—A Brantford special says: The civic authorities have tried in vain to arrange an interview with President Sir Henry Tyler re the city's offer of \$100,000 for the car shops. Either messages have not reached their destination or seemingly have been ignored.

—Instructions have been given to corporation foremen to report all men under them who are considered to be poor workmen.

—E. C. Jenkins, of London, and J. G. Heiter, of Aylmer, have purchased the Erie Lodge, Port Burwell, from F. A. Ashbaugh. [St. Thomas Journal.]

—A considerable delay in the work of sewer repairs and waste of water was caused Wednesday by the breaking of a waterworks main on Talbot street, near Carling.

—The season of fresh, juicy fruits from the orchards will soon be over for the year, but the season of fresh, juicy oysters from the salt seas is here. The oyster crop promises to be generous, as the fruit crop has been.

—Among the places voted on Wednesday in Detroit for the next biennial session of the Supreme Court of the Independent Order of Foresters was this city. Foresters, St. John, N. B., St. Paul and Chicago. Chicago voted the cake.

—The Joe Milton made her last trip from Cleveland on Monday in seven and a half hours. Her initial lake season has been a prosperous one, and the lake trips will become more and more popular from year to year.

Two city lads, William and Richard Lamb, aged 12 and 10 years respectively, accompanied the artillery on Tuesday to St. Thomas. The police were communicated with and the boys were found at the camp and sent home.

—Rev. Father Brennan has been permanently stationed as pastor of St. Basil's Church in Toronto. He has been stationed in this city about a year, and carries with him the esteem and affection of a large number of friends and parishioners.

—Wm. Sicily, of London West, was arraigned before Squires Owey and Lacey yesterday charged with assaulting and robbing Alfred Gardner, of the same place, one night last week. The case was not finished at the hour of going to press.

—Wednesday a man was arrested drunk and asleep in a lumber yard at the rear of the Technion Hotel. He was hauled out, and when he appeared at the police station yesterday he wished to know what he had given his name as when arrested.

—The Oak Hall bicycle given to the person guessing the exact number of leaves contained in a glass jar was won by W. S. Pugsley, 76 York street, city. Some 600 guesses were handed in and the lucky guess was 12,960. The jar contained 12,877 leaves.

—The sale of the books at the exhibition grounds for the Western Fair took place Wednesday afternoon. Thirty were sold at prices ranging from \$15 to \$25. There are still six small booths and three large ones, which the secretary will sell by private sale.

—The Marland-Clark Company, which performed here recently, and which was reported a few days ago as stranded in Hamilton, is persistent in its endeavors to keep aloft, and friends of members of the company will be pleased to know that they are meeting with good success in Guelph, while they build for this week.

—The special committee of the City Council which was to report on the extras for the Central Fire Hall did not hold the intended meeting Wednesday afternoon, as a quorum could not be obtained. No. 8 Committee of the Council was to have met last evening, but a sufficient number to make a quorum did not put in an appearance.

—At the London West Council meeting Reeve Platt, Deputy Searrow, Councilors Spence and Collins and Clerk Milton were in attendance. Fred Ellis was the low bidder for building sidewalks and received the contract. Accounts were passed, and an adjournment was made until Tuesday next, when bylaws to open new streets will be submitted.

—While two of the sisters of St. Joseph were outdriving Wednesday near the Roman Catholic Cemetery their horse became unmanageable and ran away. Both were thrown out, and one of them was very badly hurt. They were taken into the cottage at the cemetery and cared for by Mrs. Gleason, the caretaker's wife, after which they were conveyed to Mount Hope.

—Mr. and Mrs. L. H. Ingram were not very agreeably surprised on their return from their ocean trip to find that during their absence their house had been entered and a large quantity of cutlery and other valuable small wares and jewelry stolen. The theft was cleverly executed and concealed, as to those passing from day to day no indication was given that burglary had been committed.

—Henry Johnson, the man who was recently fined for trespassing on the G. T. R. at Hamilton, whose fine was paid by the City Council and to whom a pass to London was given in order that he might join his wife here, was reported by the Toronto Word to have been employed as cook in the Griggs House. This, however, is denied. No such man has been employed at this house. His wife is a myth.

—The case of Nellie Jacoby, convicted a week ago of keeping a house of ill-repute, was finally disposed of by the police magistrate this morning. The woman begged to be permitted to go to her roots at Lockport, New York, and take her daughter with her. She was sentenced to one year in the Mercer Reformatory, and her 11-year-old daughter Nellie will be sent to the Industrial School at Mimico.

Prosecuting Letter Carriers.
Those in the city and elsewhere who have objected to paying more than 1-cent postage on drop city-letters will be interested to know that the Postmaster-General has caused a writ to be issued against the G. N. W. Telegraph Company and the Henderson Delivery Company, of Melinda street, Toronto, claiming damages for infringement of the act respecting letter carrying. It is alleged that for months past the defendants have been conducting a sort of postal service and carrying letters at a cheaper rate than the postoffice. The act

fixes a fine of \$20 for each letter carried. The object is to stop letter carrying by private companies.

A Chance to Crow.
Londoners carried off a large share of the prizes for poultry at the Detroit Exposition. Wm. McNeill secured 62 firsts, 46 seconds and 11 thirds; G. McCormick 11 firsts, 6 seconds and 3 thirds; Richard Oke, 7 firsts, 5 seconds and 3 thirds; C. Stockwell, 4 firsts, 3 seconds and 1 third.

Methodist Church Conference.
The special commission on boundaries of the annual conference assembled in the board room of the Wesley buildings, Toronto yesterday. Rev. Dr. Carman occupied the chair. It was proposed to reduce to four in number the six conferences, viz., Montreal, Toronto, Guelph, Bay of Quinte, Niagara and London, with a view to facilitating stationing work. This project will be submitted to the conferences interested.

A Woodstock paper has a correspondent from Sweborg who writes: "The A. O. E. tug-of-war team from Sweborg found but little difficulty in defeating teams from their western suburbs at the A. O. 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Burial of Brakeman Shaw.
Robert Shaw, brakeman, who was one of the victims of the Burlington Beach accident the other day, was buried Wednesday in Dorchester in the presence of a large number of friends. Deceased was married, and had resided a short time in Brantford. Edward with his remains being brought from there for burial in the family cemetery. About 50 members of Circle Lodge, No. 227, Point Edward, with other railway representatives from Port Credit, this city and elsewhere were present and marched in a body to the Union Cemetery, six members of the Brotherhood acting as pall-bearers. The Grand Trunk company placed a car at the disposal of those who came from Point Edward, and who returned by the local freight to make connection with the express going west from this city at 7 o'clock p.m. Much sympathy was expressed for the friends of the deceased in their sudden affliction.

New Street Car Arrangements.
The Toronto City Council has completed the lease of the street railway system of that city for the next 30 years. It goes to the Kieley-Everett Company. Among the advantages gained in the new tract are these: Electricity to be introduced within a year, and the whole of the lines to be converted within three years. Night cars shall be run on such routes and at such hours and intervals as may be deemed necessary by the city engineer and approved by the City Council. Fares on night cars are to be double the usual rates. Between 5:30 and 8 a.m., and from 5 p.m. to 8:30 p.m., tickets costing 25 cents for eight can be tendered. Transfer tickets must be supplied. Smoking will be allowed on the front platforms of closed cars and on the rear seat and platform of open cars. Every car shall have a conductor in uniform. A waiting-room shall be provided near the corner of York and Front streets.

Clergyman and Clergyman's Daughter.
On Tuesday morning in Stratford Rev. W. H. Battersby, M.A., rector at Delhi, was married to Miss Edith Bonrice, daughter of Rev. Canon Patterson, rector of St. James' Church, Stratford. The church was handsomely decorated, the entrance to the chancel being beautified by a magnificent floral arch. The bridegroom was supported by Rev. G. R. Beamish, M.A., Miss Maude Patterson, sister of the bride, being the bridesmaid. After the ceremony, which was performed by the father of the bride, the happy couple, accompanied by a number of invited guests, partook of the wedding breakfast at the rectory, after which Rev. and Mrs. Battersby took the train for Port Stanley, where the honeymoon will be spent. Among the wedding mementoes, which were numerous and costly, was a beautiful set of cutlery, presented to the bride by the Sunday school, in which she has been an efficient and zealous teacher. The groom and bride are well known to many in this city.
