CONVICTED BY JURY BECKER HAS STILL CHANCE OF APPEAL

New York, May 23 .- For the second time, Charles E. Becker, former police lieutenant, today occupies a cell in Tombs prison, the convicted murderer of Herman Rosenthal, gambler. Today, as on October 25, 1912, the day following his first conviction for the murder of Rosenthal, Becker's only hope to escape the fate of the gunmen lay in the success of an appeal from the verdict. She had her arms full of parcels and was directly in the path of the animal. Realizing that she was about to be gored by the bull, she dropped her parcels and grasped it by the horns. In this manner she was able to save her life, for she exhibited great strength, and although the animal sought to gore her it was unable to.


