THIS IS THE ONLY WAY.

Winnipeg Tribune: The right way of dealing with the mystery of the league should be decided every year, and the winners should at once play off for the championship of Canada. To that end every season a series of games should be completed by Feb. 15, or at least, by Feb. 20. This year it will be March 10 before the Eastern League matches are over, and, possibly, the same thing may happen to those of the new Western League. THE WHEEL.

SENSATIONAL WHIRL.
Springfield, Mass., March 11.—A much more sensational bicycle performance than "loop the loop" is now being shown for the first time at the Nelson Theatre. It is nothing less than riding around and upside down inside a large wheel 16 feet in diameter, which is turned by the rider's momentum. So difficult is the feat that only three riders have been able to perform it—Tom Butler, Frank Cadwell and Prof. Hillman, the parachute jumper.

There are two other similar mechanisms now been made, one of which will be sent to Europe and one to Australia. The circles of wheels in which the bicyclists ride turn on ball bearing axles. There are two in sight of the audience. Butler and Cadwell, one in each circle, first have a race. As the big wheels turn in an opposite direction to that in which the riders are going, the riders appear to be perfectly stationary. Two little dummies on the outside circles show which is up and which is down. The time is one minute and a half. After the race the riders give an exhibition of circling the wheel, first seeing-sawing part way and back until they turn completely over. Charles R. Culver, of this city, is the inventor, and he has a patent which was granted in quick time.

THE OAR.

MADE A MISTAKE.
Guy Nickalls, former amateur champion sculler of England, once of the most popular men who ever sat in a boat, is unalterably opposed to the Henley stewards passing a rule to prevent amateurs being coached by professionals.

"Amateur scullers," he says, "so far as my experience goes, employ professionals almost entirely for pilotage and pacemaking purposes, and not for the knowledge and experience likely to give up his time to coaching a man for the Diamonds. Unfortunately, the sculling interests are only represented by one sculler of note in the Henley regatta committee, and this I imagine in a great measure accounts for the fact of bogus amateur scullers being allowed to compete on one single instance in which professional coaching of amateur scullers has been detrimental in any degree to the best

interests of true sport at Henley? In my humble opinion a very serious injury has been done to rowing at Henley regatta by making such a set against Americans and foreign crews, and I earnestly trust that the sculling interests will not receive the same check by the committee extending the new rule to apply to them.

THE AUTO.

HERE'S A QUEER LAUNCH.
Geneva, March 12.—Count Zeppelin, the inventor of an airship, has invented an automobile launch, the feature of which is that the propellers are in the air.

He claims that the boat will be most useful on tropical lakes and rivers, where the tangled growth of aquatic plants prevents the use of a screw. The launch is of the lightest draft, drawing only ten inches of water, and is capable of making from 14 to 16 knots an hour.

FOOTBALL.

MAY ABOLISH FOOTBALL.
Boston, March 12.—It is stated on undeniable authority that the faculty of Harvard University has seriously considered the advisability of abolishing inter-collegiate football at Harvard and that it has referred the matter to the Harvard athletic committee for "consideration of advice."

The members of the committee to which the matter has been referred are Prof. Ira F. Hollis, chairman; Prof. A. C. Coolidge, Prof. H. S. White, faculty members; T. B. Robbins, R. W. Boy, E. B. Waters, graduate members; Edward Bowditch, jun., '03, Roger Ernst, '03, E. B. Krumpholtz, '04, undergraduate members. Hugh Blythe, the executive manager of athletics at Harvard, is graduate treasurer of the committee.

The suggestion regarding the game is a recent one. A motion that the game be abolished so far as intercollegiate games are concerned was offered at a faculty meeting by one of its members. The matter before the committee (the only body that can take final action) shows how seriously it was considered. It is highly probable, however, the announcement that such a step had been taken had not been for the recent article written for the Harvard graduate magazine by Prof. Ira F. Hollis, chairman of the athletic committee at Harvard.

Sports Boiled Down.
Another challenge is to be flung at Jim Jeffries in the near future. Jack Johnson, the negro, who worsted "Ed" Martin recently, is the man who considers that he is entitled to have the first "go" with the champion. Johnson, however, puts in the proviso: "If I defeat McVey, as I am confident of doing."

Larry Twitchell, who used to be something of a National League player, particularly a pitcher, is now a successful tobacco merchant in Chicago. The University of Pennsylvania's failure to secure a place at the Boston A. A. games was a great surprise to the admirers of that institution. The poor performance of Capt.
