BERLIN, Oct. 29 .- From the results of the elections already known it may be broadly said that the urban population is pretty well known to have pronounced against Bis-marck's economic policy, but the reports from the rural districts not yet received may turn the tide. The final result will not be known for several days, as many second elections are necessary, especially where the contests is between the progress ists and the socialists. The victory of the progressists in Berlin is complete, although the conservatives gained much ground here significant. The most strikingly significant fact brought out by the election is the great

election districts show the government has not secured a majority. Sixty new ballots will be necessary. Of the mambers elected fifty-five belong to the centre party, eighteen are progressists, nineteen secessionists, fifteen national liberals, twenty conservafifteen national liberals, twenty conservatives, nine free conservatives, four Poles, ten protesters and particularists, and six belong to the party of the people. All the candidates of the centre and the advanced liberal parties are re-elected. Richter has been elected for Hagen. The socialist lost two electoral districts which they formerly represented, and must contest seventeen second ballots, ten of them against progressists. Six seats have been gained by the centre party. The secessionists and progressists gained considerably. The free conservatives are literally decimated. Their leaders Kardoff, Varnbuhier and Count leaders Kardoff, Varnbuhier and Count Brankenburg were defeated. It is not considered that later returns will materially sidered that later returns will materially modify the result as now announced.
