PRISONER ADMITTED TO BAIL. North Sydney, Oct. 12 .- Intense interest was manifested at the preliminary hearing of Duncan Macdonald, which commenced yesterday morning in the court house, at 11 o'clock before Stipendiary Archibald. Long before the hour set for the trial, groups of men gathered together and discussed the case, and in every instance while deep regret was expressed over the tragic affair, universal sympathy went out to the young prisoner, one of whose chiliren died this morning.

The court room was crowded. D. A. Cameron, representing the defence, spent a short time in consultation with his client. The latter, however, was not brought up from his cell, as Crown Prosecutor Carroll was not present. D. D. Mc-Kenzie, acting for the crown, was also present, and waited patiently for the arrival of Mr. Carroll. Finally the attorneys for the prosecution and defence agreed to adjourn the hearing until 2 o'clock when it was expected Mr. Carroll would be

Missourl-particularly the Ozark hills—furnish the greater part of and \$10.50 pair. Best value in the wood used in making lead pencils. town. Though many other varieties have been tried none has proved as satisfactory as the red cedar. The cedars

grow on the rocky hillsides tall through the White River district of Missouri. They are small, stunted trees, seldom reaching a diameter of more than a foot at the butt. At the mill the logs are first cut lengthwise by circular saws into planks. These are cut into right lengths for lead pencils, and those chuncks go into the hands of men who, with circular saws. rip them up into what are called "slats." Only the red heart of the log is used. The white sapwood is thrown away. The slats are bound in bundles and sent to New York, where th greater part are worked up into lead pencils and the remainder goes to lead pencil factories in Europe.
