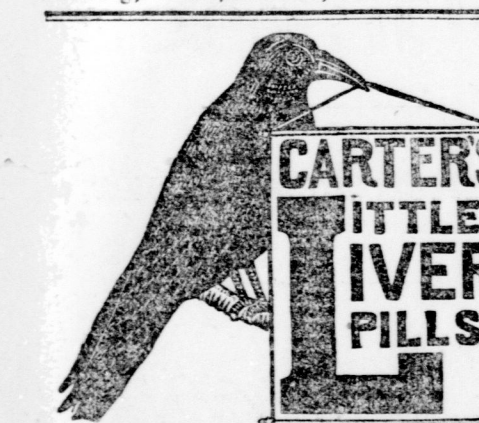

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DEADLY NATURAL GAS.

Four Men Killed by an Explosion at Alexandria, Ind.

ALEXANDRIA, Ind., April 1.—A natural gas explosion last night wrecked a barber shop in which seven men were seated, in this city. The debris took fire at once and was totally destroyed. Four men were burned to death—Harry Bowyer, Jesse Harrell, Ora Ball and Charles Hoover. The others escaped with slight injuries. Besides the barber shop the American Express office and the rear of Whiteside's block were badly damaged. Loss about \$10,000.

Accident on the New York Central.

AMSTERDAM, N. Y., April 1.—Train No. 19, west bound on the New York Central, carrying express cars, ran into a freight train at Amsterdam at 1:30 yesterday morning as the freight was crossing on the siding. The passenger engine went down an embankment, and Engineer George Wilkinson was injured. The train escaped. Three freight cars were wrecked. Loss about \$25,000.
