THE STRATHCONAS.

London, Feb. 19.—London has rarely witnessed a scene of patriotic enthusiasm that equaled today's luncheon given by Lord Strathcona at Kensington Palace Hotel to Col. Steele, officers and men of the Strathcona Horse. Owing to the national mourning, the gathering was of a semi-private character, but among Lord Strathcona's personal friends were Lord Dundalk, under whose command the Strathconas fought; Mr. St. John Brodrick, secretary of state for war; Lord Aberdeen, Earl Grey, Earl Derby, Lord Stanley and other prominent Englishmen. Lord Dundalk's speech, recording the deeds of the Strathcona Horse, roused the gathering to the highest pitch of enthusiasm. Buller, who unquestionably remains the hero of the fighting Canadians. "We are," said Col. Steele, amid vociferous cheers, "going back to Canada to settle our little affairs there. ## TO THE TERMS

Chinese Plenipotentiaries Communicate With the Powers.

Want a Couple of Condemned Officials Saved-But Ministers Insist on

Former Demands.

Pekin, Feb. 20 .- The foreign envoys oday received an official communication from the Chinese plenipotentiaries offering to agree to all the terms of the powers. The Chinese desired to save the lives of Chao Shu Chiao and Ying Nien, but they were informed

that the ministers insisted upon the former demands. A complete surrender is expected tomorrow. Meanwhile, extensive preparations are being made for the expedition planned by Count Von Waldersee. The

Germans have purchased 1,800 camels for transport purposes. A representative of the Associated Press was informed by the foreign ministers today that they thought the gravity of the situation over. It was expected, however, that difficulties would arise among themselves, when some of the governments should send their indemnity claims. United States Minister Conger esti-
