MARKET TODAY A GOOD ONE

LOCAL MARKET.

Thursday, April 16.

Today's market was above the average for this day of the week. In fact it would be credit to a Saturday market, as there was a large attendance and sales were moderately brisk in nearly every line.

Grain—Aots were in good demand and the supply was fairly large at \$1.45 to \$1.50 per cwt. Wheat sold at \$2.00 per bushel.

Hay and Straw—There were forty loads of hay on the stand, today, and sales fairly brisk at \$12 to \$14 per ton. Only the choice loads selling at the higher figure. There will be no more hay offered until Monday, as tomorrow will be a holiday and the bylaw prevents any from coming in on Saturday. Straw sold at \$7 to \$7.50 per ton. Sales were slow.

Vegetables and Fruits—Potatoes were at 95c and \$1 per bag. Rhubarb 90c per dozen. Lettuce, radishes and green onions, 25c to 40c per dozen. Cabbages, 50c to \$1 per dozen.

Poultry—The market was firm at 15c to 20c per pound dressed; old fowl sold at 10c per pound alive or 11c dressed. Chickens, 11c per pound alive or 13c dressed. The first lot of spring chickens was offered, which sold at 55c per pair wholesale.

Butter and Eggs—Butter was in fair demand and the supply on the light side at 25c to 30c per pound. Eggs sold at 15c to 15½c per pound, wholesale, mostly at the first-named price.

Apples—Sales were slow at \$1.50 to \$2.25 per barrel, or 50c to 80c per bag. Butcher's Meat—Some fine beef offered today which sold as high as \$9 per cwt for common stuff. Veal sold at \$5.50 to \$8 per cwt. Spring lambs, \$6 to \$7 each, and yearlings, 13c per pound, by the carcass.

Maple syrup sold mostly at 90c and \$1 per gallon. The supply was not large, and the demand on the slow side.

That corner has now a branch bank, several stores, and a handsome red pressed brick block.
