## Finals in the Big Bospiel Beginning to Loom up

Yesterday was the half way point of the bospiel and the finals are beginning to loom up in the distance. Three more days, and the best spiel of the Alberta branch will be at an end.

It is early in the different competitions to pick the winners, with the exception of the Grand Challenge. In that competition the majority of games were played on the first two days of the spiel. At present the games are running in the Burns' trophy.

There were a few surprises from the results of yesterday's games to the wise ones, the chief ones being the defeat of Pingle in the Walker's villa competition by Kenny of Macleod. In the Grand Challenge the three Lethbridge rinks are playing a great game, up to the time of the draw standing 17 wins to two defeats, which is a very creditable showing for Messrs. Bruce, McLeod and Kenny.

After the eight p.m. draw the committee decided to cut the games down to 10 ends a game instead of 12, as the putting on of new competitions would have kept the game going until some time in the next week, which did not look good to many of the visiting curiers.

They also decided to play all night to make up time lost on account of bad ice. Drives have been made for 2 a.m. and 5 a.m. Two new competitions started yesterday, the Visitors and the District.

A very close game was that of Peterson vs. "Skidoo" Stephenson. It was even all and any person's game up to the last end, when a good shot by Stephenson's rink gave them one up on the last end; score 11 to 10.

The ice was greatly improved on the previous days, being crisp, and it was kept in first class condition by the attendants. In the Grand Challenge the following have managed to scrape through to the eighth class: Skips Walker (Calgary), Pingle (Medicine Hat), Bruce (Lethbridge), Vincent (Calgary).

Every curier has a keen desire to see the kids (Vincent, skip) pull something out of the competition. Mr. Kermer's rink has reached the Grand Challenge fourth and are wearing happy smiles.

The Walkerville competition is narrowing down and should produce some very fine games. Skips in the eighth are Messrs. Walker (Calgary), Kenny (Lethbridge), Kearns (Maple Creek), Miquelon (Calgary), Trimble (Lacombe), Welliver (Red Deer).

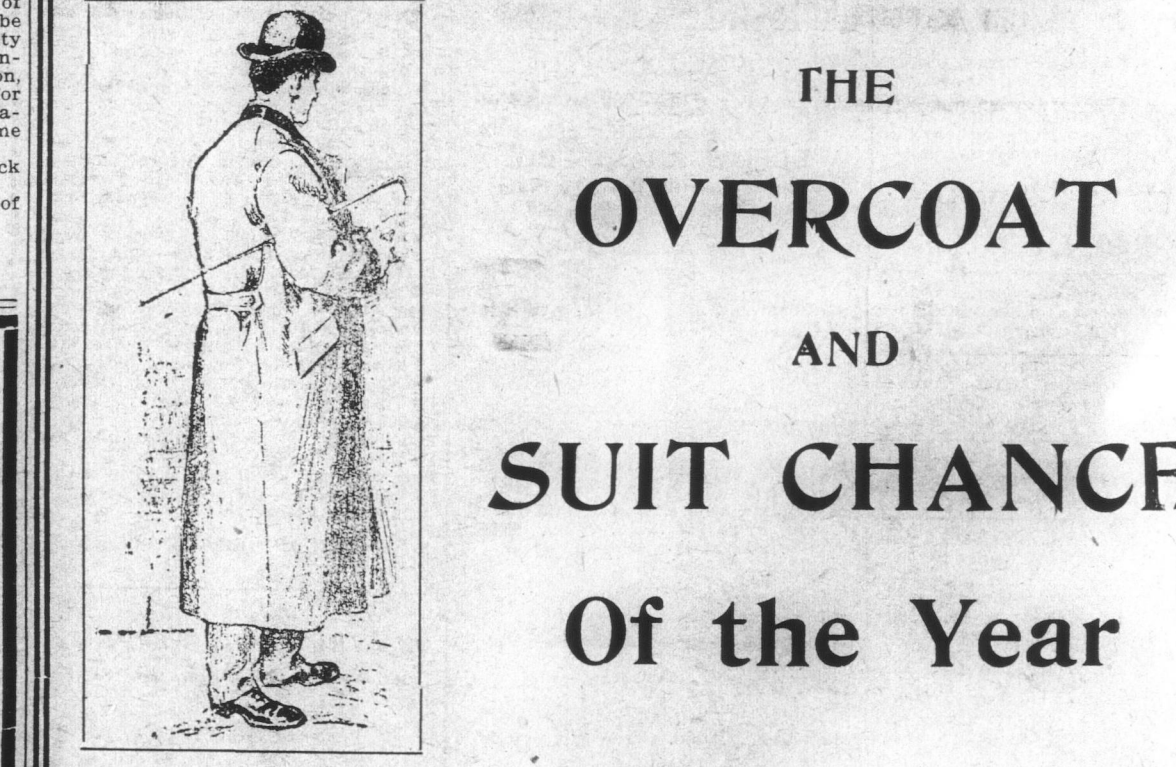
