BISHOP COMPLIMENTS SYNOD IN BRIEF, CLOSING ADDRESS

Matters of Grave Importance Which Had Come Before Clergy and Laymen Had Been Wisely Dealt With—His Lordship Refers to the Laymen's Missionary Movement.

At the closing session of the fifty-second session of the Synod of Huron yesterday afternoon his lordship the bishop summed up the work of the session, in a brief commendatory address.

"I thank you earnestly," he said, "for your patient and conscientious attention to the affairs of the church in this diocese."

"Several matters of grave importance have come before us at this session of the synod for consideration, and in one or two instances we have taken steps that are of unusual moment to the diocese at large."

"The move to extend the control of the synod over the different parishes of the diocese, is one of these. There were some doubts as to the wisdom of the move, but I have hope and confidence that this increased power of the synod will never lead them to cramp or restrain church expansion in the diocese, but may in every instance be for the glory of Christ and the benefit of the church."

The Laymen Movement.

"The acceptance of the principles laid down by the Laymen's Missionary Movement is a step whose importance

I cannot adequately express to you. The very life of the church in this diocese depends on the getting of the spirit of this movement into our lives. And I hope that as you return to your different parishes you will do everything in your power to bring the purpose and the benefits of this movement before your people, and do your utmost to enlist their hearty co-operation in this cause."

"In your acceptance of the finding of the general synod with regard to the Sunday school commission, I think you have done wisely. Not only because of the merits of the question itself, but on the ground that nothing can be of such advantage to the church, as the united action on the part of all its diocese."

"Another step of great importance, and for which I think the synod, is in the mood of the indorsement of the suggestion to appoint an organizing secretary for Sunday schools and young people's societies. This will be of untold value to the diocese, and I hope within the near future to find a man, in every way suited to the work, and whose labors will be a benefit to the diocese and to the glory of God."

To Ask Deepening of Welland Canal

Toronto, June 18.—At a meeting in the city hall, at which representatives of the board of trades of Toronto, Hamilton, Kingston and St. Catharines were present, together with representatives of the Dominion Marine Association, Toronto harbor commissioners, and Canadian Manufacturers' Association, and of the Toronto council, a resolution was passed calling for the

formation of a permanent organization of municipalities, boards of trade, and other public bodies, to urge on the Dominion Government the immediate deepening of the Welland Canal.

A joint deputation from this organization will wait on the Government to press early action in this direction. The organization is to be known as the Great Lakes and St. Lawrence Navigation Improvement Association.

Mother and Girl Fatally Stabbed

Pottsville, Pa., June 17.—With her skull fractured and forty knife wounds in her body, Mrs. Kate Speranz and her seven-year-old daughter, also badly injured, were found dying in their home at Coalfield near here today. Near them lay an infant spat-

tered with blood from the mother and sister, but not injured. There is no clue as to who made the murderous attack. The daughter was stabbed a dozen times, and her skull is also fractured. There is no hope for the recovery of the victims.

New York's East Side in Panic

New York, June 17.—One of those sudden waves of hysteria which from time to time sweep the crowded tenements of the east side, today temporarily closed three public schools, with an attendance of more than 4,000 pupils, blocked all traffic on Grand street for an hour, and was not quieted until the police reserves were called out. Beyond the fact that many Jewish parents have of late been receiving threatening letters demanding \$1 from each family, on pain of having their children murdered, there is no explanation.

First, the rumbling of a fire engine on the gallop reached the ears of the pent-up children of a school that houses 2,300 pupils. The engine whistled shrilly, girls shrieked, and in a

minute the hallways were filled with a mob of shrieking, fighting boys and girls, and angry, panic-stricken mothers from near-by tenements were clawing and kicking at the outside of the street doors. As if by pre-arrangement another passing engine chafed the nerves of another set of children in a second school. The rumor spread through the excited, surging streets that the school was on fire. Before the crowd could get to it there was a shout that a third school had been blown up by the Black Hand. Then there was no holding the people.

Parents fought with the police for their children and many were torn and bruised in the scuffle. All traffic came to a stop, and it was long before order was restored.

WOMEN'S COUNCIL SETTLES TO WORK

Talks International Arbitration in Interests of World's Peace.

CONTEST FOR PRESIDENT

The Re-Election of Lady Aberdeen is Likely To Be Opposed.

Toronto, June 17.—Yesterday and today the peace and arbitration committee of the International Council of Women has been holding its sessions. One of the matters under discussion has been the sending of a petition to the Governments assembled at the third Hague conference, asking that they agree to submit to arbitration all questions not decided by diplomatic conferences.

While all the delegates are in favor of international peace, there were a few who "spoke out in meeting" as to the advisability of circulating these petitions at a time when the great nations are steadily increasing their armaments.

A delegate from Italy questioned as to whether such petitions might not discourage the young men of the country from defending their native land in case of war.

Delegates from Austria and Germany also feared that the petitions might be mistakenly looked upon as disloyal.

This view, however, was not in discord, and indeed those presenting it were themselves advocates of peace.

Petition Forms Distributed.

Miss Anna B. Eckstein, of Boston, a lady who had the honor of addressing the second Hague conference, is busily distributing petition forms to the representatives of every country, and these will finally be sent, with their signatures, to The Hague conference. They ask that all nations agree to submit their differences to arbitration, "guaranteeing each other's integrity and just development."

The petitions have already about five million signatures, of which over two millions are from the United States. The petitions state that they are to be signed only by men and women who have come of age, but invite the younger generation to help by securing the signatures of their elders.

Made Life Patrons.

The following ladies were elected life patrons of the council: Mrs. Marie Ekman, Sweden; Froken Lavinus, daughter of the late governor of Finland, Stockholm; Mrs. Henry Bovey, chairman of the Montreal County Council; Helen Lange, Germany. As quinquennial patrons the following were also elected: Countess Ruth, Stockholm; Miss Paludan Muller, president of the Danish Council; Miss Krijner, proxy for the president of the Council; Mrs. Emmeline B. Wells, editor of the Women's Exponent, Salt Lake City; Mrs. Young Garth, founder of the Young Women's Journal, Salt Lake City, and the Hon. Mrs. Ed Franklin, Mrs. Symes Thompson, Mrs. Veitch, Mrs. Blakie, Mrs. H. Muir and Dr. James Madder, for Great Britain and Ireland.

Invitations for the holding of the executive meeting and the council for 1914 were received from France, Norway, Australia and Italy, and these will be considered in due course by the council.

Contest for President.

There will be a contest for the office of president, Lady Aberdeen and Madame Jules Siegfried, France, will be candidates. Dr. Alice Salomon, Germany, will replace Mrs. Ogilvie Gordon as corresponding secretary. Mrs. Gordon will be one of the three presidents, other nominees being Miss Baelde, Netherlands; Lady Edgar, Canada; Baroness Grinpenburg, Finland; Frau Marianne Hainisch, Austria; Mile. Monod, France; Mile. Popelin, Belgium; Madame Charlotte Norrie, Denmark; Mrs. Jules Siegfried, France; Countess Rasponi Spallotti, Italy; Mrs. May Woodfield, United States, and Mrs. Garrison Villard, of the United States.

Mrs. Foster Avery, United States, and Dr. S. Moglund, Sweden, are the candidates for the office of honorary recording secretary, while again the honorary treasurer was elected by acclamation. Mrs. May Wright Sewell will also be again elected honorary president.

Finances.

The reception for the last quinquennial period the treasurer's report showed the amount to be \$5,130 59, including a grant of \$1,000 from the Government. The expenditures were \$3,410 15, of which the maintenance of the president's office amounted to \$1,826 03, and the balance in organization expenditure, leaving a balance in hand of \$1,660 38.

The executive committee spent a long session clearing them for business of the council, which will meet for the time at the university. During the meeting of the committee Mrs. Ogilvie Gordon, honorary corresponding secretary, gave her report, on which she gave with more details the story of the expansion of the movement upon which Lady Aberdeen touched briefly Wednesday night.

A letter was read by the secretary from Mrs. Bowen, of Constantinople, a sister of Ahmed Riza, the president of the new Turkish Parliament. Mrs. Bowen wrote saying that she was hopeful of forming a national council for the women of Turkey before very long, and the executive elected Mrs. Sila Hunun as honorary vice-president with her to carry Mrs. Bowen's desires into effect. From Finland, Mrs. Ewen Grinpenburg wrote, saying that a council was about to be formed there, while from ancient Europe the same news was received. Countess de Philosopher reported that the Minister of the Interior had consented to allow the formation of a council in Russia. These cheering tidings were received with enthusiasm by the council.

GENERAL LAKE PLEASED WITH LONDON CAMP

Inspected the Troops and Equipment—Challenge Cup Competitions Resumed.

General Lake arrived in the city yesterday on the C. P. R. noon express, and immediately after lunch proceeded to the camp and spent the afternoon in inspecting the First Hussars and Sixth Field Battery. He expressed himself as greatly pleased with the appearance and work of the regiments. This morning the general made an inspection of the whole camp and found everything in satisfactory shape. Owing to this inspection it was found necessary to postpone the active service challenge cup and the Laybourn competitions until this afternoon, and at 2 o'clock the teams from the various companies in camp formed up in front of their quarters and proceeded on their five-mile march to the ranges.

Mimic Warfare.

Upon their arrival there they at once commenced firing, the idea being that the men taking part were marching to the support of a force engaged with an enemy.

The conditions thus observed were as nearly like those of actual service as it is possible to obtain them. Col. Peters acted as umpire, and with him as assistants were Lieut. Beaudry and Lieut. Col. MacKenzie, commander of the Second Infantry Brigade. The winner in the competition will be announced tomorrow.

CRUSHED BY MACHINERY.

Sault Ste. Marie, Mich., June 17.—The body of George Seman, oiler on the steamer Matthew Andrews, was brought to the Soo this afternoon on that steamer. Seman had been dead 24 hours. It is understood that no one knows the cause of his death. It is believed, however, that he was accidentally caught in the machinery while oiling it when the Andrews was still in Lake Michigan.

THE RUIZ TRAGEDY WILL BE PROBED

British Government Becomes Interested in Vanderbilt Scandal.

London, June 18.—Home Secretary Gladstone promised in the House of Commons yesterday afternoon to investigate the inquiry into the death of Miss Mary Agnes Ruiz in this city last May, if furnished with the facts.

This promise was given in reply to a question by Peter F. Curran, Independent-Labour member from Durham, who drew attention to the fact that the newspapers were not notified of the hearing of this inquiry, and declared that the coroner should have absolutely refused to give the purport of the depositions.

Curran asked if the home secretary's department was not in a position to put an end to this scandal. Alfred Gwynne Vanderbilt is in a state of collapse over the death of Miss Ruiz, and the notoriety it has brought upon him.

It is said he is in great dread of an investigation, fearing it may affect his standing here.

BLEW UP DAM TO LET WATER SUBSIDE

Those Built To Keep Lake Nipissing at a Normal Level Prove To Be Harmful.

North Bay, June 17.—The effect of dams built over a year ago at French River to keep the waters of Lake Nipissing at normal level the year round has been most disastrous, especially this year, with the abnormally high water. Much property along the shore line has been flooded, and in the eastern section of North Bay and among the summer cottages considerable damage has been done, while a number of building lots have been submerged. Representations made to the Government by the town council of North Bay resulted in the examination, followed by the blowing up with dynamite of one of the dams yesterday to allow the water to go away.

New dams will be constructed on different plans, as those in use were utterly useless in coping with spring freshets, and should never have been put there.

MUNICIPAL OWNERSHIP OF LIQUOR TRAFFIC

Resolution Passed by the Anglican Synod of Manitoba.

Winnipeg, June 17.—The Anglican Synod today adopted a resolution favoring municipal ownership of the liquor traffic in Manitoba.

The resolution was introduced by Canon Murray and seconded by E. D. Martin, president of the Winnipeg board of trade, both of whom made spirited addresses in favor of its adoption.

The adoption means that municipal ownership of the liquor traffic will in future be the policy of the church in this province, and every effort possible will be brought to bear to have the Government enact legislation.

grand jury returned additional indictments today against six others for conspiracy, to commit murder and incite others to crime. In addition thirteen of the striking Japanese at the Waipatu plantation were indicted for attacking a police officer and rioting. As a result of the vigorous action of the authorities the strikers are much depressed.

The replevin suit brought to recover the papers seized in the offices of the newspaper Jiji by High Sheriff Henry was dismissed.

FILTRATION BEDS CHOLERA-INFECTED

St. Petersburg, June 17.—The number of cholera cases in the Russian capital is increasing daily. Twenty-four new cases and seventeen suspects were admitted to the municipal hospitals during the 24 hours ended at noon today.

It is now believed that the filtration beds have become infected, as the districts of the city served with water from these sources are furnishing a larger percentage of cases than the two districts that get their water by direct pumping.
