—East Middlesex promotion examinations will be held on April 2, 3 and 4.

—Miss Isabel Peacock, of Delaware, has been committed by Squire Cornell to jail here on a charge of insanity.

—The Seaford Expositor announces the arrival at Hensall of Mr. and Mrs. Thomas J. Pullman (Miss Sarah H. Currie), of this city. The young couple will live at Hensall.

—The 40th annual meeting of the Ontario Educational Association will be held at Toronto on April 8, 9 and 10. Many teachers from London and the surrounding districts will attend.

—The beautiful grounds and residence on Bloor street, East Toronto, belonging to the estate of the late Sir Frank Smith, formerly of this city, will be sold by auction on Tuesday next.

—E. M. Moore, formerly of the Tecumseh House here, will manage the property of the Grand Pointe Club at the flats. Mr. F. B. Dickerson, of Detroit, owner of the place, intends to run a hotel there this season.

—The St. Andrew's Guild of Young Men was organized at St. Andrew's Church last night, in connection with the pastor's class for Bible study. It is intended to hold monthly meetings for social and educational purposes.

—Prof. Trenholme, of the Western University, gave an interesting lecture before the students of Hensall last night, his subject being "The Madonna in Art." It was illustrated by portraits of the Madonna's various masters.

—The death occurred yesterday, at the age of 55 years, of Levi Perkins, of Lambeth, formerly of Delaware village. The funeral will take place at 1 p.m. on Monday, from Mr. Perkins' late residence at Lambeth, to the Erick street cemetery.

—The special committee appointed to keep estimates as low as possible met the police magistrates and chief of police today and urged upon them the desirability of cutting down the estimated expenditure of their department to the lowest possible sum.

ESCAPED PRISONER SURRENDERS.

Edward Smith, the man who escaped from Constable Wm. Sadler on Sept. 19 last year, came to the city last night and surrendered himself to Detective Ward. Smith was wanted on the charge of assaulting and wounding John Mohr, of Westminster township last summer. He was arrested by Detective Ward and handed over to Sadler while the detective went after another man. Smith succeeded in breaking away from Sadler and remained at liberty until yesterday, spending the time in the vicinity of Windsor and Chatham. Smith was bailed to appear before Squire Lacey at 2 p.m. on Monday.

POLICE COURT.

In the police court this morning, Thos. Robb was charged by his wife, Minnie Robb, with non-support. Robb gave himself up at police headquarters yesterday, after hearing that his wife had laid an information for non-support. Robb, who is a laborer, lived

on Oxford street, and went to Wyom. a few days ago to work. On learning that a warrant had been issued he returned to London and surrendered to the authorities. He was bailed to appear on Friday next.

A respectfully connected young man was charged with disorderly conduct and was remanded for a week. Two first-time drunks were discharged.

APPEAL DISMISSED.

Witty vs. London Street Railway Company, before Judge Lount at Osbourne Hall.—Judgment (R.) on appeal by defendants from order of master in chambers refusing to change the venue from Sarnia to London in action for damages for personal injuries. Held that the venue should not be changed. There does not appear to be such an overwhelming preponderance of convenience in defendant's favor as would warrant any change. Appeal dismissed. Costs to plaintiff in any event. Helmutz for defendant. J. H. Moss for plaintiff.

LIBERAL CLUB ORGANIZERS.

Geo. M. Reid, London, president of the Federated Liberal Clubs, was at the parliament buildings yesterday and received the cordial congratulations of the members of the house and others upon his election. He called upon Premier Ross, and subsequently it was stated that Duncan Marshall, Thornbury, Grey county, and W. A. Stewart, Martintown, Glenary county, would be organizers of Liberal clubs throughout the province. It is the intention of the federation to obtain as possible a record of all clubs now in existence, and a record of all new clubs, whether formed by members of the federation or others, will also be kept, so that the progress of the work can be known at any moment.—Toronto Globe.

HIGH COURT OF JUSTICE.

Mr. Justice Lount's first appearance in London in his official capacity was made this morning, when he presided over the weekly sitting of the high court of justice. Three motions were heard, as follows:

In the matter of the Canadian Order of Woodmen of the World and Penfold, motion for payment of moneys out of court. Order granted. MacBeth for motion.

Re Ratcliffe vs. Crescent Mill Company—motion for mandamus, commanding Judge Edward Elliott to hear and determine action notwithstanding his decision of no jurisdiction. An judgment of non-suit. Order refused with costs. W. H. Barm for motion.

Re McIntyre—Motion on behalf of widow for allowance to infant children. Order granted. Stuart for motion.

MESSAGE FROM THE KING.

The following letter was received by Mr. E. B. Eddy, the president of the E. B. Eddy Co., Hull, Que., in reply to a message from his company to King Edward VII.: "Ottawa, March 7, 1901.—

Q.: Sir.—The dutiful message from His Majesty the King, conveying congratulations and good wishes to His Majesty the King upon his accession to the throne, was duly laid before his majesty, and his majesty has been graciously pleased to command that his thanks may be returned to the officers and employees of the company for this loyal expression of their goodwill. I have the honor to be, sir, your obedient servant, Harry Graham, captain, D. C. acting governor-general's secretary."

MEETING OF 'Y'S.'

The regular meeting of the Y. W. C. A. was held in their rooms Dundas street, on Wednesday the 13th inst. Reports of the various committees were read and received. The secretary reported a total attendance during the month of 1,627, of whom 547 visited the rooms during the day, 57 were present at the lunch hour and 67 at the evening meetings. Two applications for maids, two for work by the day, three for relief and one for lodgers were received. For one young woman a situation as maid and for another work by the day was obtained. One sought a position as nurse. There was a good attendance at the Students' Bible Club on Tuesday afternoon. Only one regular meeting of the Y. W. C. A. was held, in consequence of Miss Carson's meetings. The educational classes met on Monday and Thursday evenings, and the sewing and netting classes on Thursday evenings. Mrs. Humphrey Ward's "Eleanor" was ably reviewed by Miss Fowler at the regular meeting of the Current Topic Club, on the last Saturday evening of the month. The subject chosen for the evening meeting, on March 23, was "The Passion Play." St. Valentine's Day was celebrated by about 80 members and their friends participated. The St. John's Athletic Club kindly gave a concert for the benefit of the association, which was much appreciated by those who were present. The King's Daughters' Circle, while assisting many of the suffering fellow-citizens, gently donated for the hall a much-needed umbrella stand, for which thoughtful kindness the association desire to express their sincere thanks. From the 25th to the 30th of February, the association, of New York, held meetings every evening, with the exception of Feb. 13 and 14, for young women. On two of the evenings Miss MacDonald, of Toronto, was present and gave helpful addresses. Miss Carson, through the kind courtesy of the proprietors, was also enabled to hold meetings at several of the large manufacturing establishments where young women are employed. She also gave addresses in the rooms at the lunch hour, and on one Tuesday in Wesley Hall and another in St. Andrew's Church lecture room. She spoke at students' Bible class on Tuesdays. It is hoped that many were benefited by her earnest and expressive words.

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DOMINION PARLIAMENT

Sir Richard Cartwright Replies to Opposition Criticism of the Budget.

Mr. C. S. Hyman Makes an Able Address—The Walker Railway Bonus—Canada's Wonderful Increase in Trade.

Ottawa, March 15.—The debate on the budget occupied the entire attention of the house, with the exception of a few minutes devoted to the routine business of advancing several bills a stage. Sir Richard Cartwright, who resumed the debate, spoke with considerable vigor. The debate was continued by Mr. Bell (Pictou), Mr. Hyman and Mr. Smith (Wentworth). Mr. Borden moved the adjournment of the debate, and gave notice of an amendment which he will move on Monday.

SIR RICHARD CARTWRIGHT.

Sir Richard Cartwright resumed the discussion of the budget. After some preliminary references he summarized Mr. Osler's opinion as being that there should be no more taxes to raise the revenue, but that the government should be approved by the C. P. R. or some other competent authority.—(Laughter)—that they should issue no more scrip and that the government should be able to go on expending money on the St. Lawrence navigation until it was established whether Montreal or Quebec should be the great port of Canada. If the latter were the mouthpiece of the opposition, he said they would formulate their views in the shape of a motion, the government would be pleased to discuss them.

INCREASE OF DEBT.

Remarking that the debt increase under the government had been \$7,000,000, while during the three years prior to 1896 it had been \$7,000,000. Of it, \$3,500,000 had been a grant to the Crown's Nest Pass Railway; \$1,500,000 had been a grant to the Canadian Pacific Railway; and the balance of \$2,000,000 had been a grant to the troops in South Africa, and there was a discount of \$1,000,000 caused by the placing of a 2½ per cent loan on the English market. As to the revenue, he said that the government had increased the result of that expenditure and the increased population and increased trade and traffic thence accruing had been to add to the revenue in the shape of customs and excise increased returns, which would not have been received but for the construction of that road, a sum of money which had already almost entirely repaid the interest on the loan for that \$2,000,000. And this in addition to the interprovincial trade which had been fostered. For the South African expenditure good value had been obtained, and he pointed out that the government had given thereby to Canada, as to the \$1,000,000 of discount on the 2½ per cent loan, it was money well spent.

PAYING CONSERVATIVE LIABILITIES.

As for Mr. Osler's question as to what they had done with the surplus of the past few years, the answer was that the government had not only paid off the large undischarged liabilities which their predecessors had left behind them, but also several millions due to the railway companies. The government had paid off \$10,000,000 or \$12,000,000 to be paid for the completion of the canal contracts which were under way, and which the late government had left unfinished. The government had turned a dead railway into a live one. "At this moment," said Sir Richard, "the charges of our debt for sinking fund are a little over \$13,000,000 a year, and the interest on the debt is \$13,000,000. In establishing a 2½ per cent, or even 2½ per cent rate, and dispensing with the sinking fund—as I know he will, the probabilities are that before the end of 1896 the interest on the debt will have reduced that \$13,000,000, which is today a fixed charge that we cannot control, to something like \$6,000,000 or \$7,000,000. (Cheers.) And if the population by that time is 8,000,000 or 10,000,000 the interest on the debt will be reduced to one-quarter."

THE INCREASE IN EXPENDITURE.

Sir Richard next made a very effective exposure of the contradictory and self-destructive nature of the arguments advanced by the opposition. He pointed out that the opposition had passed on to the complaints that the expenditure had increased. In 1896 Mr. Foster's main estimates were \$38,358,000, and it was known that he had very large reserves. He had not only served, taking his main estimates alone, the actual expenditure in the year just passed was nearly \$43,000,000, an increase of \$4,600,000 upon the main estimates of 1896. The increase was analyzed, pointing out that of it \$1,500,000 had been spent upon the interprovincial, and had all been recouped. A sum nearly as large had been needed for the Yukon, and also had been recouped. Then, about \$500,000 was spent in debt reduction in the added sum spent for sinking fund. Deducting this \$5,000,000, which appeared on each side of the account, it would appear that the increase in four years had been \$1,100,000—entirely aside from the fact that Mr. Foster's supplementary estimates would have been very large.

DEVELOPMENT OF TRADE.

A year or two ago our total export trade with the United States was about \$45,000,000; our total export trade last year was \$53,000,000, being an increase of about \$8,000,000, although \$4,000,000 of that is nominal, as I said, being composed of coin and bullion, which were severely imported and re-exported. Still, there remains a very large increase of our export trade with the United States. Practically we sold them about \$60,000,000 worth of products of our country, excluding coin and bullion. We sold to Great Britain the same time \$26,000,000 worth. And here it is perhaps worth while to notice, because it bears to a certain extent on this question of preferential trade, that man for man and family for family, our trade with the 40,000,000 of people of Great Britain is very much more profitable for us than our trade with the 75,000,000 of the United States. I am speaking of facts, and the facts are that at this moment our trade with Great Britain per head is enormously in excess of our trade with the United States. We sell to the 40,000,000 of people in Great Britain about \$26,000,000 worth, and we sell to the 75,000,000 in the United States something like \$60,000,000 worth of goods per annum. In other words, every man, woman and child in Great Britain takes from us about \$2.50 per head, whereas in the United States they take from us only 80 cents per head, and perhaps if the matter were looked into it would hardly equal that sum.

AN UNPARALLELED RECORD.

It is a very interesting fact that I now state to the house, that within the last six months the exports of our produce, the produce of Canada, amounted to \$73,000,000. Before we came into office the exports—and it was a record year, it was the highest year that had been attained—the exports for the whole year of 1896 amounted to \$70,000,000. Six months of the present fiscal year had equalled the highest record that up to that time had ever been attained in the matter of the exports of our own produce.

WILL THE GROWTH CONTINUE?

Sir, as to the question, and a very important question it is, as to whether the great growth in our exports is reasonably likely to be maintained, I have been at some pains to analyze the chief items of increase, and I am inclined to think that from the character and nature of the increases there is a reasonable probability that the greater part, at any rate, of the expansion in our exports will be maintained, a point which all business men will regard as a very important matter. I find that our export of bacon and hams in 1896 amounted to \$4,381,968, while in 1900 our exports of bacon and hams had grown to \$12,758,025. In 1896 our exports of butter amounted to \$1,052,000, while in 1900 our exports of butter totalled \$3,122,563. In the matter of cheese our exports in 1896 were \$13,956,571, while in 1900 they were \$19,556,324. In the case of our mines, our exports in 1896 were \$8,559,550, and in 1900 \$23,500,266. Our exports of minerals likewise increased very largely in these years.

NO REASON TO CHANGE.

And now, Mr. Speaker, in concluding, let me ask, if these facts be so, and if the growth of our exports is increasing, our debt is stationary, our population is increasing, our revenue is increasing, our resources are developing everywhere. Why should we be asked to disturb so wholesome and goodly a condition of affairs?

MR. C. S. HYMAN.

Mr. Hyman, who resumed the debate after recess, said it was a matter of the greatest satisfaction that the finance minister had been able to show the magnificent surplus of some \$8,000,000 at the end of the last fiscal year, with a reduction of \$1,000,000 to the public debt. The member for West Toronto (Mr. Osler) had condemned the extravagance of the present government, but had not taken exception to one single item of expenditure which had been made. Mr. Hyman said he did not think any gentleman was entitled to credit when he only made general charges of extravagance, and would not take the responsibility of identifying the particular items in which the extravagance had been shown. The reason why Mr. Osler had not done so was probably caused by fear that to indicate any particular item might affect the political situation, and especially the honor of that gentleman's opinion. Therefore, that gentleman's opinion would have under different circumstances. Mr. Osler had objected to the further bonusing of railways by the government, and especially to the bonusing of the portion of the Walkerville Railway between Ridgeway and St. Thomas, but did not object to the bonusing of the first portion between Walkerville and Ridgeway. The facts of the case were that the road was projected a number of years ago, and the section from Walkerville to Ridgeway was bonused not by the present but by the late government. When the department asked for a bonus for the section through to St. Thomas, went before the minister of railways and the government, the very strongest plea they advanced, and the plea upon which they at last succeeded, was that the government had not bonused the section. He had no desire in his absence to impute motives to Mr. Osler, but that gentleman had no objection to bonusing the road so long as it stopped at Ridgeway and was a feeder to the C. P. R. of that gentleman was a director; but the very moment it was completed from Ridgeway to St. Thomas, instead of being a feeder of the C. P. R., it became a competitor, and one of the main reasons for the financial crisis of the Opposition with the director of the C. P. R. The finance minister had, he thought, succeeded in at least having very clearly defined the difference between the parties on the important preferential tariff. And he was confident that the policy of the government was the wisest and would enable us to obtain preference in the British market, and that he could be gained by an eye for an eye policy. The total trade of Canada, Mr. Hyman said, showed an increase of \$21,000,000 per annum under the Liberal government, as compared with \$3,000,000 per annum under the Conservative government.

TO REDUCE TAXES

Special Committee Will Try to Force Rate Down to 23 Mills.

No. 3 Committee's Estimates Passed—No New Firehall, Chemical Engine or Increase in Firemen's Salaries.

A meeting was held last night by the special council committee appointed to consider the estimates of the several civil bodies, the members present being Ald. Parnell (chairman), Stevely and Lunnet, and Mayor Rumball. Ald. Greenlee was absent.

Several important reductions will be recommended in the estimates of the various boards. No. 3 committee's figures received an especially severe overhauling. The appropriations for the north end fire hall, the chemical engine and the firemen's salary increase were all struck off. Chief Eoe's increase of \$100 was allowed to stand. The total estimates for No. 3 committee were left at \$60,818, \$2,000 higher than last year. Of this, \$1,000 will be met by frontage rate, representing an additional charge for water consumed in keeping down the dust. The estimates of No. 2 committee were approved, except that some of the members thought the exhibition building should be painted. The reply was that the fair board should keep the building in repair, seeing that they get them and the grounds free.

The chairman and Ald. Winnett will interview members of the police commission relative to a possible further reduction in estimates. The board's figures are already \$300 below those of last year. The committee will endeavor to meet both the school board and hospital trust on Tuesday afternoon, to discuss estimates. A rate of between 23 and 23½ mills may be looked for.

Chicago, March 15.—The afternoon papers are out on time today, in spite of the pressmen's strike. The typographical union has refused to take any hand in the affair.

"THE DUKE'S JESTER."

The duel scene in "The Duke's Jester"—which is to be presented here by Frederick Ward and the Bruns company, including Mr. and Mrs. E. R. Spencer, on Saturday, March 23, matinee and night—is said to be the most thrilling and realistic stage fight ever depicted. There are four sword fights, each in the hands of a master of the craft, Cecco the Fool and the Duke of Milan, while masquerading in each other's attire, are followed to the hiding place of Nina di Borgo, by two couriers and their accessory, bent up on the death of the jester. Rapier are used, Count Malatesto, mistaking the duke for the fool, on account of his dress, in the dim light, attacks him, while his friends cross swords with Cecco. The combat now assumes a graver attitude, and is most exciting. It is believed that few swordsmen are capable of handling the rapid thrusts of two men in such a fight as has been concocted here. Elbows and thrusts are parried with equal precision. Each movement augments the rapidity of the movements, and fierceness of the encounter. Cecco succeeds in wounding his original opponent slightly, but allows him to pay full attention to his great enemy, Malatesto, whom he kills.
