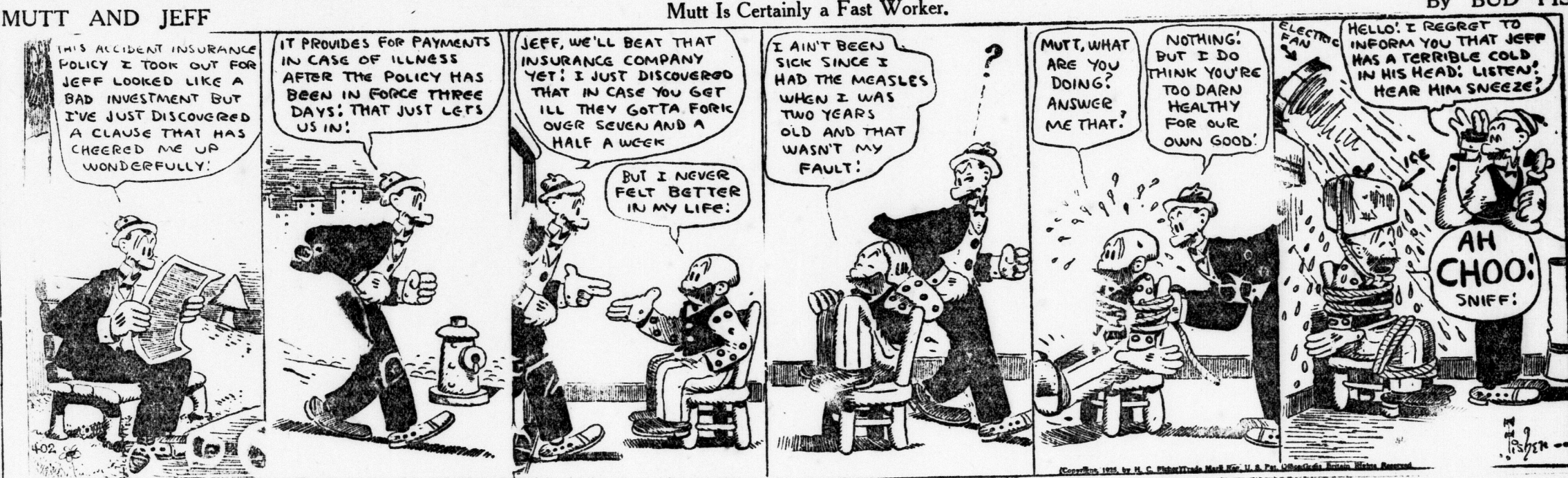

NOSE THROAT TREATED, EYESIGHT IS RESTORED.

New York Doctor Cures Stubborn Case of Blindness in Novel Way.

New York, Dec. 9.—The nose of a young man who was blind for nearly three years was operated on by Dr. Charles Gluck of the New York Eye and Ear Infirmary, and the result was that the patient's eyesight was restored.

The patient, a young man named Behr, had been blind since he was a child. His mother had taken him to many oculists, but none had been able to cure him.

Dr. Gluck, who is a specialist in the treatment of the nose, throat and lungs, decided to try a new method.

He first treated the patient's nose, and then his throat, and finally his lungs.

The result was that the patient's eyesight was restored, and he was able to see for the first time in three years.

Dr. Gluck's method is a new one, and it is hoped that it will be of benefit to many other blind patients.

The patient, Behr, is now able to see, and he is very grateful to Dr. Gluck for what he has done for him.

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
