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DIRECTORS' CASE GOES TO ENGLAND

Hon. W. F. Nickle Confirms Report Lawyer On Way To Appeal Bank Decision.

Toronto, Feb. 18.—Hon. W. F. Nickle, Ontario attorney-general, today confirmed the report that D. K. McCarthy, K.C., was on his way to England to ask the judicial committee of the privy council for leave to appeal against the decision that the Home Bank directors should be tried by a judge without a jury.
Asked whether it was not true that the Dominion government for many years cut off appeals in criminal cases, Mr. Nickle said that was true, but the present appeal is an appeal on the question of a mandamus and was a civil proceeding. He said it was also true that ordinary interlocutory decisions in civil cases could not be taken to the supreme court of Canada.

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THEODORE ROOSEVELT WILL NOT FOLLOW HIS CHIEF

Washington, Feb. 18.—Theodore Roosevelt, assistant secretary of the navy, announced after half an hour's conference with President Coolidge today that he would not resign as the result of the retirement of Secretary Denby.
"I have just been to see the president and I am not resigning," Mr. Roosevelt said.

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Ontario Should Censure Theatrical Performances, Mothers of City Declare

Executive of Union Mothers' Club Holds Important Session Last Night.

O. T. A. IS INDORSED

Express Confidence in Education Board's Efforts To Better Secondary School System.

A request for provincial censorship of theatrical performances, indorsement of the O. T. A., and an expression of confidence in the board of education in its efforts to secure more adequate secondary school accommodation, featured last night's meeting of the Union Mothers' Club executive, held in the Technical School. Representatives from practically every mothers' club of London were present at this, one of the most important meetings of the year, over which Mrs. W. A. Tanner presided.

A very lively discussion took place over the question of censorship of theatrical performances. For three months representatives of the Mothers' Clubs of the city have been investigating the type of performance which is shown in the city, with the result that they feel a more rigid censorship should be brought into effect. It was pointed out that moving pictures were submitted to a provincial censorship, but that outside of the movie film there was no public censorship whatever.

The resolution, which is to be forwarded to the local Social Service Council, is to the effect that that body renew its efforts in pressing for provincial censorship, of not only moving pictures, but all performances.

The resolution regarding the secondary school question came as the result of a talk on the subject by Dr. A. G. Grant of the board of education. It is a resolution of confidence in the board in its efforts to provide adequate accommodation for secondary education, and trusts that the city council will grant the request of the board of education in this direction. This resolution is to be forwarded to the city council.

Resolution on O. T. A.
In discussing the question of support of the Ontario Temperance act, the mothers were of the opinion that their action in this direction could not be too strongly emphasized. The result was a resolution supporting the O. T. A., which will be forwarded immediately to the Provincial Legislature. It came as the result of a communication from the local branch of the W. C. T. U., asking that the women's organizations throughout the province voice their opinion in support of this matter before definite action is taken by the Legislature with regard to a new referendum.

Another important piece of business of last night's meeting was the granting of permission to the Trafalgar School to form a Mothers' Club in that district. A request to form the club came from Princess L. D. McCamus. This new club will make the twenty-second Mothers' Club in the city of London.

Organization is to take place on Friday, February 22, the president of the Union Club and two secretaries having been appointed an organization committee.
Dr. Grant, in his plea for further accommodation for secondary school education in the city, stated that he came to the Mothers' Clubs of the city for support, because he believed that their voice was one of the most powerful voices in the community. He thought that it was due to the action of the Mothers' Clubs that a new school was now being built in London West. And he further thought that if the Mothers' Clubs of the city approached the city council and asked them to grant the board of education's request for further secondary school accommodation, that request would be granted.

"Just as we husbands quake when we hear the voice of our wives, so will the city fathers quake when they hear the united voice of the mothers of the city," he said.
Dr. Grant speaks.
Dr. Grant pointed out how 1,355 College students were being educated in a city where there was proper accommodation for but 600 and that by next September that number would be increased to 1,500. He condemned the old Princess Avenue and Victoria schools as absolutely inadequate to accommodate high school students, and made a strong plea for new buildings in the east and south sections of the city. He declared that it was absolutely nonsense to go into the old Princess Avenue School building and talk about hygiene and sanitation, and condemned the old Victoria School as a fire-trap.

It would take less than three quarters of a mill on the dollar to provide adequate accommodation, in these districts, he said. And further, he declared that it was not always wise to consider the education of the children on the basis of hard-headed business. He believed the city council would be willing to support the program of the board of education, did the members feel that the people of London were behind that program.

Mrs. W. A. Tanner, Mrs. McNiven and Mrs. E. S. Detweiler were appointed to attend the local Council of Women's luncheon, to be held in the Tecumseh House on Tuesday, February 26, in honor of Miss Carrie Carmichael, president of the National Council of Women.

Mrs. John Rose, as newly elected school trustee, was asked to speak before the meeting.

CARTER ADVISED TO RESUME WORK

Government Demands New Start On Work in Tut's Tomb.

LAYS DOWN CONDITIONS

London, Feb. 18.—A despatch to the Exchange Telegraph from Cairo says the Egyptian Government has given Howard Carter forty-eight hours in which to resume work in the tomb of Tutankhamen. In case he fails to do so, the despatch adds, his license will be annulled.

On the receipt of a message from Mr. Carter protesting against his exclusion and emphasizing that it was urgent he should be allowed to take precautions to safeguard the contents of the tomb, the minister, Mohammed Zagloul, in a note, expresses extreme surprise that Mr. Carter failed to take such precautions before closing the tomb, and reminds him that the measures of which he complains are due to his own action in refusing to carry out the program agreed upon by the minister.

The Egyptian Government has decided that Mr. Carter will be permitted to continue his explorations provided he accepts conditions formulated by the government.
These conditions stipulate that the work shall be carried out directly under control and direction of the government. The expense of continuing and completing the work is to be borne entirely by the government and the entire news service in connection with the tomb is to be undertaken by the government and distributed to the Egyptian and foreign press through a press bureau. In the event that Mr. Carter refuses to agree to these conditions the tomb is to be re-opened independently of him. He would then be free to take any legal action.

MINERS VICTORS IN WAGE PARLEY

Present Scale Renewed For Three Years At Jacksonville Meeting.

Jacksonville, Fla., Feb. 18.—A renewal of the present bituminous miners' wage scale for a term of three years was approved unanimously by the sub-committee of miners and operators of the central competitive field here today.
The agreement was counted as a victory for the miners and their international president, John L. Lewis. There is hardly any doubt that the policy committee and the full joint conference will give prompt approval.

M'MURRAY IS SILENT ON QUITTING CABINET

Canadian Solicitor-General Refuses To Comment On Recent Rumor.

Ottawa, Feb. 18.—Whether or not Hon. E. J. M'Murray, solicitor-general, has been offered to resign from the Canadian government because of business transactions between his legal firm and the Home Bank, is open to question. When he emerged from the privy council chamber this evening at the close of the cabinet meeting, Mr. M'Murray was informed that certain newspapers had announced that he had offered to resign.
"Is it true?" he was asked.
"It is as true as most newspaper stories," Mr. M'Murray replied.

GOVERNMENT DOES NOT INTEND TO INTRODUCE BILL

London, Feb. 18.—Premier MacDonald announced in the House of Commons today that there was no present intention on the part of the government to introduce a bill to reform the House of Lords.

QUALITY OF FLOOR SURFACE AT BOYLE HIT BY TRUSTEE

Rev. Roy D. Mess Denounces Methods Used—Clashes With Udy.

ESTIMATES DISCUSSED

Strenuous objections to the quality of floor surface laid at Boyle Memorial school and the suggestion that it should be taken up, made by Trustee Roy D. Mess, featured the meeting of number two committee yesterday afternoon.

Although the meeting was called primarily for the purpose of discussing the estimates of Captain Robinson, superintendent of works, other matters were taken up having no bearing on the estimates.

After carefully considering every school in detail, as far as repairs and renewals were concerned, it was found that it was possible to cut approximately \$400 off the estimate of \$17,400.

During the discussion on estimates the question of the medalion head of Lord Roberts, to be cut in the stone of that school was mentioned, and the secretary was instructed to write the contractor regarding it.

The matter of cupboards at Rectory street school was introduced by Mr. Mess. Chairman Bryden N. Campbell suggested that these be made by the boys at the Technical School, and that if this were done there would be very little cost to the city, besides giving the boys some practical work.

That marbles would roll under it, was one of the objections made to the erection of a wire fence at the rear of Rectory street school. The objection was raised by Mr. Mess. It was decided to replace the old wooden fence with a similar one.

Coal Question Delayed.

When the question of next year's coal supply was brought up, Captain Robinson stated that nothing could be done at present, as no dealers would sign a contract until April 1, the miners not fixing their price until March 31. The estimated amount for coal in the 1924 estimates is \$22,035, as against \$24,419 last year.

It was decided to pay the clerk of the works at Empress avenue school \$125 monthly for the present, any change in the salary being a matter for the discussion of the board as a whole.

Following this, Mr. Mess took the stage. Turning to the chairman he said that he would like to ask some questions relative to Boyle Memorial school. He said he understood the contractors had sent in a request for the final payment, but that he had heard that yesterday they were back at the school doing some work.
"They have suddenly reappeared," said the trustee. "Things were going along at low speed, when without any warning and missing intermediate altogether, they jump into high. They have started working on the floors. They put some sort of wash, eye wash, I presume, on the surface to finish it off and prevent the dust from rising. Why have they suddenly become active? Is there something wrong with the flooring surface?"

He moved that the final payment be suspended until the dust preparation had proved itself. He also asked for the specifications regarding the surface.

Chairman A. N. Udy stated that he had been told the floor was a little rough, but otherwise O.K.

Asks About Overseer.
After reading the specifications, Trustee Mess asked who had seen to the carrying out of the architect's directions.
E. N. Campbell, chairman of the board, informed him that there had been no clerk of the works at the school when that work was done.

"The quality is O.K.," declared the architect. "They made the mistake of trowelling too soon with the result that it is a little thin in places. We have a year's guarantee on it any way."

"We want no more of these rotten floors," declared Mr. Mess. "We have too many of them now. It's time they were all ripped up and the contractors made to lay new ones. They are not up to the specifications."

"How do you know they are not up to the specifications?" interposed the chairman, A. N. Udy.

"Never mind about that," was his answer. "The top is not right and I know it. If it was all right why has it suddenly been gone over?"

Architect Carothers stated that he had received no complaint about the work until a week ago, whereupon he had examined it and found it not up to his standard. He had informed the contractors who had evidently started to repair the work. He had not passed the floor for acceptance.

"There is something wrong," again stated Mr. Mess. "The architect says he received no complaint until a week ago. I was told a complaint had gone into his office a month ago. Directly I begin to press this there is extraordinary activity by all. This floor matter is hard on my temperament and I want something done. We have not the right kind of floor. There is something wrong."

The matter was left with the architect and a committee appointed at the last meeting.

HARDING TO REPRESENT LEAGUE IN HUNGARY

Unofficially Selected As High Commissioner For Control of Finances.

Geneva, Feb. 18.—W. P. G. Harding, former governor of the United States Federal Reserve Board, has been unofficially selected as high commissioner of the League of Nations to Hungary for control of finances under the league's loan plan and has informed the league that he would accept if officially designated, it was announced here today.

It was said in league circles that the selection of Mr. Harding had been approved by all the interested parties.

Vandals Destroy Church Vessels

Rifle Poor Boxes, Damage Vestments At Montreal.

Montreal, Feb. 18.—Vandals broke into the St. Catharine Church in the north end of the city over the weekend and rifled poor boxes, broke sacred vessels and damaged vestments.

The sacred ornaments were taken from the lockers in the vestries at shrines and thrown and broken on the floors. The theft was discovered when the church was opened by the curate, Rev. J. A. Papineau, who informed the police.

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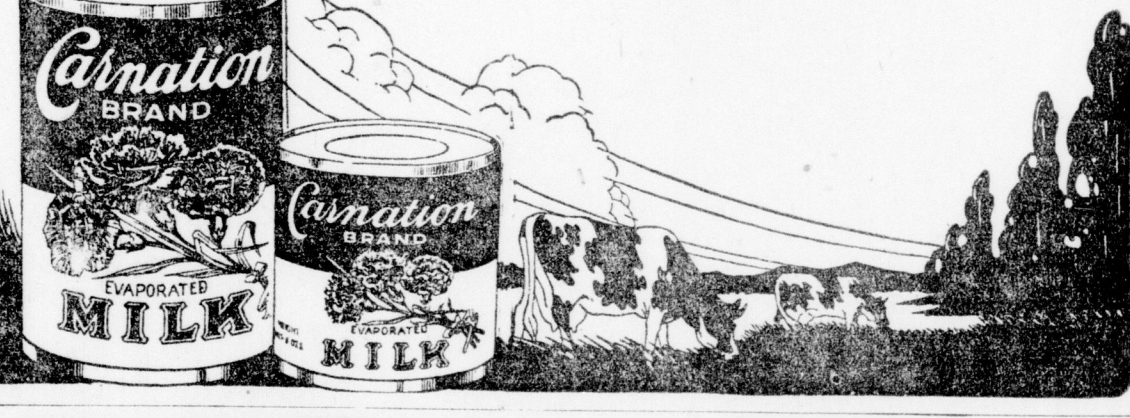
