

Loss of Building Leaves London Without Arena for Winter Sports.

Muskogee, Okla., Aug. 25 .-Seven persons are reported dead, a score injured, and more than half the business district of Haskell, Okla., was in flames this morning. The fire is believed to have been caused by the ignition of gas fumes by a cigarette.

Fire, which Chief John Aitken believes was of incendiary origin, destroyed the Jubilee Rink on Lyle street, two trucks which had been parked in an adjacent lane, and damaged a number of dwellings in the vicinity, causing a total loss of \$20,000, early Friday morning. The loss is almost entirely covered by insurance. The rink which was owned by the London Curling Club, Limited, and which was a frame structure, was burned to

the ground. So intense was the heat and so dense was the smoke, that a number of street cars in the London Street Railway Cmpany's barns across the street were scorched, and persons living a block away from the rink were driven from their homes.

The fire broke out in the southwest section of the rink, and aided by a strong wind, soon engulfed the building. Showers of sparks fell on roofs of homes many blocks away. The blaze was spectacular while it lasted, and could be seen from all
