



ANARCHISTS ARE COMING THIS WAY!

Scotland Yard Men Say a Steady Stream Has Been Flowing Toward This Country.

London, Sept. 11.-While the Secret Service men of Scotland Yard are not acquainted with either of the names Czolgosz or Nieman, they believe, as was intimated yesterday, that he has never been in Europe. They say that there has been a steady stream of European anarchists flowing towards the United States for the past six or eight months. These are mainly theorists, not active anarchists, although they are equally dangerous in influencing unbalanced desperadoes. majority of them carefully avoid touching England when they are bound for the United States, knowing that descriptions of them would be sent to their destinations. On the other hand, there has been a considerable increase in the anarchist population of England recently, owing to the activity of the French police, who are taking measures of precaution, in view of the czar's visit. The poor foreign quarters in Soho and Tottenham Court road are kept under constant surveillance by the police. The refugees re-alize that they are marked and are here only on sufferance.


