### U. S. RESERVE BOARD MAY MODIFY VIEWS, SAYS LONDON POST

Has Not Yet Clearly Grasped Situation As To Credits.

LONDON, Nov. 29.—The Morning Post in an editorial today says it imagines that there will be a good deal of chagrin among practical New York bankers regarding the federal reserve board's caution to banks on investing liquid assets in foreign treasury notes, and that it anticipates there will be attempts to modify the reserve board's "somewhat crude views."

The newspaper expresses the opinion that the federal reserve board, which, it says, is new in its duties, is unable clearly to grasp the position, and adds: "Extraordinary."

To render its attitude at all intelligible it must be presumed that it is the desire of the highest financial authorities in America to actually restrict the business activity of that country—a somewhat extraordinary supposition—because it follows that if the volume of the business is to be maintained it is about equally necessary for the American producer and the European purchaser to conduct operations on the basis of credit and cash payments intermingled, which, indeed, has been and always must be the only basis on which either local or international transactions can be conducted.

"The natural and almost the only way for America to escape the consequences of her inflation is as a result of her prosperity is to regularly apply a certain proportion of her newly-gained wealth to the purchase of such approved securities outside her own country as will give her control over exchanges and when the temporary causes which have produced her abnormal prosperity shall have passed away."

INGERSOLL, Nov. 29.—By the death of Mrs. E. Robinson, relict of Ephraim Robinson, Ingersoll has lost one of its oldest and most respected residents. Mrs. Robinson died at the home of her son, H. E. Robinson, Ann street, after a long illness. She was in her 85th year, and her many estimable qualities had endeared her to a wide circle of friends. She is survived by two sons, O. E. and H. E. Robinson, both of this town, and four sisters, Mrs. (Dr.) Bower and Mrs. Rawling of Ingersoll, Mrs. Turner and Mrs. Hunt of Bradford, and one brother, Edward Barker.

### CHANGES MADE IN THE ADMIRALTY PROVE POPULAR

Elevation of Admiral Jellicoe Pleases People.

### CLAMORED FOR SHAKE-UP

Demand for New Blood Met By Appointing War Hero.

LONDON, Nov. 29.—Admiral John Jellicoe, commander of the British fleet, was today appointed first sea lord of the admiralty, being succeeded in command of the grand fleet by Vice-Admiral Sir David Beatty, who commanded the British battle cruiser squadron in the Jutland naval battle.

In being appointed first sea lord, Admiral Jellicoe succeeds Admiral Sir Henry Boscawen Jackson, who had held that post at the admiralty since May, 1915, when he took the place vacated by Lord Fisher.

Sir Henry B. Jackson, the present first sea lord, has been appointed president of the Royal Naval College at Greenwich.

The announcement of the change of command of the British grand fleet was made this afternoon in the House of Commons by A. J. Balfour, first lord of the admiralty. Mr. Balfour said there would be consequential changes also in the admiralty.

The decision involving the appointment of Admirals Jellicoe, Beatty and Jackson was taken some time ago, Mr. Balfour said, but for military reasons the announcement was delayed.

On being asked whether the changes in the admiralty meant other changes in higher commands, Mr. Balfour replied that undoubtedly there would be changes, which would be announced in the ordinary course.

Not Unexpected.

The vital changes in the management of the navy announced today will be greeted enthusiastically by the country. They were not unexpected, as recently there has been a demand for an infusion of new life on the board of the sea lords at Whitehall. The case as presented by the critics was that none of the sea lords had had active service since the outbreak of the war, that more than two years ago, Mr. Balfour had brought about radical changes in methods, and that the active direction of the fleet by the admiralty should be in the hands of officers who had participated in and worked out the latest style of operations.

Since the Government apparently recognized the force of these criticisms Admiral Jellicoe's appointment as first sea lord is the logical result.

Stand By Beatty.

Sir David Beatty's promotion to the command of the grand fleet gives the Government's answer to criticisms, mostly from abroad, that he showed rashness in the way he threw his battle cruiser squadrons into the Jutland sea.

Admiral Sir Henry B. Jackson obtains an honorable and comfortable position. Thus four important figures formerly in control of the navy, have passed from Whitehall since the war began. These are Prince Louis of Battenberg, Baron Fisher and Admiral Jackson, all of whom were first sea

### GENERAL RETREAT FROM W. WALLACHIA OF THE RUMANIANS

Advancing Huns Have Taken Several More Towns.

### SWEEPING FROM NORTH

Turks Claim To Have Crossed the Danube and Taken Alexandria.

PETROGRAD, Nov. 29.—Via London. —A general retreat of the Rumanians from western Wallachia under Teutonic pressure is announced in today's war office statement, which gives the line reached by the Rumanians late on Monday in their retreat, and concedes the capture by the advancing hostiles of several towns on the Alexandria-Zimnita front. The statement reads:

"Rumanian front: The Rumanians are retreating from western Wallachia eastward under the pressure of the enemy. Towards Monday evening the enemy had reached the line of Darmanesti (Darmenest), on the Argesu River, 80 miles northwest of Bucharest. Dragani, Vataiehti, Koteshti and Zveru. On the Alexandria-Zimnita front the following places were captured by the enemy: Prunai, Topor, Vieri and Slobozia. In the direction of the latter place the enemy has advanced along the Turnpuck road to Kulurgena. In Dobruja artillery and rifle fire is proceeding."

### ENEMY REPULSED IN PRAHOVAL VALLEY.

BUCHAREST, Nov. 29.—Via London. —An official statement issued today by the Rumanian war department says: "Northern and northwestern front: There has been intense artillery bombardments over the whole front. An enemy attack in the Prahoval Valley has been repulsed."

"Western front: The situation is unchanged."

"Southern front: There has been rifle and artillery fire along the Danube, especially in the direction of Oltenia."

"Dobruja: The situation is unchanged."

### FOE SWEEPING DOWN FROM NORTHWEST.

BERLIN, via Sayville, Nov. 29.—Pitechti in Rumania, 65 miles west of Bucharest, has been captured by Gen. von Falkenhausen's troops, the war office announced in today's official statement. The Russians have repeated their attacks along the eastern front of Transylvania. Reports regarding the outcome of this fighting are not yet at hand.

The text of the statement reads: "On the Transylvania east front the Russians have repeated their attacks. Further reports are outstanding. Pitechti has been captured."

"On the Monastir front (Macedonia) quiet prevails."

The Berlin official report from the Russian campaign issued earlier in the day is as follows:

"The infantry of Gen. von Falkenhausen's army is victoriously advancing along the entire Wallachian front. The defeated enemy is retreating eastward in disorder."

"Front of Field Marshal von Mackensen: The movements of the Danube army correspond with those of the forces operating further north."

"In Dobruja there has been only minor fighting activity."

### TURKS CLAIM TO HAVE CROSSED DANUBE.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Nov. 29, via London.—The following official communication was issued today: "Tuesday in the afternoon the Bulgarians developed in our favor."

"In Dobruja our artillery and infantry fire repulsed enemy troops and drove them from their entrenchments. The enemy suffered heavy losses."

"Our troops who crossed the Danube occupied Alexandria Monday. They captured 160 railway cars and a large quantity of provisions."

### FIVE-HOUR BATTLE.

SOPIA, Nov. 29.—London, Nov. 29.—Glurgiu, on the Danube, was captured by the troops of the central powers advancing on the north bank of the Danube, mentioned by Bulgarian and Austrian monitors on the river, says today's war office statement. The battle lasted five hours, and was followed by the flight of the Rumanians and the population towards Bucharest in semi-panic, says the official statement.

Indications that Bulgarian artillery forces may have been thrown across the Danube from Rustchuk, opposite Glurgiu, to assist the Bulgarians on the north bank, in their capture of Glurgiu are contained in the wireless version of the Bulgarian official statement, which mentions the Bulgarian troops having among them "artillery from Rustchuk."

### WHOLE EMPIRE WILL HAVE VOICE IN ANY PEACE NEGOTIATIONS

LONDON, Nov. 29.—All of Britain's colonies and the dominions forming part of the British Empire, will have a voice in determining what shall be the terms of peace in Europe, according to a promise made in the House of Lords today by Lord Islington, parliamentary under-secretary for India.

Discussion of participation by members of British dominions, and leaders of public opinion in British colonies and dominions as to their opinions on the settlement, led to questions as to a conference of all these elements after the war.

Replying in behalf of the Government, Lord Islington reiterated that the opinions of all such leaders will be carefully consulted, and said that the crown council would consider arrangements for a conference.

### SHOCK OPENS THROTTLE, CAUSES SECOND CRASH

TORONTO, Nov. 29.—A peculiar accident occurred today by which two Grand Trunk Railway engines were badly damaged. A string of freight cars broke away between Bathurst street and Parkdale, and crashed into an engine standing in the former yard. The crew jumped at the time. The shock, besides wrecking some of the cars, opened the throttle of the engine, which raced through the Union station and along the Esplanade, finally colliding with another engine at Parliament street. The crew of both engines had a narrow escape.
