and had about 35 quintals for each dory for three weeks' fishing. The total catch is 1,270 and for last week, 340. Sixteen dories and skiffs are fishing.

(Blanc Sablon to Forteau.)

Caplin is plentiful and prospects are very good. The total catch is 400 quintals. Twenty-two traps are out and thirty dories and skiffs fishing. The fish struck here on Monday, June 29th. It is yet too early to give any definite opinion of the voyage. The ice is all gone.

(Lance au Loup to Red Bay.)

Prospects are very bright and there is plenty of caplin. Two traps set on the 3rd got a boat load of fish each and the few trawls set are getting from 30 to 70 large fish every haul. Fine weather is favoring operations.

Undesirable Characters

Last night a ne'er-to-do-well who holds an unenviable record in police circles, fell over Goodridge's wharf, while under the influence and would have been drowned but for the timely assistance of the watchman who rescued him at great personal risk.

The ungrateful creature, when brought to the police station where he received dry clothing, became profane and with a volume of oaths denounced the person who effected his rescue for in death.

While he was thus pouring out his vile language, his pal, a disreputable character, who was recently discharged from the Penitentiary after doing sentence for a serious offence, was also brought in. He, too, gave utterance to profanity that has no parallel in the history of the police station. When arrested he had a large quantity of liquor on his person, and considering that he is a cripple and apparently has no visible means of existence the persons who supplied him with the liquor are deserving of censure.

Both of them appeared in court to-day, the former for the fifth time within the past month. He was sentenced to one month's imprisonment, and the latter, who only a month ago finished a long term of imprisonment for atrocious assault, will get his deserts this afternoon.

Market Endangered.

Appended is a copy of a letter just received by the Board of Trade from Lind and Conto, of Oporto:—"For some considerable time our market has been quite bare of British cure and this has given a tremendous impulse to Norwegian, Iceland and German cures which are now in general consumption all over the country. From a British point of view this is much to be regretted, and we fear it will be difficult to recover the lost ground in the face of the lower tariff accorded to competing cures which all pay at the rate of 24 reis per kilo against 39 reis per kilo on the British article."

Visit of H. R. H. the Duke of Connaught, Wednesday, 15th July, 1914. With His Excellency the Governor of Newfoundland, Sir Walter E. Davidson, K.C.M.G.

ARRANGEMENTS.
10.20 a.m.—H. R. H. the Duke of Connaught arrives with His Excellency the Governor; guard of honour of Catholic Cadet Corps; met at entrance by Chairman, Hon. W. C. Job, and Chairman of Committees, Hon. R. Watson, Honorary Treasurer, Mr. J. A. Paddon, and the Secretary; presentations will be made by the Governor; the Secretary will present the Superintendent of the Institute; Directors of the Grenfell Association of Newfoundland and members of the various committees will be in the Grenfell Hall and be introduced to H. R. H. by the Governor.

10.30—View of the Grenfell Hall; point out the Royal portraits sent by their Majesties; see billiard room; pass along entrance hall to restaurant, looking at kitchen; see reading room; go up main staircase to 1st floor; see reading room and library; look at a bedroom and Royal Naval room.

10.40—H. R. H. the Governor and the Secretary go up by lift to Girls' Department; the Governor presents Mrs. W. C. Job, President of the Ladies' Auxiliary, who will present the Committee, the Secretary and Matron of the Department; see dining room and the view; kitchen, bedroom; H. R. H. declare the new extension open for use of girls; descend by lift.

Arrival of Carson.

Special to Evening Telegram. BELFAST, To-day.

Full military honours were accorded by the Ulster Volunteers to-day to Carson, when he arrived, accompanied by Marquis of Londonderry, Viscount Castlereagh, Walter H. Long, and Ronald MacNeill and other Unionist members of Parliament to attend the meeting of the Ulster Provisional Government. The guard of honour was composed of 400 armed volunteers. Fifty armed motor cycle despatch riders escorted the leader to the residence of Capt. James Craik, military leader, where they will remain for a week. The intentions of the Provisional Government have not been disclosed but one object of the meeting is the arrangement for the impressive celebration of the twelfth of July, in order to show the Government and people of Great Britain that nothing but absolute exclusion of Ulster from the operations of the Irish Home Rule Bill will satisfy us. As one prominent Ulsterman put it the Government is uneasy as to the outcome of the celebration. Major General Sir Cecil Macready in command of the militia in Belfast district, has been in conference with Asquith on the situation. Police have been instructed to act with great care so as to give no excuse for an outbreak.
