The following letter has been addressed to the president and directors of the Western Union Telegraph Company, in answer to a statement issued by Mr. Wiman on the subject of the attempt to bribe a clerk of the Mutual Union Telegraph Company.

To the President and Directors of the Western Union Telegraph Company. On the 19th inst. we sent you a letter containing very grave charges against certain officers and directors of your company, alleging that they had conspired to bribe a clerk to steal certain papers which they expected to use for the benefit of the Western Union Telegraph Company, and to the injury of the Mutual Union Telegraph Company.

Mr. Wiman's explanation, in brief, is that he is a clerical copyist, and without any reference to the affairs of the Western Union Telegraph Company, he desired to obtain a copy of certain papers relating to the Mutual Union Telegraph Company.

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BOSS BISMARCK BEATEN. THE SOCIAL DEMOCRACY MAKE LARGE GAINS.

THE SOCIAL DEMOCRACY MAKE LARGE GAINS. Von Moltke Defeated—The Bismarck Incomplete—Second Elections to be Held.

BERLIN, Oct. 29.—From the results of the election already known it may be broadly said that the urban population is pretty well known to have pronounced against Bismarck's economic policy, but the reports from the rural districts not yet received may turn the tide. The final result will not be known for several days, as many second elections are necessary, especially where the contests are between the progressists and the socialists.

The victory of the progressists in Berlin is complete, although the conservatives gained much ground since the last general election, which is significant. The most strikingly significant fact brought out by the election is the great and decided increase in the strength of the social democracy, not so much by the members returned as by the number of votes given.

The returns from 216 election districts show the government had not secured a majority. Sixty new ballots will be necessary. Of the members elected thirty are members of the centre party, eighty are progressists, nineteen socialists, fifteen national liberals, twenty conservatives, nine free conservatives, four Poles, ten protestants and particularists, and six belong to the party of the people. All the candidates of the centre and the advanced liberal parties were defeated.

The socialists lost two electoral districts which they formerly represented, and must contest seven second ballots, ten of them against progressists. Six seats have been gained by the centre party. The socialists and progressists gained considerably. The free conservatives are literally demoralized. Their leaders Kautsky, Varnhagen and Count Frankenburg were defeated. It is not yet ascertained whether later returns will materially modify the result as now announced.

Altogether between twenty and thirty social democrats polled sufficient number of votes to necessitate polling a second ballot. It is not doubted that less than half of these have been returned. Beber will again go to the poll on second ballot in Dresden as well as in Berlin. Among those re-elected the best known are Lasker, Dr. Frobenius and Dr. Falt. Bismarck, a clerical, defeated Von Moltke at Essen, but the latter may be returned for Mennel. Dr. Lohmann, minister of agriculture, has apparently been beaten by a socialist. The most remarkable feature of the election is the triumph of those liberals special innoxious to Bismarck. Thus Eugene Richter at Hagen obtained a majority of 7000, and Karl Meyer who has been latterly persecuted by conservatives gained a decided victory at Stuttgart. Count Von Moltke is indisposed and confined in his room. Stocker has been defeated in four districts.

368 districts give conservatives 36, free conservatives 34, centre party 89, national liberals 32, socialists 30, progressists 12, Poles 12, protestants and particularists 21. Von Moltke was defeated at Essen by a clerical.

CANADIAN DESPATCHES IN BRIEF. Diphteria prevails at Ottawa. C. Olin from \$7.50 to \$8.50 in Ottawa. London has moved \$50 to the sufferers in Muskoka from bush fires.

The first national bank of Ottawa has given notice of application for incorporation. A boy named Macmahon had his legs cut off, jumping on a train at Chatham yesterday.

Col. Collier offers to build car-walks employing forty men for Fort Dorver will exempt him. Wm. Coyne from Fort Hope, had his left leg cut off, jumping on Friday night while attempting to board a train. John Garner was drowned in the new canal at Rock 23, Thorold, on Saturday. The canal was under the water and fell in. The Grand Trunk railway station and freight shed, with contents, at Parkhill, were destroyed by fire about five o'clock yesterday.

THE MONTECALM MARKET. The Montreal stock market was steady on Saturday. Ottawa advanced 2 percent, the shorts having to cover before the end of the month.

The Grand Junction has done thirty thousand dollars worth more of business from June 31st to date than the corresponding period of last year.

A week ago yesterday two men named Elliott and Morrison were out deer shooting; Morrison accidentally shot Elliott dead, but no particulars are given. The dead man leaves a wife and eight children. He was considered well-to-do, but his family will be hard put to it now. Mornington has become insane.

NORTHWEST NOTES. The bishop of Saskatchewan will shortly visit Ontario. There are said to be unlimited quantities of excellent coal near the Belly River.

The bishop of Saskatchewan is of opinion, from a recent visit, that a parallelogram of land, extending from the base of the Rocky mountains eastward for thirty miles, and having a length of three hundred miles from north to south, thus embracing a tract of 9000 square miles, containing probably the best land on the whole of this continent for stock raising.

The work of Emmanuel college, Prince Albert, continues to go on prosperously. In addition to its cheapness as a training college for native helpers, and a theological school, it has now a complete school of law, and a course in arts for young men.

The head master of the collegiate school in the Rev. Canon Flett, who distinguishes himself very highly as a student at St. John's college, Manitoba. There are tutors in the Cree and Sioux languages; and one in the Blackfoot dialect is being "del." The theological department is under the charge of the bishop of Saskatchewan and Canon McKay.
