"HAUNTS AND HOME OF ROBERT BURNS"

A FEW HOURS PAPE'S Rev. J. G. Inkster's Lecture on the Scottish Poet Was a Rare Treat.

A large crowd in the First Presbyterian Church listened with great appreciation to Rev. J. G. Inkster's lecture on "The Haunts and Home of Robert Burns." The sources of inspiration which the poet used for his poems were the two national heroes Kins Robert Bruce and William Wallace and the Scottish Highlands. The lovely Mary, Queen of Scots, who inspired him to some of his best writings, was source for admiration.

Mr. Inkster said that monuments of the poet had been erected in almost every part of the world. In fact the only places without monuments in his honor were the North and South Poles, and these isolated places would possibly be favored when the work of exploration in these parts had ad-vanced further. However, no statues of Burns were really necessary, as his writings would always remain a living nonument in the museum of our



ATTITUDE OF THE BIG STEAM LINES

Ald. Ashplant Says He Was Told by a Railwayman That Coal Companies Will Not Use City's Line.

At the meeting of the London and Port Stanley Board, held last evening, it was decided to call in Mr. Gabey, the engineer who made the report, to explain his findings to a meeting of the whole council to be held later this week. Another resolution was passed to the effect that it was in the best interests of the city to maintain the London and Port Stanley as an independent road. There was quite a long debate over the question, but nothing new was brought out.

Ald. Ashplant insisted that the oard should secure the advice of in-The aldermen lependent experts. were not in a position to understand the question, and it should be explained to them by an independent person, acquainted with the situation. It was not to the advantage of the eity to rush the matter through. Ald. Spittal advocated the employ ment of a railwayman, who could spend some time explaining rates, where freight was to be obtained and such questions. He had in mind such a man, and he was of the opinion that much valuable information could

be obtained. The Mayor's Opinion. Mayor Graham explained that in calling the members together he desired to have the report discussed. The communication from the board of trade was well enough in its way but the board were the responsible body, and must decide what is to be They were thankful for the interest taken in so important a matter by the board of trade, but it was impossible to wait until the latter took action before the aidermen decided what was best to be done. Not sufficient time would elapse to discuss the matter.

Mayor Graham expressed the opinion that the report was convervative, and was the best to be obtained. It was for the board to decide what was best to be done. His suggestion was that the whole council be called together, and Mr. Gabey and others who understood the situation called explain the report in details. That neeting could be arranged without trouble for the present week.

"Would it not be better to secure the services of an independent engineer?" asked Ald. Ashplant. accustomed to dealing ance. A man could be got at a reas-onable figure who would give us an unbiased report. We should receive more information than we have up to the present time To Analyze the Report,

"We can get men to analyze the present report," said Mayor Graham. They would not cost much. If we want a man to go into the proposition from beginning to end, that would ean a large sum of money and long delay. The men who made this report are unbiased, and are independent of any railway.' "These men may know something

about electrifying the road," said Ald. Ashplant. "There are other phases of the question, however. There is the possibility that the road she id operated as a steam road."

"We should have a railway man in addition," was Ald, Spittal's opinion 'We want a practical man, one who knows the railway situation thoroughy, and one who is able to give us definite opinions on these matters. We want to know of the operation of such roads, and the like. There are a host of questions we could ask such a

"What about Mr. F. H. McGuigan, formerly of the G. T. R.?" asked Ald. "Could we get him?" Mayor Graham stated that Mr. Mc-Guigan was away for his health, and understood that he was not avail-

Attitude of the Railways. "What is the attitude of the steam railway lines, likely to use the road, towards electrification?" questioned Ald. Ashplant.

"We cannot obtain that information," answered Mayor Graham. "I am told by one of the best known coal men in this part of Ontario that the Lake Erie Coal Company will not use the city's line," said Ald. Ashplant.

"There is no doubt they will use the cad," declared Mayor Graham. talked with the superintendent of the Lake Erie Coal Company, and he appeared to me to be very anxious to do business with the city. An Independent Line.
