LOOKS LIKE SMITH FOR THE NORTH

Nominations Yesterday at Ailsa Craig Show Two in Race-- The Speeches.

(Special to The Advertiser.)

Ailsa Craig, Oct. 19.—The nomination meeting here today was largely attended, and was one of the most enthusiastic ever held. Mr. Alex. Smith, the Liberal candidate, made a strong speech, especially when he answered Mr. A. W. Wright, the Conservative organizer, who spoke on behalf of Mr. Joseph Doyle. The meeting was much in sympathy with Mr. Smith, and showed unmistakably the feeling of the riding to the Liberal nominee. He was assisted by Col. Thompson, ex-M. P. of Ottawa, who delivered a powerful address in defense of the Laurier Government. Mr. Jos. Doyle spoke briefly.

Mr. C. C. Hodgins, ex-M. P. P., occupied the chair in an impartial manner. Col. Thompson was the first speaker, and made a good impression. He was pleased to appear with Mr. Smith. He showed the difference between insinuation and proof, especially as they referred to this campaign. The Conservative specialty was insinuation. The Liberals believed in proof. What the Conservatives were in power, the Liberals did not indulge in insinuation, but in proof positive.

So it was that the charges against Sir John A. Macdonald in connection with the Pacific scandal, the Langevin charges, the McGreevy scandals, and numerous other charges, were proved in the House before a committee. These cases could not be gainsaid. The Conservatives, however, were strong on insinuation. Of course there were insinuations without number, but in no case could a Conservative make a charge and substantiate it. That was the difference in the records of the two parties.

Col. Thompson referred to the great record of the Laurier Administration. Trade had increased. The country had developed beyond calculation. Immigration was pouring in and the nation was advancing. The Grand Trunk Pacific was being built. The waterways of the country were being improved, and in every way the country's best welfare had been considered. This was in vivid contrast to the record of the Conservative Government, for the regime trade was stagnant, the country was not developing, and the young men and women were leaving their homes by thousands.

Mr. Joseph Doyle, the Conservative candidate, followed, but spoke briefly. He charged the Liberal Government with extravagance, and with wasting the heritage of the people. Mr. Alex. Smith, the Liberal nominee, followed, and was given a great reception. He traced the history of the Laurier Administration, especially as it had effected the farmers of Canada. The Laurier Government had removed the quarantine regulations between Canada and the United States, opening up a fine market for Canadian cattle. They had improved the coal storage facilities across the Atlantic enabling Canadian butter and bacon to compete with the world. In every way they had encouraged the farming classes.

Mr. A. W. Wright followed with the celebrated scandal speech of the Conservatives, little of which found any response in the audience. He spoke at some length, but added nothing to the arguments advanced by the other Conservative speakers. Mr. Smith replied briefly, and made a telling response to the unfounded charges. He was given a great reception, and the feeling of the meeting is any criterion, Mr. Smith will be elected by a large majority.

CATTLE PRICES IN BRITAIN

Quotations From the Liverpool and Glasgow Ports of Entry.

Liverpool, Oct. 19.—John Rogers & Co., Liverpool, today report United States steers from 12 to 13 cents; Canadian, 11 to 12½ cents; ranchers, 10½ to 11½ cents; cows and heifers, 10½ to 11½ cents; bulls, 9 to 10 cents. Trade is slow, but firm.

Glasgow—Edward Watson & Ritchie report 854 cattle on offer today, with slower trade, though prices are not materially altered. Top quality steers are 12½ to 13 cents; secondary and top ranchers, 10½ to 11 cents; inferior 10 cents; bulls, 10 cents.

FOUR CANDIDATES FOR THE CAPITAL

Ottawa, Oct. 19.—Four candidates were placed in nomination for Ottawa today. Sir Wilfrid Laurier and H. B. McGiverin were nominated in the Liberal interest, and Thomas Kirkett and Dr. J. L. Chabot in the Conservative interest.

Carling St. People Before the Council

Deputations Address City Fathers

Matter Was Finally Sent Back to the Committee Again.

The Carling street sidewalk was the big thing at the council meeting last evening, and it was discussed by representatives from both sides of the street. The north side residents opposed the south side merchants driving on the sidewalk, and the question was debated at length. It had been before No. 2 committee previously, and that committee had recommended that a bylaw be introduced allowing the merchants on the south side of the street to drive up on the sidewalk as has been done for years.

A large deputation from the residents of the south side of the street were on hand, among them being Messrs. John Garvey, D. J. Cowan, John Purdom, T. W. McFarland, A. Scraton and many others.

Mr. Garvey Speaks.

Mr. John Garvey was the first speaker. He declared that the merchants on the south side of the street did not desire to trample on the rights of others. They wanted to be fair and just. They wanted to live and let live, although their right to live had been questioned a lot lately. Mr. Garvey pointed out that for forty years they had been allowed to drive on the sidewalk. Some years ago when a permanent walk was put down, it was built four feet wider than the regular walk, and of much harder cement, for which the merchants paid. Since that time there have been no complaints from the citizens generally.

"We were all right until some important people who wanted to plant flowers along the street came to live on the north side, and since then they have been working greatly," said Mr. Garvey. "I do not think the streets, and especially Carling street, are adapted for raising flowers, but they want that anyway."

Mr. Garvey said that the blocks of which complaints were made, paid out \$1,000,000 a year in wages, and supported 1,000 families. They paid as much taxes or more than any other block in the city. They handled a great deal of merchandise every day, and if they were prevented from driving on the walks it would be impossible to handle the stuff at all. He denied that the streets were blocked. The walk was wide, and the street well paved, and he doubted that any person was greatly inconvenienced. In Toronto they made no objection to this sort of thing; in fact in large cities in America it is permitted. London was the only city to object to it. He considered that the local wholesalers deserved some consideration from the citizens, as they were competing with strong outside firms who were better favored with transportation facilities. He thought in justice they should be allowed to continue as they had.

The Other Side.

Mayor Stevely then called for the deputation of those opposed to driving on the walks, but only Mr. A. C. Fraser responded. "I did not think that the matter would be settled this evening," said Mr. Fraser, "and as a result our deputation is not here. We thought it would go to a committee."

"We don't want a committee, we want business," said Mr. D. J. Cowan. Mr. Fraser, however, addressed the council. He thought it an outrageous thing that the whole side of a street should be occupied by rigs. The street was left in a filthy condition, so filthy that many ladies had to cross the other side to get by. There was only one person who would be affected by the refusal to allow the merchants to drive on the walk, and that would be John Garvey, who could easily find other means of unloading his goods. If the sidewalks were kept clear, Mr. Fraser thought that property on the street would increase in value. He thought the council had no right to pass such a bylaw allowing them to drive on the walk.

Mr. Cowan's Plea.

Mr. D. J. Cowan followed with a plea to be allowed to drive on the walks as formerly. He thought that London had outgrown the village stage, and that some latitude should be allowed business men who were doing their best to build up the city. Toronto, Detroit and other real cities do so, and London should get in that class. He contended that John Garvey questioned D. J. Cowan & Co. paid more taxes than the whole north side. He could not see the necessity of flowers on the street either.

Mr. Purdom.

Mr. John Purdom thought Mr. Garvey covered the ground pretty well. He had owned property on that street for many years, and had heard no complaints until the residents of the north side interfered. The walk was built fourteen feet wide for the express purpose of allowing the merchants to drive close to their warehouses. He was surprised to hear Mr. Fraser say that the street was filthy, as he had never seen it so. He could not understand the objection of the north side merchants. It was unfair and unjust. Carling street would never be used for anything else than unloading merchandise. It would never in the world be like Dundas street.

Mr. McFarland.

Mr. T. W. McFarland also agreed with what Mr. Garvey and the others had said. It would be a great inconvenience to the Perrin Company if they were refused the right to drive on the walks.

Back to the Committee.

Ald. Greenlee thought the matter should go back to No. 2 committee to consult the city solicitor as to the legality of the council's decision. A bylaw as has been asked for would be a counselled deliberation. There had been some impatience shown by the south side merchants, but the whole question should be carefully considered. There was no doubt the city's hands were tied, unless the present bylaw were amended. A permit would not be satisfactory, and would leave the merchants open to annoyance at any time. He was in sympathy with the merchants on the south side, but advised that the matter be proceeded with slowly.

Ald. Beattie seconded the motion, and advised the council to go slowly. They should consider the liability of the city for accidents. At present there was no doubt that the city was

not liable for accidents, but if the by-law were amended as was suggested of distressing to the city.

"I see that the city engineer has been giving permits for this thing," said Ald. Beattie. "That is a funny thing. I thought it was the duty of the city council to issue permits." The matter was referred to No. 2 committee, and will be discussed by that body on Thursday evening.

DIES IN HOSPITAL

Toronto Lady Fatally Injured by Collision With a Cyclist.

Toronto, Oct. 19.—As the result of the injuries she received Friday night by being knocked down by a bicycle on Avenue road, the death of Mrs. John A. Paterson occurred Saturday afternoon at 1:30 in the General Hospital. Despite the seriousness of her condition the doctors entertained every hope of saving her life and an operation was performed late Friday night to relieve the pressure on the brain caused by a fracture of the skull.

AGAIN REFUSED COMMUNION

Canadian Who Married Deceased Wife's Sister Turned Away.

London, Oct. 19.—Alan Banister, who some time ago married his deceased wife's sister in Montreal, was again refused holy communion at Eaton parish church yesterday. Mr. Banister recently brought the matter before the ecclesiastical court of arches, with the result that Canon Thomson, vicar of Eaton, was admonished not to repeat Banister again from communion.

A BRAVE MAN PERISHES

Drowned While Attempting to Save Two Lighthousekeepers.

Detroit, Oct. 19.—The steamer Scott Hero arrived at Marquette on Saturday and reported the death of Mate Malcolm McGregor, of Owen Sound, Ont., in a brave but futile attempt to save two lighthousekeepers at Point Iroquois in the eastern end of Lake Superior, from death by fire.

LORD MILNER IN OTTAWA

Leaves Tonight for Toronto to Spend Week.

Ottawa, Oct. 19.—Lord Milner leaves tonight for Toronto, where he is to remain until the 28th inst., addressing the British Empire League and the Canadian Club in the interim.

In Ottawa he will visit the Canadian Club at luncheon on the 21st inst. He will be in Montreal on the 1st of November, and will speak in that city before the board of trade, and either the Canadian Club or the Women's Canadian Club. His lordship sails for England on the 5th of November.
