APPEAL DISMISSED
Holdaway Vs. Perrin Again in Courts at Toronto.

At Osgoode Hall, in the case of Holdaway vs. Perrin, an appeal by defendants from the judgment of Falconbridge, C. J., of 18th April, 1911. An action by plaintiff, an employee of defendants in their candy works, for \$1,500 damages for injuries caused by a large pot of boiling candy being thrown over him as he tripped over an obstruction in a narrow passage, alleged to have been negligently left in his way. At the trial judgment was awarded plaintiff for \$60 and costs. Defendants' appeal dismissed with costs.

WEIRD HAILSTORM DEVASTATES FARMS
Colored Hailstones in Disturbance That Sweeps Over Connecticut.

[Canadian Press.]—This section of Connecticut faces a scene of desolation today as the result of a record hailstorm, which swept across the state last night. The heaviest damage was to the tobacco farms, where many thousands young plants were cut to pieces. MINISTERS TO EXCHANGE VIEWS

Between the Gatherings for an Imperial Conference.

NEXT MEETING IN LONDON
Sir Wilfrid Says Home Government Took Delegates Into Full Confidence.

London, June 20.—In the Imperial Conference this afternoon Sir Andrew Fisher, of Australia, moved that the ministers of the United Kingdom and the dominions exchange views between conferences, so that they might acquaint themselves with all autonomous movements of the Empire, and also that the next Imperial Conference be held in one of the dominions. The motion was heartily seconded by Sir Premier Asquith, of Canada. Sir Joseph Ward, of New Zealand; the Right Hon. Louis Botha, of South Africa; and Sir Edward Morris, of Newfoundland, all declared their readiness to transfer the conference.

Premier Asquith accepted the idea of an exchange of views. He said that he would be pleased if the conference could be held elsewhere than in London. He feared, however, that the usefulness of the conference would be impaired if it were held elsewhere. Sir Andrew Fisher believed that the conference must eventually be held oftener than every fourth year.

An amended proposal that the United Kingdom consider the possibility of a conference being held in one of the dominions was accepted.

The conference would consist of a series of complimentary speeches. Sir Wilfrid Laurier, as the oldest member of the conference, declared this was the first time that the overseas dominions had taken the overseas dominions into its complete confidence on questions of defence and foreign policy. The overseas dominions were thoroughly gratified, he said, by the fact that the overseas representatives had the foresight to endorse the move would not be lost sight of.

The warm appreciation of the Government's action, as evidenced by the Right Hon. Louis Botha, of South Africa, was applauded. He said that it had been a conference of friends, and that the only way to make the Empire greater was through love, and the conference vivified that friendship which must end in co-operation. The Premier's action, he said, was a landmark in the development of imperial constitutional history.

PORT ROWAN HEARS LEADER A. E. MACKAY
Masonic Hall Crowded To Hear Address on Reciprocity.

Port Rowan, June 20.—Hon. A. G. Mackay, leader of the Opposition in Ottawa, met a large and enthusiastic audience at the Masonic Hall this afternoon. Old friends crowded the hall to its full capacity to greet him, after an absence of 24 years, when he was head master of the Port Rowan high school for four years. Chairman F. K. Kilminster, with a few appropriate remarks, introduced Mr. Mackay, who was received with deafening cheers. His speech dealt principally with reciprocity and its effect on trade relations with other countries; the fact that it was derived from closer relations with our neighbors to the south. In passing Mr. Mackay touched on the educational question, the closing of the model schools, and the present system of assessment. Mr. Mackay eulogized Sir Wilfrid Laurier in glowing terms, and proclaimed him Premier of Canada so long as he lives.

THE GIANT OF SEAS ARRIVES AT NEW YORK
Enormous Length Makes Docking a Serious Proposition.

[Canadian Press.]
New York, June 21.—Twelve stout tugboats strained and pulled on the White Star liner Olympic today on her arrival from England, warning the giant steamer of the sea into her dock. The Olympic was given a noisy welcome as she moved up the Hudson River, escorted by a fleet of tugs that darted alongside the levitation like pilot fish about a work.

The cradling of the Olympic with her enormous length in her berth was no small task. The Federal Government had permitted an extension of one pier into the river in order to dock the Olympic, but the greatest care had to be exercised to prevent the bulky liner from carrying away the new temporary extra dock.

The Olympic made an average speed of 21 1/2 knots on her maiden run to New York, covering the course in 5 days 16 hours and 42 minutes. She was absent from Ambrose Channel lightslip at 2:24 o'clock this morning.

Julius Adler, the pilot who brought the Olympic through the harbor lanes, remarked as he relinquished the wheel: "She handles like a catboat."
