The present average rate of \$12 at Niagara becomes \$17.44 when it reaches the distribution system of the Toronto Hydro Commission. The cost of local distribution is very heavy, owing to the need for more than one station, and for underground work, so that the cost is increased from \$17.44 to \$35.48 per horse-power. But as much of the power is used several times over, thanks to the difference in peak loads, the actual average cost to the consumer is brought down to \$21 or \$22 per horse-power. An addition of \$4 per horse-power at Niagara will not mean

horse-power at Niagara will not mean quite so much to the Toronto user of power, owing to some of the energy being used more than once, but it might mean \$24 or \$25 power.

Could Stand increase.

Industry would have no occasion for alarm even if the rate went up to \$30 per horse-power. The T. E. L. rates now work out to \$35 or \$40 per horse-power, and many businessmen are glad to pay that price, even though their to pay that price, even though their competitors may be paying little more than half that much for hydro power. In Montreal a few very large consumers

get power as cheap as do hydro cus-tomers here, but the average runs close to \$40 per horse-power. The conclusion of the whole matter is that Chippawa power, for the first 275,000 horse-power will cost \$8 per horse-power more than the present average price of \$12 at Niagara Falls.

average price of \$12 at Niagara Falls, and when pooled with other power, will boost hydro rates at the same point to about \$16, or by one-third.

Yet the rates payable by hydro customers in the principal market will still compare favorably with those now charged by privately-owned plants.

The cost of hydro power, including Chippawa current, will be well below one-half the cost of the only alterna-

tive, namely, steam power. And there never will be occasion, as fearful per-sons have imagined, for the province to amortize up to twenty millions of the cost of the Chippawa Canal in or-der to get hydro rates down to a com-
