CANADA LOYAL AND PROSPEROUS

Say Speakers at London's Dominion Day Banquet.

STRATHCONA ON CHAMBERLAIN

Lauds His Courage in Standing by the New Policy—The Navy and the Colonies.

London, July 3.—The annual Dominion Day Banquet, held at the Hotel Cecil, Wednesday night, was a decided success. Lord Strathcona, the High Commissioner, presided, and was supported by many distinguished guests, including among others the Duke of Argyll, the Earl of Jersey, Lord Shand, Lord Brassey, Viscount Esher, Admirals Sir E. Fremantle and Sir John Hopkins, the Earl of Lichfield, Lord Norton, Field Marshal Sir Henry Norman, the Bishop of Ripon, the Hon. W. F. D. Smith, M. P.; Sir John Dillwyn Llewellyn, Bart.; Sir F. Dixon-Hartland, M. P.; Mr. G. B. Hudson, M. P.; Mr. Ian Malcolm, M. P., and the Agents-General of the Australian States, New Zealand, the Cape of Good Hope and Natal.

Over 300 were present. The price of the tickets was twenty-five shillings, which included wines and cigars ad libitum.

The speakers kept cautiously clear of the Imperial reciprocity discussion, which is now splitting English parties asunder.

Solicitor-General Carroll eulogized the British royal family unstintingly. Loyalty night, he said, he called a duty; it was in Canada a deep sentiment of respect, admiration and devotion to the royal family.

The Duke of Argyll, proposing "The Imperial Forces," unconsciously answered Mr. Bourassa's speech in the Canadian House of Commons, where he said the best inoculation against militarism was the possession of a moderate force capable of quick expansion, just as he could imagine an Imperial revenue tariff being the best inoculation against excessive protection.

Admiral Fremantle admitted that the old mother duck was somewhat disappointed that her ducklings had not gone into seawater, but he felt sure that when they studied the question they would see how much dependence on British command of the seas.

The Earl of Jersey in proposing "The Dominion of Canada," said the unity of English and French Canada in working out a common destiny was a most timely moral to Englishmen at a moment when the French President was about to land on the shores. If England, learning a lesson from Canada, seized the occasion to plant the deep-roots of lasting Anglo-French friendship, the empire would become stronger and stronger.

Lord Strathcona, in responding, made what today's papers call a significant assertion in relation to Mr. Chamberlain's proposals, namely, that Canada should very shortly be able to provide every pound of breadstuffs which Great Britain required, and that with a strong navy the Mother Country would be able to protect the pinch of necessity. He said that many who had been working for preferential trading with the United States, and who hoped the desired result would be attained without depriving themselves of trade with foreign countries, it was only reasonable that the empire should be one great family. Lord Strathcona warmly eulogized Mr. Chamberlain for the courage of his convictions. What ever happened the loyalty of the Dominion would remain undisturbed. Canada was glad to give unsolicited preference to the Mother Country, and did not fear an inquiry into fiscal conditions.

SUBSIDIES FOR THE PROVINCES

Government to Give Question of Increase Careful Study.

THIRD READING OF C. N. R. BILL

Clause in Railway Bill Providing Free Passes for Members Is Passed.

Ottawa, Ont., July 2.—In the House of Commons today the report of the committee on privilege and elections was adopted. The effect of this action is that Mr. Schell, the member for Glengarry, retains his seat, with Mr. Fitzpatrick introduced a bill respecting penitentiaries. The object is to consolidate the present law, the only change being in the schedule of wages, which is revised so as to effect an annual saving of \$7,500.

A Sir Wilfrid Laurier said that he had not seen any official report of the statement said to have been made in the Senate by Senator Scott, Secretary of State, to the effect that no increase of subsidies would be granted to the provinces. If, however, the Secretary had made such a statement, he spoke for himself only. The question of such increase of subsidy would receive the careful consideration of the Government at the proper time.

THE RAILWAY BILL.

The bill to amend and consolidate the law respecting railways was then taken up.

The clause preventing a railway company from purchasing its own stock, or the shares of bonds or other securities of any other railway in Canada, was amended so as to provide against interfering with the rights in this respect which any railway company in Canada may now have.

Mr. German questioned the propriety of the appearance of interfering with the rights in this respect which it is the duty of the Government to protect.

On the clause compelling railways to carry members of Parliament free, Mr. J. B. Robinson expressed his opinion that when this was done, the members should cease to collect mileage.

A Mr. Gorman thought it a good thing for the country if members used their passes more freely and traveled to acquire a better knowledge of Canada.

Mr. Gourley thought the railways should be compelled to provide passes for all members, but he was not in favor of the members, but for their wives also.

The clause passed. Consideration of the bill was discontinued at 6 o'clock.

The bill to guarantee the bonds of the Canadian Northern Railway for 750 miles was given its third reading after being amended so as to provide that the railway commission may alter but not increase the rates to be fixed in the contract under which the bonds are guaranteed.

The rest of the evening was spent in committee on supply.

Mr. Douglas gives notice that he will move an amendment to Toronto and Hamilton Railway bill giving the municipalities command over Sunday running, and providing that no cars shall run on the Lord's Day unless it has been otherwise decided by a plebiscite of the municipalities.

Mr. Bennett will ask who are the surities who are on default to the customs department for \$1,500 on account of J. E. Grant, of Barrie, and what position Mr. Grant occupied.

Brigands Defeated.

Salonica, July 3.—A band of thirty brigands has been defeated by Turkish troops near Perlep and thirteen of them killed.

The Manitoba Election.

Winnipeg, July 2.—Premier Roblin announced at a Hamilton meeting Tuesday night that the Manitoba Legislature had been dissolved. Elections will be held on July 20 and nominations July 18.

Death of Mrs. Chas. A. Dana.

New York, July 3.—Mrs. Charles A. Dana, widow of the well known editor, died at her home in East Ninth street, from injuries and shock received several days ago when she fell down a flight of stairs. Mrs. Dana was 74 years old.

Jealous of Argentine.

Buenos Ayres, Argentina, via Galveston, July 3.—The Prensa editorially attacks the United States Government for taking and harrying the latter to stop the importation of Argentine wool and hides. The Prensa asks the United States to take steps to thwart the purpose of the United States and ascribes the latter's attitude to commercial jealousy of Argentina's hold on the trade.

JAPAN GAINS INFLUENCE

China Now Convinced That Russia Is Hampering Her.
Berlin, July 3.—A dispatch to the Cologne Gazette from St. Petersburg says Russian sources in China report that the Japanese are gaining more and more influence with the Chinese Government, in consequence of the Chinese belief that Russia is intentionally hampering China's development. It is added that notwithstanding the prohibition there have been large imports of arms into China from the Philippines and from Japan.

THE BOUNDARY CASE

The Counter Case to Be Deposited in American Embassy.
London, July 3.—The British counter case as to the Alaskan boundary will be deposited at the American embassy today. The next proceeding will be the preparation of the written argument which will be filed on Sept. 2. Mr. F. C. Wade, K.C., who has had charge since Hon. Clifford Sifton returned to Canada, and Mr. King, the astronomer, are moving their quarters to the Foreign Office. There is no hope that the Justice Minister will be sufficiently to take part in the deliberations of the tribunal.

The University Conference.

London, July 3.—Many social and other preparations are being made for the gathering of the allied colonial universities next week. The Canadian universities and colleges represented are: McGill, Toronto, Victoria, Dalhousie, Trinity, Ottawa, Bishop's, McMaster, Manitoba, King's Acadia, Queen's, Laval, New Brunswick and the Western University. There will be several dinners, lunches, garden parties, as well as a botanical excursion.
