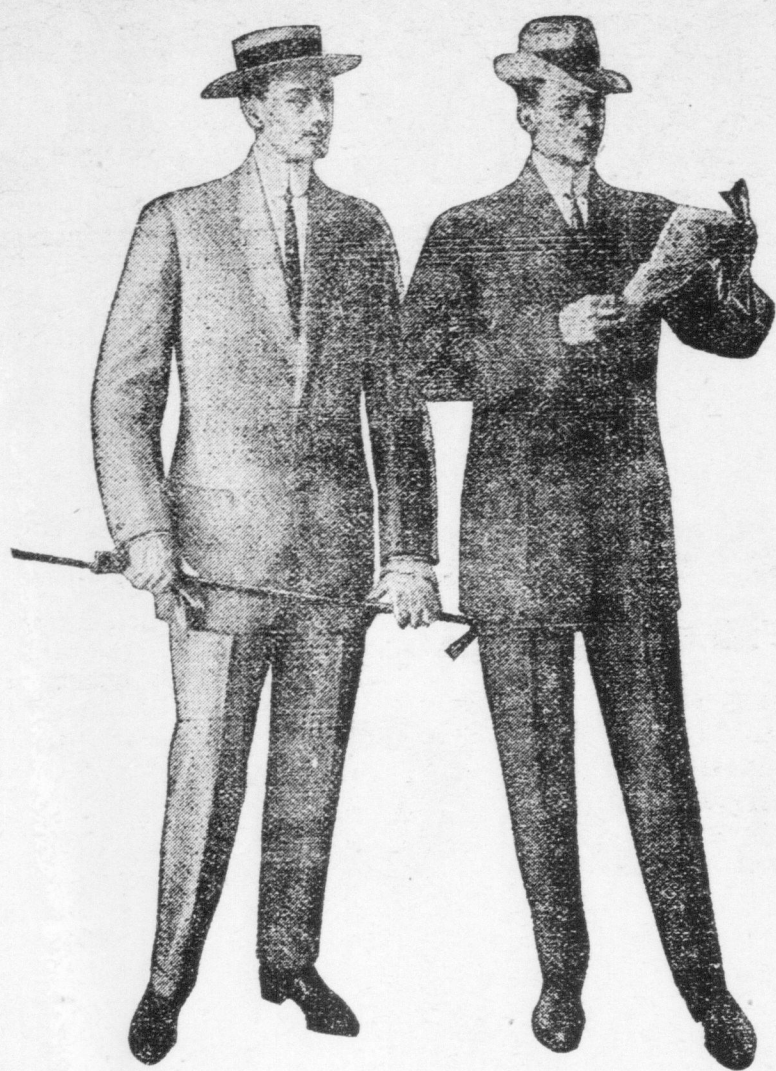

NO JOINT BUILDINGS SAYS THE WARDEN

Mr. Buttrey Declares County Council Has Made Its Best Offer to the City.

WILL HAVE OWN ROW

Repairs Will Be Gone on With, and Old Buildings Will Be Made To Do Duty in the Future.

Joint buildings are now practically impossible, in the opinion of Mr. Jos. T. Buttrey, Strathroy, warden of the county of Middlesex. In an interview with The Advertiser today, over the long-distance 'phone, he stated that the recommendation of the city hall committee that no action be taken on the proposition of the county council to pay 20 per cent. of the cost of the buildings, finally settles the whole question.

"I see that the city hall committee has recommended that no action be taken on our offer," the warden stated to The Advertiser. "As they control the council, it is safe to presume that this recommendation will be acceptable to the council. That being the case, the question of joint buildings is finally disposed of. The county made the best offer they could, consistent with good business, from our standpoint. They felt that they could not pay more than 20 per cent. of the cost in view of all the circumstances. I am satisfied that the county will make no more offers, and that the question is now finally disposed of. We will have to go ahead with the repairs to the court house, and leave the present buildings as they are."

LITERARY NOTES

"In Desert and Wilderness," \$1.25. By Henry Sienkiewicz, author of "Quo Vadis," etc. A remarkable story of the life of a Polish nobleman during the insurrection of the Mahdi. McClelland & Goodchild, Limited, Book Publishers, 42 Adelaide street west, Toronto.

To read this remarkable story is like being carried through the African desert and wilderness upon a real journey. The author's extraordinary power of observation and faculty of description make the almost impossible events seem real and life-like. The pages of the book glow with the atmosphere and color of the desert. Its scenes, its mirages, its strange wonderful skies, its tremendous storms and tempests are most vividly described with a wealth of word painting. The chapters devoted to the wilderness scene with adventure after adventure, with remarkable passages devoted to the wild and prodigious animals that abound, and to the tropical luxuriance of fruit, flower and foliage, and the which nature has lavished upon this wonderful region. A great story. One that will instruct as well as entertain both old and young.

"The Brentons," \$1.25. By Anna Chapman Ray, author of "A Woman With a Purpose," etc. A new Canadian story. McClelland & Goodchild, Limited, Book Publishers, 42 Adelaide street west, Toronto. Miss Ray's new book is a careful and sympathetic story of personalities who solve their peculiar mental and spiritual problems against the background of a University City. Brenton, the principal character, is the popular rector of the college church, who adopts the ministry to please his mother, and because his ancestry shows an unbroken line of parsons. But Brenton is a born chemist, and his efforts to make church doctrines agree with scientific laws results in a mental struggle that ultimately drives him from the pulpit to the laboratory. Though Brenton dominates the story, diversity of interest is introduced by the love story of Olive Keltridge and Reed Opydyke, by the social development of Brenton's wife, and by those delightful cronies, Dr. Keltridge and the senior Opydyke. Miss Ray's style is polished, direct and incisive. Her characters are human and wholesome, with high ideals, and their difficulties are the sort that beset normal, right living, intelligent people. She brings to the depiction and analysis a keen mentality and a trained workmanship that results in a book of superior interest and merit.

"He Comes Up Smiling," \$1.25. By Charles Sherman. Bobbs-Merrill Company, Indianapolis, Ind., Publishers. McLeod & Allen, Canadian Representatives, Adelaide street west, Toronto. "He Comes Up Smiling," one of the early spring novels which was published anonymously, has climbed into the ranks of the best sellers. The question of the authorship of this book has aroused the literary critics which has probably never been created by any other novel. It was thought by many that the book had been written by someone whose name is already a household word, and as to which one of the score of writers might be responsible. In their efforts to find some clue which might lead to the identification of the author, the critics have taken the book apart and analyzed it word by word. So far, no agreement has been reached, but whoever the author may be, he or she displays a broad knowledge of life and the things that go to make it up. An accurate knowledge of the stock market and its operations makes it look as though a man might have written it, but its tender sentiment shows feminine touches. Someone suggested that the sociological side of the story was suggestive of a college professor or social worker. It must be granted, however, that the author knows how to tell a story and to tell it interestingly, since "He Comes Up Smiling" is one of the most entrancing romances that has been written in a long time.
