Ruby Russell's Death.

London, Oct. 13.—The inquest into the
death of Miss Ruby Russell, whose death
was followed by the suicide of Mr. Woodburn
Heron, an army surgeon with whom Miss
Russell was living, was concluded to-day.
The jury returned a verdict that she died
from morphine poisoning, but that they
did not know whether she took the mor-
phine voluntarily or accidentally. They added
that no attempt was made to Dr. Heron.

T. P. O'Connor's New Newspaper.

London, Oct. 13.—T. P. O'Connor says
that the evening paper which he is soon to
publish in London will probably be christened
the "Sun." It is not designed merely to
fill the political field which the Pall
Mall Gazette is expected to abandon, but
to make it a great Liberal organ for the
masses. It will maintain a somewhat
higher literary standard than the Star.
O'Connor's first journalistic creation, but
it will be above all a newspaper. The
fully equipped reserve plant of the Tele-
graph has been purchased, and publication
will not long be delayed.

The Parker Deacon Trial.

Paris, Oct. 13.—The action of Mr.
Parker-Deacon against his wife began to-
day. The trial is taken to prove adultery
on the part of the defendant in order that
the plaintiff can apply for a divorce. There
was much discussion among the people as

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Without Flinching—Phair Thought He

Was Going to Die and Dictated His
Will—Graphic Accounts by Eye-Wit-

Details of the Tragic Occurrence.

The two men, in broad daylight, on the
principal business street and in the central
portion of the peaceful city of London
should deliberately shoot down an old and
experienced police officer, attempt the life
of another, discharge their weapons at their
pursuers, regardless of life, fire on a pass-
ing hackman and threaten the lives of sev-
eral citizens at the point of the revolver,
is a chapter of occurrences that seems in-
credible. But such is a fact; and lamenta-
ble, indeed, are the consequences, for
Detective Harry Phair lies
AT THE POINT OF DEATH,
his left lung pierced through with a deadly
bullet.It was at 2:30 o'clock yesterday after-
noon, when the trouble began—perhaps
a few minutes later. According to the
testimony of eyewitnesses three young
men were walking north on Rich-
mond street, and when just past the
corner of Maple street in front of the Huron
Hotel they stopped, and were acting in an
unusually manner when Detective Phair
approached, walking on the same side
of the street. Knowing their conduct—the
three men, who were apparently in-
toxicated—the official retraced his steps to
Mr. C. A. Morley's butcher shop and tele-
phoned for the patrol wagon. Coming out
again he walked towards the two senior
officers and took them by the arms, pro-
nouncing them under arrest. The third
man, a mere boy—ran away and made his
escape down Maple street. The others offered
resistance and struggled with Phair. The
latter, who was nearly tripped up by the lighter
of the two, at the same time falling in the
arms of the other, who was looking on to assist
him. One of the strangers complied, but
when he attempted to lay hand on the other
he was resisted.Which the former promptly retreated to
his quarters. Just then a lad named
Robert Corbett, employed at R. S. Leigh's
furniture shop, stopped out, as he says, to
look one of the men, but seeing the re-
volver run back again hastily, and as he
saw a bullet whizzed behind him, cutting
through two panes of glass, and burying
itself in the woodwork inside. In the
meantime Detective Phair had the lighter
man on the ground endeavoring to draw
his shooting-iron, but the officer prevented
him. The second then called to his pal,
who
