For instance, he told about three Porcupine miners who were arrested for going on strike, and subsequently released. The Conservative organ re ports him as saying that as soon as he saw the arrest of these men mentioned in a newspaper he wrote off to the magistrate for a copy of the pro ceedings; then he went to the Minister of Justice and asked him to release the men, which was done at once with out their being put to the trouble and expense of having a lawyer to defend them.
