

## Foretold by Dreams.

On November 24th last, Mr. James Sapienza, a prosperous builder, of Princeton, New Jersey, went to bed as usual.

In the night he had a very bad dream. He imagined that a "Black and Tan" assassin was entering his room, dagger in hand, intent on murder. It should be mentioned that Sapienza had already received letters from this abominable secret society, demanding money under threats of death.

Recovering from the nightmare analysis of horror, Sapienza seized a revolver, which he kept by his bedside, and fired at the intruder. There was a dreadful scream, and he awoke in a moment, the unfortunate man realized that he had killed his beloved wife.

## Due to Sleep-Walking?

Such cases are rare, yet not completely unknown. In March, 1908, a man named Hollis, who lived in Washington, was guilty of a similar conscious crime. Hollis had been sleepwalker from childhood, and, as so many Americans, kept a revolver in his bedroom.

Very early in the morning his wife awoke to attend to her youngest child, who had wakened and was crying. As she returned into the room, Hollis sat up suddenly and fired. Mrs. Hollis' mother, who slept in a room across the landing, heard the shot, and came running. She was just in time to catch her daughter in her arms. "Hugh shot me," whispered the poor woman, and died.

Hollis, after firing the shot, dropped back upon his pillow, and it took some minutes to rouse him. When found what he had done, he became nearly frantic with remorse, and endeavored to shoot himself. One morning in the spring of 1913, the mother of a fine young engineer, of Doncaster, named Fred Rustle, found her son hanging from a leather strap attached to the head of his bed. He was quite dead. Young Rustle was one of the best of men with his family and friends; he had no troubles, there was absolutely no reason either in his surroundings or his nature for him to have laid violent hands on himself. More than that, his mother, going into his room at 10 or 11 o'clock, had seen him peacefully asleep.

## Seen On the Screen.

Now, Thrustle had been a sleeper since childhood, and after a thorough investigation by the coroner, much medical evidence, it became very certain that the poor young man had hanged himself in his sleep—in all probability, as the result of a dream.

There is another case of the sort, lately with a less tragic ending. A Leeds girl, named Nellie Robinson, aged fourteen, was taken to a cinema show, where she was greatly interested by the adventure of a girl who escaped through a high window.

She went home and to bed. Early the morning her mother was roused by a sound of moaning outside the door. She got up, looked out of her window, and saw a little white buntings on the ground below. It was Nellie in an exhausted state, with her thigh broken and one wrist dislocated.

Nellie herself says she knows nothing of what happened until she awoke herself lying on the ground in pain. But there seems little doubt that, in a dream, she was imitating the part of the girl who was opening her window, fell out in the yard.

There is a story of a boy who had a thrilling adventure in his sleep. A Steamer, of Rodham, Kent was sailing to New York in the big Star Line, Oceanic.

At 3.30 on a Sunday night, Dr. J. J. one of the ship's surgeons, heard screams, and discovered Steele lying on the outside of a port hole cabin.

"I'm going! Help! I'm going!" he shrieked. The quarter-master made a running line, skillfully swung it under the feet, round his body, and so hoisted him up. Jack had been given to sleep-walking, and here again it was a dream that he climbed out of his cabin and so nearly lost his life.
