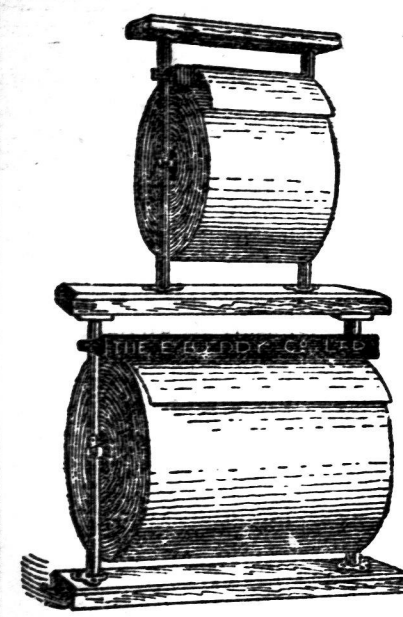

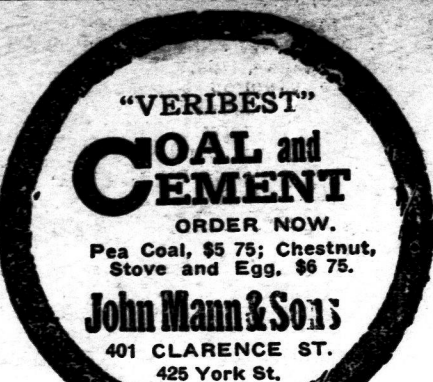

BISHOP INGRAM SPENT A DELIGHTFUL HOLIDAY

Guest of Judge and Mrs. Ermattinger in St. Thomas on Wednesday.

St. Thomas, Aug. 24.—Bishop Ingram spent a most delightful holiday here today, as the guest of Judge and Mrs. Ermattinger, at the Elgin Golf and Country Clubhouse, and a great many residents of St. Thomas were afforded the opportunity of not only watching the distinguished prelate play golf, but also of meeting him. The bishop arrived about 11 o'clock in the motor car of Mr. David Marshall, M. P., and was accompanied by Mr. Frederick Winnington Ingram, Mrs. Ingram and Miss Blanche Ingram. The party were entertained at luncheon by Judge and Mrs. Ermattinger, and the only guests present were Rev. E. Leslie Pidgeon, Mrs. Pidgeon, and Mr. and Mrs. J. D. Hood.

Played Singles.

During the morning, in order that the bishop might try the links, he and Judge Ermattinger played singles, and the scores resulted in a tie. It was decided to play five holes to settle the tie, and the bishop came out with two up. The game was watched with no little interest, and Bishop Ingram speedily demonstrated that he is an enthusiast at golf. He is an excellent driver, and plays the game to finish.

In the afternoon a foursome was played, Bishop Ingram and Rev. E. L. Pidgeon being matched against Judge Ermattinger and Mr. Hood. The scores were as follows: Bishop Ingram 91, Rev. E. L. Pidgeon 82, Judge Ermattinger 91, Mr. Hood 82.

During the afternoon an informal tea was served on the verandah of the clubhouse, and a number of people were presented to Bishop Ingram, and a very happy time was spent. The bishop expressed himself as greatly pleased with the outing he had had. On Friday he goes to Niagara Falls, and later to Ottawa. It is thought that before he goes finally Bishop Ingram will give an address in Trinity Church, St. Thomas.

THE FIRE FIGHTERS ASSISTED BY SNOW

Idaho's Dead Estimated at 200—Names of Many Will Never Be Known.

Spokane, Aug. 24.—Forest fires have slain more than 200 persons, nearly all fire-fighters, in Idaho, according to figures compiled tonight from latest reports.

Superintendent Weigel, of the Coeur d'Alene National Forest, after receiving many reports of disaster to various parties of his 600 employees, posted a bulletin tonight in his office at Wallace, announcing the death of 114 of the men. He also expressed grave concern for the safety of Ranger Joseph B. Palm and 74 men, who were surrounded by fire on Saturday night in the forest on the Big Fork of the Coeur d'Alene River near where another party lost thirteen men.

The charred bodies of 25 fire-fighters were found yesterday on Setzer Creek in the St. Joe country. Missoula, Mont., Aug. 24.—Today's developments in the forest fire situation in Montana were encouraging. For the first time in several days the sun shone through the pall of smoke that has hung over Missoula.

Men reported as missing were found. The intensity of the flames was greatly reduced by the rain of last night. All towns in the fire area are now out of danger.

There are now nine authentic cases of deaths in Montana. These include eight miners, the bullion mine near Borax, and one death at Taft. A few are still missing, but these are gradually diminishing as communication is restored. The day also brought a denial report that Chicago, Milwaukee and Puget Sound train was hemmed in by a fire in Northern Idaho.

Two severely scorched Japanese dragged themselves to Avery, Idaho, last night, at told of the death of two of their companions. The ten men, employees of the Chicago, Milwaukee and Puget Sound Railroad, had gone on a night shift. They were surrounded by flames and only two men escaped. The number of deaths in Washington was today reduced to three, all in the Pen d'Oreille Valley, near Newport. One of these victims, Mrs. Ernest Reinhardt, wife of a rancher, is the only woman known to have been burned to death in any of the fires.

The names of many of the dead will never be known. The rangers employed all the men they could press into the service. When the groups of fire-fighters were overwhelmed the camps were also destroyed, the clothes were burned off the bodies of the men, and the bodies were often charred beyond that the searchers stopped on them, thinking they were burned logs.

TASK FOR OSLER

Noted Canadian Scientist Will Probe Infant Paralysis.

Washington, Aug. 24.—Dr. William Osler, the famous Canadian scientist, now of Oxford, was in Washington today for the purpose, it is said, of investigating the cause of infantile paralysis, which is epidemic here, and in Ontario, particularly in Hamilton.

The Medical Association here has undertaken an extensive study of the infantile malady, which so far has baffled physicians in this country. The medical fraternity is divided on the elementary question as to whether infantile paralysis is contagious or infectious.

MORE RUSSELL CARS FOR YEAR OF 1911

\$100,000 Addition to Factory and Output Doubled to Meet the Demand.

The Canada Cycle and Motor Company are expending \$100,000 on an addition to their plant at West Toronto a four-story building 90x120 feet, in which expensive machinery will be installed. A large number of additional skilled mechanics will be required.

This expansion is due to the success of the Russell-Knight Automobile. The Canada Cycle and Motor Company has nearly enough to supply the demand, and will be doubled for the 1911 season. The general manager states that half a million dollars has been invested in Knight motors alone for Russell-Knight 1911 cars, which will be much less than the demand calls for.

TOWN MUST PAY

Important Legal Decision in Connection With a Strike.

Toronto, Aug. 24.—An important case has just been decided against the town of Sault Ste. Marie, but affecting all other places.

Rioting occurred in the town in 1903 in connection with a strike, and as a result troops were sent up from the east. The amount of cost of maintenance, etc., of the soldiers, was \$7,253, but this the town refused to pay.

A long-drawn-out suit was ended shortly after 1 o'clock this afternoon, and the decision is that the town must pay.

SIBLEY'S ARREST

Standard Oil Congressman Charged With Wholesale Corruption.

Franklin, Pa., Aug. 24.—The crowning sensation in the spectacular attempt of Former Congressman Joseph C. Sibley to get back into the House of Representatives was his arrest yesterday on a charge of conspiracy to defraud voters in the June primary which selected him as the Republican candidate.

Sibley's private secretary, Frank H. Taylor, was also arrested for conspiracy and similar charges are now being prepared against Charles Condrall, D. M. Howard and George B. Munn, who conducted Sibley's primary campaign in Warren County and rendered a statement of expenditures of \$17,000 in that county alone. The total cost of the primary campaign to Sibley was, by his own admission, \$42,000.

The arrest of Sibley is all the more sensational because he formally retired from the contest yesterday. In an address to the voters of the 25th congressional district he said that owing to heart trouble he would be compelled to withdraw from the race.
