Decision Is Reached by Board of Education After Four-Hour Debate.

STORMY SESSION

After a somewhat stormy session vesterday afternoon, city school trustees agreed to bury the hatchet of their differences and vote in unanimous agreement that London East was the logical site for the proposed new high school in the city, and that they would ask the city council to grant the debenture issue of \$275,to build a school in this district.

The meeting took on the aspect of chocolate and apple pie social, because Trustee Lawrason brought and distributed apples, and Trustee Cairncross some chocolate bars. The need for this light refreshment was evi-dent after the session had been in progress for three and a half hours, and when the first signs of mental exhaustion made themselves evi dent among the trustees. This is the third meeting of the board in the last few weeks when the hands of the board clock pointed to something very close to 9 o'clock before the board has dispersed, and when members have sat and stood and talked and discussed for over four hours on the problems before them. The reports of three standing com-mittees, of four officials of the board, all of which were discussed clause by clause, and the question of the high

school location occupied the time of Fiery Session.

During the social, such discordant phrases as "You're no gentleman to say a thing like that," "He's always got a joker up his sleeve," "We're in a hopeless muddle," "You're only befogging the issue," "I will not stand for such an insinuation as that," and so on, were a feature of a few brisk minutes between 7 and 8 o'clock, but by 8:15, it was a case of "I withdraw my remarks," and "I take back what I-said," and as proof of the perfect agreement of the trustees the unaninous vote on the east end site was

The trouble was precipitated by the ction of Chairman Campbell in introducing a plan for an addition to the Central Collegiate building as a substitute to the new high school. Having taken his stand among the members of the board and with Mrs. J. I. A. Hunt in the chair. Trustee Campbell explained his attitude to-ward the whole question of secondary high school accommodation and incidentally the plans for the addition, which at a cost of \$120,000, he said, would provide the necessary rooms for the pupils in London. This was at a quarter past six, when the evening was young.

Has Plans Drawn Up.

He reiterated with fervor his belief in London South as the proper site from economical reasons for the of the board for 1924 a laughing site from economical reasons for the erection of the new school, which the remaining trustees already knew, and later on produced what Trustee Mess referred to as "something up the sleeve of the chairman of the board," and which turned out to be the blueprints of the addition drawn up by the architect at the instruction of Trustee Campbell.

"I am entirely opposed." he said, in which Trustee Lawrason took up

"I am entirely opposed." he said, "to the four unit system of secondary schools in the city. We have the Technical, the Central Collegiate, the London South unit, and the London East unit, and the city is not large enough to fill them all. There are fewer children in the public schools this year than last and London is afew minutes later the official unanithis year than last, and London is not in my opinion growing so fast

East site was passed amid mutual exhere are my reasons for placing the school in London South: We own a site there, and all the money we have we can spend on the building. The site is ready and no time will have to be wasted in buying land or clearng lots. In the east end we may have to spend as much as \$70,000 or land alone, and as we want speed building the school wherever it is to go, we cannot afford time to pick and choose and buy a site. We can house 220 more pupils in a school in London South for the same expenditure than we can in a London East school. For these reasons and from the taxpayer's viewpoint, that has to be considered' Mr. Campbell proposed to achieve

this by taking care of the domestic science and manual training classes in Tecumseh school from the collegitate, Tecumseh school and Wortley toad, by which means the science and manual training classe in Tecumseh school from the collegi by which means needed for all additional pupils could be obtained.

Outlines Scheme.

On the matter of the Central Collegiate addition, he said: "Our Lon-don schools are not too large or even large enough to carry on their work most economically. Every second-ary school should be able to look after from 900 to 1,000 pupils, to the present building, one on the north and the other at the south, giving us 11 rooms, with a capacity of about 300 students, at a cost of \$120,000, is in line with the ideas in practice in other large Ontario cities. It would have an economical maintenance which I figure as a saving of about \$4,000 a year to the board, denied by the financier when he arover the cost of maintaining a separate unit. There are at present 1,406 secondary pupils in London. With these additions we shall be able to take care of 1,680, which will be reticence to discuss at length the secondary pupils. ample for many years to come." Grant Disagrees. Trustee Dr. Grant, taking issue with the chairman on this matter, objected that the suggestion of an addition to the Central School was a "volte face" on the part of the trustee making it, that it was an unfair surprise to the board, and that it was not in accord with his previous utterances on the question. He also objected that the department of education had stated categorically that it would not consent under any condi-tions to an extension to the Central Collegiate building. He added that this action of the chairman was likely \$119,126.18.
