HOTEL RATES TAKE A JUMP

**Certain Houses Which Have
Been Charging \$1.50 a
Day Now Want \$2.00.**

RESULT OF PERCENTAGE

**With Blanks To Make Out the
Returns for the Government.**

The local hotelkeeper is furnished with the stationery necessary to make prompt returns to the Government, with respect to the 5 per cent. on receipts in excess of \$50 per day.

The return sheet shows the month, the dates for the month, the amount in excess of \$50 taken in over the bare minimum, and a column for the 5 per cent. of that excess. The hotelkeeper is required to check such, whether or not the hotelkeeper has a cash register.

One sheet covers a month, and the amount due the Government must be paid by the 10th of the following month. Any violation of this rule would bring down upon the hotelkeeper a fine of \$10 per day.

The blank form contains a declaration of the hotelkeeper, signed by the hotelkeeper under. Any person making a false return is liable to a fine or imprisonment for perjury.

How to Use.

For some time, the hotelkeeper have been receiving instructions regarding the act, and are now fully conversant with the meaning of it.

When first enacted, it was thought that 5 per cent. over \$50 referred only to liquors, but the hotelmen have been notified that they must also pay the 5 per cent. on receipts for liquors, puff, drinks, cigars or any other thing.
