INTERCHANGE OF OPINION
BETWEEN BRITAIN AND COLONIES

Without That There Cannot be Union
in Any Real Sense

London, April 29.—Speaking at the press fund dinner last night Lord

Crowe, secretary of State for the colonies, said that unless there could be regular daily interchange of opinion and merely on great events, but on everyday events between Great Britain and Overseas Dominions, he did not believe that anything like the union of Empire could ever be achieved. It was the privilege of the press, he added, to play the first principal part in bringing about this union.

Naples, April 28.—Although the police continue their energetic investigation into the drowning of Miss Estelle Reid, the American art student, whose body was found on the seashore here a week ago, they believe that her death was due either to an accident or suicide.

MILLIONAIRE WHO IS
FORCED TO BE BACHELOR

Says he has Never Been Able to Win a
Wife for Himself and Not For
His Wealth.

St. Louis, April 28.—At last the secret of E. H. R. Green's bachelorhood is out. Forty years old, and a confirmed bachelor, he declares the only reason he has never married is that he has found it impossible to disguise himself and live incognito, so that he might win a maid for himself alone and not for the millions.

"The problem of marriage," said the heir to half of Hetty Green's immense fortune, "does not lie as heavily on the mind of a poor man as it does on a rich one. The poor man has at least the most comforting thought that he is the loved head of the household and not the treasury vault."

"The proposition is no small one, I tell you. There is not a rich man in America who has not had dozens of chances to marry into families of birth and breeding, but he must seek the inner recesses of the other party's soul and find if her affections ring true."

"What a fine thing it would be if a man burdened with wealth could eliminate the million side of his personality and flit away for a year, how gratifying it would be if he could, like other men—the men of the market place and the shops and the factories—get a girl that wanted him. There's a whole lot in that. Then, when he had won a wife by mutual choice, the money would be no objection."

"But you can't do it. Several years ago I was in Yokohama and I went to a hotel without registering. No one was supposed to know me except possibly my name. I went to my room and it was not three hours until a foreign correspondent was admitted and asked why I was there. That man was a former schoolmate of mine, and you run across old acquaintances all over the world, all this outside of the fact that your millionaire name may be in the papers, frequently with pictures to boot."

NEW ERA ON IN MILWAUKEE

Socialists Begin Active Redemption of
Campaign Pledges.

Milwaukee, Wis., April 28.—The new Milwaukee city administration has had four days in office and here are some of the things already started by the Socialist Democrats:

Forcing the electric railway system to use the tracks of the Chicago and Milwaukee interurban line across a downtown viaduct to shorten the time of service between the south side of the city and the rest of the town.

The establishment of a corps of city plumbers to force down the prices charged by contractors. When leaks in the city water pipes are reported this city plumbing office will do the work and charge it at a cost price against the taxes on the property where the repairs are made. An ordinance is being drawn to make this change.

A war upon slums.

A single expert is being sought to take the place of the present three man board of public works. An outside municipal engineer will be selected, probably, to take the place as well of the present city engineer, whose salary

is \$4,000. The three commissioners salary is \$2,500 each.

An outside expert is being looked for to take the office of health commissioner.

The city's free law department is being put in shape to give free advice to the poor. The city attorney already is being called upon for advice, but has not been able to get the new bureau in working order yet.

Mayor Refuses Lecture Offers.

Mayor Seidel has refused to go out for chautauque lectures, though offered \$250 a night, the price paid La Follette and Bryan. He says his great criticism of the previous mayor was that he lectured outside of the city, and he does not purpose to lay himself open to the same criticism.

The city hall employees have been notified that their hours will be eight a day, from 8 a.m. to noon, and from 1:30 to 5:30 p.m. Hitherto they have been about six hours, nine to noon, and 2 to 5 p.m.

In addition to these accomplishments the mayor is planning to carry out further his platform pledges. Not the least important is the plan to establish free Saturday night dances in the schools, to take the place of the saloon dances now common.

"This dance hall question has been thrust upon me," said Mayor Seidel, "and I must take action at once. I have had several applications for permits for such dances, and have issued none of them, although I did not deny them. I merely told the applicants to call again."

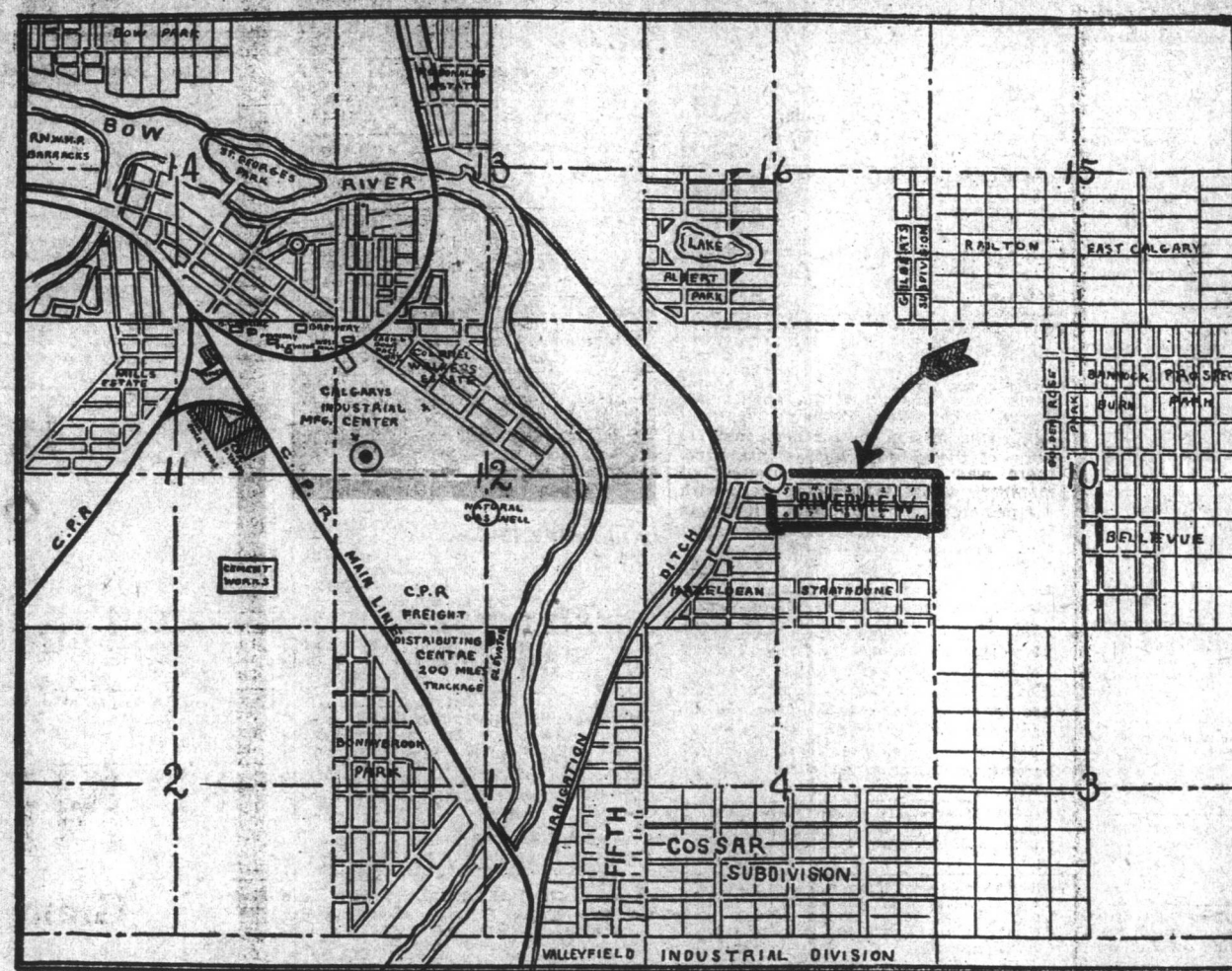
Dances are Menace at Best.

"At best the Saturday night dances are held in small dingy halls, places which are a menace to health. There is no ventilation, and practically all the halls are located near saloons. The police will not allow a dance to be held in a hall directly connected with a saloon, but when they are near saloons there is certain to be more or less drinking."

"How much better it would be if we could get all these people together in large, well lighted halls. I will try to do this through the school board. I am certain we could obtain women, capable of handling girls, to act as chaperones and men could be found to look after the boys, for boys will be boys. Sufficient music at least as good as is provided in the smaller dance halls could be obtained at little cost. I do not like to stop the old fashioned dances unless I find a substitute. I realize that many a hard working boy or girl looks forward the entire week to fun on Saturday night
