The president, Mr. Gibbons, in moving the adoption of the report, said:

"I am glad to congratulate the stockholders upon the continued prosperity of our company. As will be seen by the report we have had new estates during the year, aggregating in all \$115,000, as against \$150,000 the year before. We have now some \$25,000 of trust funds, which are in the nature of continuous trusts, and will remain with us for investment for many years. The total value of estates now in our hands amounts to over \$400,000. We are continuing our policy of building up on a sure foundation, by being particularly careful to so administer each estate entrusted to us as to insure the confidence of the public. While every effort is made to get as good returns as possible for each estate, absolute safety is deemed the first requisite. No investments are accepted which are at all doubtful in character, and the company have no arrears of interest due upon any investment made by them.

"The expenses of the company have been kept down, as you will see, to a very low notch. Deducting the extraordinary charge of \$275 in connection with the incorporation of the company, and the annual tax of \$250, you will see that the total expenses for the year have been under \$2,000. We have earned a dividend of 6 per cent., but in pursuance of the policy heretofore outlined we have thought desirable to pay a 4 per cent. dividend, enabling us to increase the balance at credit of profit and loss account to \$8,413.
