Protests From Overseas Don't Disturb Labor

MACDONALD MINISTRY UNMOVED
IN DETERMINATION TO CARRY
OUT BUDGET.

LONDON, April 30.—(British United Press).—The Labor government is not at all disturbed by the already arriving protests from the Dominions against its jettison of the Imperial Preference principle as indicated in yesterday's budget speech. The prospect of loss to the Canadian motor industry through the abrogation of the McKenna tariffs finds it politically regretful but unmovable in its determination.

"We do not believe in tariffs as a permanent bond of Empire," says Chancellor Snowden, and unquestionably the cabinet are unanimous to support. They are convinced that free trade is right in principle and that it is good for Britain in practice. They believe also that the British Empire cannot persist as a peaceful influence in the world if it acquiesces in antagonism and distrust by creating barbed wire tariff entanglements around its red patches on the map.

On the tariff question by itself the Liberal party is solid in support of the Snowden budget. On the preferential point with its involved repudiation of the Imperial conference agreements, the Liberals are divided to some extent, and the Conservatives, of course, will unanimously fight the Labor proposals on the grounds of good faith as well as of good business.

There is no doubt, however, that the budget as a whole will pass and neither is there any doubt of its popularity among the people. To an extent which will compel the quickening of another issue between the parties before the opposition will dare to invite a general election.

The Conservative leaders are waiting some decisive socialist steps. They believe that some plan of a preference is essential to the continuance of the Empire, but recognize its lack of appeal to the home voters.

They believe also that socialist policies mean not only imperial dissolution but disaster at home. They are hoping for a campaign that will combine both issues. The government, however, is dealing the cards.

Tsao Kun's Presidency Due to His Loud Snore

CHINESE, TALE OF NEW PRESIDENT TELLS HOW PENNILESS DRIFTER LEFT HAUSTACK FOR THE ARMY.

With the accession of Tsao Kun to the presidency of China, the usual crop of fantastic stories purporting to account for the rise of any notable figure has appeared, not the most fantastic being one obtained from native sources in Tsao's own province of Chihli.

According to this account, Tsao's enlistment and subsequent rapid advancement as a soldier in the armies of the old Manchu dynasty would have been impossible but for his snoring snore.

Tsao, originally, was a cloth merchant apprentice, having been put into that service by a father, noted for his stern disposition, the story goes. Becoming proficient, he was provided with a barrow and stock of goods wherewith to make rounds among prospective buyers and chafered keenly with the housewives of neighbouring villages. He was discontented with this prosaic occupation, however, and sought solace for the pangs it caused his adventurous spirit by engaging in escapades which failed to find his father's approval.

The parent, cast young Tsao adrift and the lad, bethinking himself of a career that would supply his demand for activity and color, sought to enlist at a military camp not many miles from his home. He was rejected because of inability to provide a proper guarantor. Although despondent, he was determined not to return to his family and sheltered himself in a haystack, where he fell asleep.

An officer from the camp, strolling through the vicinity, heard the lusty evidences of Tsao's slumber and roused him unceremoniously. In response to the officer's inquiry as to why such a robust young man should be sleeping the day away, Tsao told his story of eviction from home and rejection by the recruiting officials.

The officer, became interested, used influence to obtain the waiving of the necessary guarantor in Tsao's case, and the youth enlisted. His rapid grasp of military matters impressed his superiors and sensational military career culminating in Tsao's advancement to the highest ranks and elevation to the presidency, followed.

"Strong" Tide

TIDE IS BLAMED FOR COLLECTION OF BOOZE BOTTLES IN HARBOR.

SAN PEDRO, Cal., April 29.—The term "mean," high tide, over which there are periodic wrangles in the courts, has been given a novel and literal interpretation in police court here.

Thomas Mitchell, 70-year-old ship's carpenter, who lives in a boathouse along the Wilmington water front, told the magistrate that booze bottles bobbing up in quantity in the vicinity of his marine abode had been washed there by the "meanest" high tide ever heard of in all his nautical experience.

The retort of members of the harbor dry squad who made the arrest was that if a reasonable excuse could be advanced for the congregation of the floating bottles, the case might not be dropped.

Berlin's Birthrate Declines

BERLIN, April 14.—(A.P.)—Births in Berlin fell to 28,551 in 1923, as against 76,665 in 1913. This decline is having a great effect on the public schools. The number of children entering the lowest classes in 1923 was only 51,000, in 1919 the number of first-year pupils was 69,000.

Berlin's births numbered 51,997 in 1919; in 1920 they rose to 62,614, but in 1922 sank to 45,686, and a year later fell to 33,551.
