THE SUGAR DEPRESSION.

Big Crop Responsible for Low Prices

—Producing Companies Cannot

Have Satisfactory Year.

BOSTON, May 5.—The drooping

sugar share market is not difficult to

explain. The plain fact of the matter

is that the weight of a largely in-

creased Cuban crop is pressing upon

the sugar market, with the result that

Cuban raws at New York, duty paid,

are selling at 4.27 cents as compared

with 6.28 cents this time a year ago,

a reduction of 2 cents a pound. Where-

as duty paid raws sold up as high as

7.41 cents in 1924, the high this year

to date is 4.84 cents and the low is

the present market of 4.27 cents.

Naturally refined sugar has par-

alleled the price of raws. At present

refined is quoted at 5.70 cents, with

one refiner shading this price by a

tenth of a cent. The high for refined

this year to date is 6.75 cents, while

for 1924 the extreme were 8.90 cents

high and 6.35 cents low.

On the 183 factories grinding cane

in Cuba this season 177 are still work-

ing. It is believed that the final out-

turn will come not far from the Guina-

Mejer estimate of 4,925,000 tons, which

would compare with 4,666,645 tons

last year and 2,602,910 tons the year

before that. Taken in conjunction

with the fact that the world produc-

tion of sugar this year is put at a

figure nearly 3,000,000 tons greater

than last year, or 2,723,433 tons as

against 19,745,388 tons, it will be seen

that it is a buyer's market in sugar.

Holders of sugar stocks seem to be

keenly appreciative of the situation.
